Clinics: Prenatal clinic supervised by DP gynecologist - all pregnant woemen seen at regular intervals.

Children clinic: all sick children seen. In the morning - well babies and children examined at regular intervals, weights checked and child inoculated if necessary.

Visited Wolkering Camp with pediatrician; all children seen - arrangements made for the Pediatrician to visit the camp every two weeks. Children to be sent to central clinic for weight check. Monthly, as no scales available for Wolkering camp. Camp sanitation good.

Health visitors visiting homes regulary. These visitors ^{an} acquisition to the children clinic - working as liason officers between the home and clinic. Meeting every week to discuss problems.

Immunisations: Neudorf camp, free living DPs (case typhoid fever reported.) Visited camp once weekly for three weeks. 90 people inoculated for typhoid and typhus.

Transient camp inspected. Repair to ~~toilets~~ and other fixtures urgently needing attention, not a sufficient number of beds to cope with the daily influx of people. Written report sent to Director re these matters.

Von der Tann Casernen - new Latvian and Ukrainian camp - inspected, to supervise cleanliness and disinfection of all billets and washrooms etc. Sanitation unsatisfactory until all ^{sanitary} billets in good repair. Kitchens inspected with Miss Bridges, messing officer. Arrangements in progress to commence serving hot milk to children twice daily. All kitchen workers measured for overalls. Clinic progressing slowly owing to lack of paint & equipment.


