#### POPULATION

From screening results from S-5 Section, 4th Constabulary, only three persons were eligible to enter an UN D.P. Camp and 5 Ecuador repatriates, who went to Asten, Camp 100, out of population of 44. 20 Allied DP Cards were exchanged for Non Allied DP Cards and list with Allied DP Cards handed into S-5 Section of new registr. The remaining <sup>were</sup> 2 adults and 2 babies who possessed no registration at all, but had been employed in the past on the permanent staff of the camp.

Disposal of remaining: 8 persons left for private <sup>shelters</sup>  
Remainder given permission to stay until room available in Austrian camps.

The camp was turned over to the D.P. Office on 31 January 1947 and it seems the intention is for the Real Estate Office to return part if not all to be used as a housing settlement for workers.



Dear Sir,

Until August 6<sup>th</sup> 1946. we were inhabitants of Lager Puch near Slzburg, and we received the help and care of U.N.R.R.A.

On August 6 we were ordered to move to Markt Pongau to make room for Jewish people.

Now we have no help from U.N.R.R.A., although, as genuine Displaced Persons we are eligible for such care. The food situation is very bad indeed. We have only the bare Austrian rations.

The living conditions are inadequate. In many rooms there are no stoves. There are about 200 children but there is no provision for schools or immediate medical care.

We should be very glad if you let us know when we can again have help from U.N.R.R.A.

Subject: Report on Camp Beth Bialik.

The direction of this camp was taken over from the Army on the 8th of August, 1946.

Camp Strength:

On the 8th of August, when UNRRA came into the camp, the registered strength was 2802 persons. Departures and new arrivals have caused this figure to fluctuate daily, from a high of 3181 to the strength as of this date of 2841 residents. All are Jewish.

Food:

We are receiving 1200 calories per day per person from the U.S. Army. Fresh milk has been procured from Austrian sources. Several camps, notably Bad Gas tein, have contributed various items of food and some clothing. The AJDC has supplemented the army ration to some extent. There are no serious complaints regarding food.

Bathing Facilities:

Bathing facilities are inadequate for the number of persons here. There are fifteen showers in one building and four in another. The Army has promised to install an additional fifty showers but so far nothing has been done.

Cooking Equipment:

The camp has one very good kitchen with equipment sufficient to serve the present strength. A small kosher kitchen is operating separately, using army field stoves.

Housing:

We can house 3000 persons without greatly overcrowding.

Heating:

The entire camp is heated from a central plant which at present is not in operation.

Sanitation:

The sanitation of the camp is fair. A plan has been submitted to the Army to install a drain from the present wash-room. In the meantime ditches are being dug to carry the waste water.

Supplies:



Supplies:

We have an adequate number of beds for the present strength. A requisition has been put in for 887 blankets which we hope to get today. We have requisitioned for 888 mattress covers, badly needed. A fair quantity of children's clothes have been received and are being distributed today.

Relations With the Army:

Our relations with the Army are entirely satisfactory. We find all Army personnel with whom we come in contact ready and willing to cooperate at all times. They have assisted us in every way in the procurement of necessary supplies.

Until the 14th of August, from the 8th, when we took over, there were no Army personnel in the camp. On the 14th four enlisted men were assigned to this camp and are now quartered within the camp.

Due to the large quantity of supplies that will soon be in our central warehouse we have requested that one soldier be placed on guard. This has been agreed to by Colonel Broyles.


Following instructions of Col. Gaddes we are not filling out DP Cards 1-2-3 but are registering each resident.

MEMORANDUM TO: Chief of Staff.

SUBJECT : Relations with UNRRA.

Whereas I am in general agreement with the military personnel saving feature contained in G-5's memorandum, it must be clearly enunciated and clearly understood that the Commanding Generals concerned are responsible for the camps, whether administered by their own personnel or by UNRRA. Consequently, in any camp turned over to UNRRA for administration, we, nevertheless, will look to the Commanding General of the zone for its efficient operation. How he achieves this efficiency is left up to him. Therefore, while the plan should be most carefully considered by them, I do not wish to order that the proposed scheme be adopted.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE CHIEF OF STAFF

SUBJECT: Relations with UNRRA

1. While it is realized that on a Headquarters level an agreement between the military and UNRRA is in the process of being negotiated, it is believed that more progress can be made now, without regard for the high-level agreement in obtaining an optimum of efficiency and balanced operation in the subordinate administration of United Nations Camps.

2. Until such time as mutual agreement is reached on the transfer of responsibility for the care, handling, and repatriation of displaced persons, these functions remain a military responsibility. However, it is the policy of this Headquarters that UNRRA personnel attached to Divisions be delegated as much subordinate responsibility as possible, also that UNRRA teams in established camps be allowed as much local freedom of action as Military Government Area Commanders feel they can permit.

3. As limiting the execution of this policy, it is understood that UNRRA has no supply channels, and that in Austria the military must continue to retain the responsibility for the furnishing of necessary supplies to camps. The military must also continue to furnish all transportation for repatriation movements, as well as to provide security.

4. In spite of these limiting factors, present planning as to the future status of UNRRA contemplates the assumption by UNRRA of full responsibility for the administration of United Nations Displaced Person camps, thus relieving the military of this function. It is strongly recommended that attention be devoted to making future change-over a smooth and gradual operation rather than as a sharp break, and it is believed that one of the best ways of doing this is by bringing the local operation of established teams to a maximum of efficiency and extended to the maximum of their ability to assume responsibility.

5. There is existing at this time in each United Nations displaced persons camp a dual set-up.

6. In addition to this balanced UNRRA team, we have at this time an officer as camp commander in each camp. The presence of a military camp commander tends to limit the initiative and executive authority of the UNRRA camp Director. In addition, the UNRRA Area Director, who works on a Division level, finds his administration of the teams under his jurisdiction hampered, and their morale becoming more and more difficult to maintain. This is directly attributable to the fact that the military is unwilling to turn over to the UNRRA team director the responsibility for the administration of the camp. It is therefore recommended:

a. That where in the opinion of the Military Government Area Commander a specific camp is sufficiently well established and the UNRRA team therein is considered properly qualified, the Military Camp Commander be removed, and that military supervision of this specific camp revert to the Division level through the UNRRA Area Director.

b. That this process be continued as it proves its feasibility, until all United Nations camps are being operated by UNRRA teams supervised by their Area Director.

The complexities of this matter are fully appreciated in making the above recommendations. It is felt, however, that the following points in favor of such action should receive consideration:

a. It will be a credit to the United States Forces in Austria if we are able to pilot our relations with UNRRA toward a successful UNRRA operation.

b. It will immeasurably boost the morale of the UNRRA teams if we place on them the responsibilities which they anticipated would be theirs when they entered the camps, and which the better class of personnel in UNRRA is so anxious to assume. It is also felt that this is in keeping with policies of the United Nations.



c. The Military Government Area Commanders will not lose in any way their fundamental rights or authority within their respective areas. They will have an UNRRA staff working closely with their Division Staff, and any number of inspectors or field supervisors may be employed by the military to keep constantly aware of the camp situation.

d. The saving in military personnel should be of material benefit to the occupational forces.

e. Minor difficulties or deficiencies in the organization, personnel, training, etc. of UNRRA can be exposed, as well as minor deficiencies of the military in its dealings with UNRRA, at such an early time in the over-all operation that they can be corrected without undue hardship.

f. The execution of this small-scale operative change is directly in pursuance of the ultimate objective. Unless we are prepared to step forward now there appears no likelihood of a constructive progress to be made in the relations with UNRRA within the next six months.

7. This subject has been discussed with Major General Harry J. Collins, Commanding the 42nd Division Military Government of Land Salzburg. He has already turned over two camps to UNRRA, withdrawing his military camp commander from each. He had ordered the turn-over of several others but has decided to await developments in Germany, where there has been criticism of UNRRA's alleged failure properly to administer certain displaced persons camps. General Collins is entirely in favor of the general principle set forth in the present memorandum.

8. Major General Macon, Commanding the 83rd Division, Military Government of Land Upper Austria, has also been interviewed on this subject. He will assign one or two camps in his area to UNRRA on an approval basis, that is, he will see how they get on without an officer present as camp commander. If the work goes well other camps will be similarly turned over.

9. Both Division Commanders appreciate the military personnel saving feature of the idea.
