### NOTICE

This schedule is the only official price bulletin for commodities sold or transferred to claimants by Commodity Credit Corporation and is for the use only of employees of the Department of Agriculture and claimants serviced - foreign governments, other foreign purchasers or their agents and private relief organizations.

Prices of commodities not usually handled by the Commodity Credit Corporation and, therefore, not listed in this schedule, will be quoted on application to the Director, Office of Foreign Program Coordination.

This schedule does not include prices on transactions involving the purchase of an assortment of commodities, usually in small quantities, in fulfillment of a single requisition. Such transactions are classed as "Market Basket Purchases." Sales or transfers made under these arrangements will be invoiced at prices specifically determined by the Treasurer.

The unit dollars and cents sales prices and prices established by the use of formulas do not provide for the recoupment of ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES incurred by the Department of Agriculture in furnishing commodities in fulfillment of requisitions. A surcharge of 1%, when applicable, will be computed and included in the invoiced price.

Dollars and cents unit sales prices and prices developed by the use of formulas, though they do not include certain forwarding fees, stevedoring costs, etc., cover delivery f.a.s. port with the exception that bulk commodities are delivered f.o.b. vessel.

The Commodity Credit Corporation reserves the right to change any prices in the schedule through the issuance of ADVICE OF CHANGE IN SCHEDULE OF COMMODITIES AND SALES PRICE QUOTATIONS to make additions to, or corrections in, the schedule.

The Vice President of Commodity Credit Corporation in charge of Fiscal and Inventory Control is the only official or employee authorized to make sales at prices differing from those established in this schedule.



## SECTION I

### SCHEDULE OF SPECIAL NOTICE COMMODITIES

The Commodity Credit Corporation does not pursue the policy of establishing advance sales price quotations on the following list of commodities. Such commodities are priced in accordance with the formulas described below:

### FORMULAS

1. Commodities listed above delivered f.a.s. (other than leaf tobacco, refined sugar delivered outside continental United States, soybeans, and raw sugar delivered f.a.s., and ammonium nitrate delivered f.o.b.)
  - a. When purchased specifically to meet requirements - The cost of the commodity including an amount estimated by the Branch Director to cover storage, handling, transportation, demurrage or other direct costs, plus  $\frac{1}{2}\%$  to cover damage, deterioration and other contingencies.
  - b. When not purchased specifically to meet requirements - The market price of the commodity current at time and place of delivery plus an amount estimated by the Branch Director to cover demurrage, overtime or other unusual out-of-pocket expenses incurred in handling the commodity, plus  $\frac{1}{2}\%$  to cover damage, deterioration and other contingencies.
2. Leaf tobacco delivered f.a.s. - Costs including storage, handling, transportation, demurrage and other direct costs, plus 3% per annum from the date of payment of such costs to the date of delivery of the tobacco.
3. Refined sugar delivered outside continental United States, and soybeans, and raw sugar delivered f.a.s. - The cost of the commodity, including an amount estimated by the Branch Director to cover storage, handling, transportation, demurrage or other direct costs, plus  $\frac{1}{2}\%$  to cover damage, deterioration and other contingencies.
4. Ammonium nitrate delivered f.o.b. - Transfers of ammonium nitrate to any claimant, f.o.b. the producing plant, will be priced on the same basis as ammonium nitrate delivered f.a.s. (Formula #1) except that the mark-up of  $\frac{1}{2}\%$  for damage, deterioration and other contingencies will be waived.



SECTION IISCHEDULE OF STOCK PILE COMMODITIES

This listing includes all commodities sold or transferred by Commodity Credit Corporation for which advance dollars and cents prices are quoted.

Unit prices are per net pound avoirdupois unless otherwise indicated. In converting to avoirdupois weight from cases or liquid and dry measure, the official conversion tables of the Commodity Credit Corporation are employed except in those instances involving commodities not adaptable to uniform conversion factors, in which event the actual net avoirdupois weight will be used. Since the price quoted is determined on this basis, all transferees will be invoiced accordingly.

The terms "M Tablets," "M Capsules," and "M Units" appearing in the column headed "Unit of Quotation" refer respectively to "Thousand Tablets," "Thousand Capsules," and "Million Units." The letters "N.Q." appearing in the column headed "Unit Price" indicate that no quotation was available at the time the schedule was issued.

In line with the discussions during the meeting in my office February 21, 1946, at the present time a procedure has been instituted and a form devised, namely PMA 108, in which requests for adjustments to requisitions will be made by this Department and such approved requests processed adjusting our accounts. Up to this time approximately 50 of these forms have been processed. In addition, controls have been established to prohibit processing new or additions to requisitions where there are not sufficient funds available for such requisitions. A complete review is also being made on the status of deliveries on all UNRRA requisitions in order to process forms PMA 108 to eliminate any overdrafts.

It is believed that with the steps outlined above the major portion of the discrepancies now contained in reports should be eliminated.

They are not interested in, and cannot take new business until fall, and, as a matter of fact, take such a gloomy view of things that, if the coal strike continues, they will very shortly shut down.

My suggestion is therefore that, in order to get this commodity to the UNRRA countries who are greatly in need of soap, we must accept any container that is available, which will of course be approved by Ocean Shipping. I will even agree to accepting wooden boxes. As a matter of fact I consider the only objection to wooden boxes is the price. Under these circumstances I am submitting to you an amendment to my original requisition stating that I will accept this commodity in whatever containers are available. You may take this letter as a forerunner to the amendment.

## UNRRA Director Fiorello LaGuardia, In Burlington, Declares 500,000,000 People Are Facing Starvation Deaths



His Address Before  
Vt. Emergency Food  
Program for Famine  
Relief Committee  
Is Broadcast Over  
Nation-Wide Network

Fiorello LaGuardia, in his first public address as director of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, yesterday told the advisory committee of the Vermont emergency food program for famine relief that 500,000,000 persons are facing starvation deaths in Europe and Asia and called for immediate shipment abroad of vast quantities of food. He spoke at 11 in the Waterman building of the University of Vermont over a nation-wide radio network.

"There never have been so many hungry at one time in the history of mankind," said the former New York mayor.

In urging that 700,000 tons of wheat must be shipped a month, LaGuardia said that otherwise "we as Americans will be ashamed of ourselves as long as history can be read."

### Could Be Mass Starvation

"Unless we can ship large supplies for delivery this month," he said, "there will be mass starvation deaths in Poland, Yugoslavia, Greece and Italy," adding that while he was willing to head the international relief agency, he refused to be "head mortician of an international undertakers establishment."

In addition to calling upon western farmers to make stored wheat available immediately, LaGuardia appealed to eastern dairy farmers to increase production.

"To keep up the high traditions of the American farmer," he said, "We should be willing to assume the responsibility of feeding the hungry people."

### Scores Wheat Hoarders

He scored any Americans who were hoarding wheat while waiting for higher prices and added: "To a few certain Americans, I say if it becomes any American to begrudge this measly help we are giving to the world."

In asserting that 700,000 tons of wheat should be shipped a month, LaGuardia said recent shipments were: 425,000 tons in January, less than that amount in February, and 327,000 tons in March.

LaGuardia said 200,000,000 in Europe and 300,000,000 in China were starving. He said that this month 100,000 tons of wheat were needed in Poland, 80,000 in Greece and 250,000 in Italy, but that UNRRA's present supply could furnish only 30,000, 27,000 and 80,000 tons to those countries, respectively.

He said Russia was sending some wheat to Poland and France and is expected to help Yugoslavia.

Originally scheduled to arrive here on an airlines plane at 10:15, LaGuardia landed at the airport an hour earlier in Secretary of the Navy Forrestal's plane manned by marine personnel and was met there by Mayor John J. Burns and city officials.

## Reception at Mayor's Office

Following breakfast in the Hotel Vermont, the former New York mayor attended an informal reception in Mayor Burns' office and then went to the office of John S. Millis, UVM president. His radio speech was attended by a large crowd which jammed the student lounge of the Waterman building.

At a press conference conducted immediately following the broadcast, LaGuardia told newspaper representatives he would know in a few days whether Argentina will provide wheat for the UNRRA. He said he has a personal representative in Argentina now.

He called for careful sugar consumption and emphasized that "the sugar situation is very tight." The ex-mayor will go abroad as soon as he obtains necessary food from this country, he told the press. If the UNRRA ends at the end of the year, control of the organization may go to the U. N., LaGuardia said.

Accompanying the UNRRA director to Burlington was H. E. Caustin, British representative to the organization and the director's assistant. He spoke briefly at the luncheon. M. S. Novik of New York, the ex-mayor's radio representative, also was present.

While visiting Mayor Burns' office, LaGuardia was asked if he would like to make a tour of the building. The "Little Flower's" reply was "I don't want to go through another city hall as long as I live."

## Given 20-Pound Turkey

A. H. Schmidt of Brandon, a representative of the Vermont Turkey Growers' Association, presented LaGuardia with a 20-pound turkey at the luncheon. Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Thompson of Colchester, representatives of the Vermont Maple Sugar Makers' Association, gave the director some maple syrup and cream.

## Farmers Must Produce To Limit

Frank Branon of Fairfax, chairman of food production in the Vermont famine relief program, speaking at the luncheon, emphasized that farmers must work to the limit of their capacity to in next few months (and eat enough food to keep them at top working capacity); and that there will be no surplus of any food produced in Vermont this year.

He predicted that there will be an increase in small grains and corn, also in fruit and vegetables. He hoped for a bumper crop of fruit but noted that it depends on the weather. Farmers will be urged to expand vegetable production and city and village dwellers will be asked to plant victory gardens.

Poultry is likely to be in shorter supply by fall as the tendency is to cut down on the number of birds, and the same is true of turkeys. There is also a trend toward smaller dairy herds and lower production per cow. This is all due to the difficulty in getting grain for feed and there is little hope of improving the situation except through increasing production of our own small grains.

It is possible, Branon said, that reduction in livestock is justified by the fact that hungry people may live longer from eating feed than would be the case if the same grain is fed to animals for food. But Vermont farmers will do their best to reach production goals, Branon declared.

Soule called upon his state directors of operating committees — A. F. Heald of public relations; Miss Marjorie E. Luce, food conservation; Frank Branon, food production; Helene LeBaron, food preservation; State Commissioner of Agriculture Stanley Judd, conservation of dairy and poultry feed, and Harry Watling, conservation of fats and oils. Each outlined plans for organization of that part of the program for which his or her committee is responsible.

## Eat Slice of Bread Less a Day

Soule, who has organized the committees for the emergency food program, said it has been figured that if each Vermont consumer eats one less slice of bread per day from now until July 1, it will result in saving the 60,700 bushels of wheat which Vermont is expected to save as its quota during the next three months. The people of this state also are asked to save 225,000 pounds of edible fats and oils in this calendar year. This is a personal challenge to each Vermonter, he declared.

Elbert S. Brigham, former state commissioner of agriculture and late congressman from Vermont, now president of the National Life Insurance Company, spoke briefly, telling of the voluntary food-saving program instituted by Herbert Hoover during and following the first world war. Brigham said he believed the American people will cooperate equally well today when they understand the tremendous need.

Other speakers were Raymond Payette of the Vermont Bakers' Association, and Lafayette Patter-

## Wartime Nutrition Studies Seen As Aid To Present Food Problems

By EDITH M. BARBER

Some amazing reports of nutrition research which continued to be carried out in occupied countries are now being given to the world. From Holland come the findings of the Institute of Nutrition which was founded at the end of the first world war. The committee which surveyed the health of the Dutch people was called the Pulse Commission, because it was realized even when food was plentiful that the committee held a "finger on the pulse of the nation."

During the war, the research was naturally centered upon the few available foods. Because of the lack of citrus fruits which had been imported, effort was made to increase the acreage for potatoes in order to reduce the danger of scurvy. The epidemics of scurvy which once occurred at the end of every winter in western Europe have disappeared since the introduction of the potato. Further research during the war showed that the potato as well as being a source of ascorbic acid (Vitamin C) was also a good contributor of thiamine, one of the members of the B complex. The protein content was studied and found to be of unexpectedly good quality.

Bread has always been the chief article of food in Holland, but most of the wheat had been imported. The national bread was necessarily a mixture of two-thirds rye and one-third wheat. From this, as much as possible of the natural mineral and vitamin content was preserved, but at the same time, consideration of the suitability of the flour for making a palatable easily digestible bread was not forgotten.

Comparisons of nutritive value of fortified margarine and butter

were carried on, and results seemed to show that butter contains a substance which promotes growth slightly better than the types of Vitamin A and D which were used in the fortification of point was made in regard to cheese, as processed cheese was found to retain practically all of the vitamin content of natural cheese.

Replying to your memorandum of 13 April regarding letter of 2 April from Lt. Colonel S. E. Cotnam of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, which is returned herewith.

The only difficulty we are aware of regarding the returned and signed consignees receipts by this office is that occasionally there is a delay of a few days before we receive from the warehouse our receipts.

As to the several examples pointed out in the letter our records indicate that on Car GMO 8903 actual delivery was made to Beard's Erie Basin on 30 August and the receipt transmitted to the D.O.A. on 4 September. On Car WFE 63789 received at warehouse 6 September, receipt to D.O.A. 7 September. On car RPRX 100 received warehouse 6 March receipt to D.O.A. 26 March. On Car RI 13099, this car arrived at New York 7 February was ordered to Pier 4, Weehawken but New York Central did not comply and evidently made delivery to shipside in our name and we transmitted the consignees receipt on 27 March.

Our record of delivery to the D.O.A. of these receipts are carried on the extra copy and we are confident of its accuracy. Further we have frequent calls from the D.O.A. here tracing receipts and when we advise that our records indicate they have been transmitted they send over duplicates which we sign, why this was not done in the instances reported here I do not know.

As to our inquiry why we must sign duplicates their plea is that the originals transmitted are mislaid in their records. However, all in all when we consider that from the period August through to March represented here we have signed more than 1,000 of these receipts I believe the record is fair.

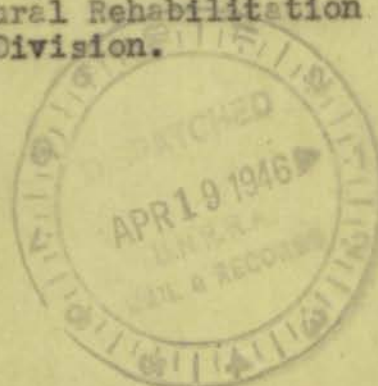

Dear Sir:

The Livestock Consultants with UNRRA have found that a number of sellers do not have adequate facilities for giving individual attention to cattle which are being inspected for carload shipment. UNRRA officials recommend that these facilities be provided at every shipping point where cattle are inspected in the future.

It is essential that the men who pass on these cattle should have an opportunity to see the animal clearly from all sides. Facilities for cutting every animal individually through a gate or through a shoot where the general confirmation of the animal maybe observed.

Heretofore, it has been necessary to go into sheds which were sometimes inadequately lighted and also in box stalls and corral pens where individual observation was impossible. In the future, we wish to recommend that these cattle are penned so that distinct, individual observation can effectively be made. If these cattle are approved or rejected the pens must be provided so that they are immediately placed in either a rejected or receiving pen.

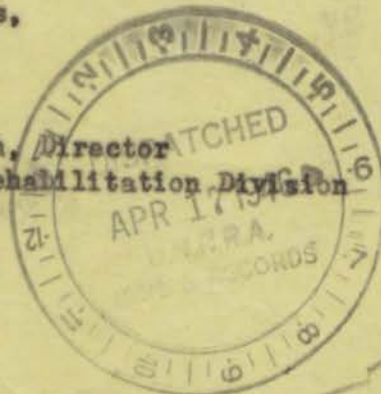

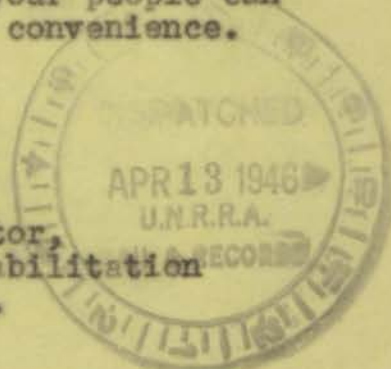

I wish to acknowledge your letters of 23rd February, 19th March and 29th March, and I wish to give you in the following paragraphs my understanding of the final arrangements regarding copra from the Philippines and coconut oil and soybean oil from the United States.

1. Copra from the Philippines. It is understood by us that you will endeavor to load the steamer CIPREA in the Philippines with 7,000 tons of copra for Italy. This ship, if not already loaded, will load in the very near future.

2. Coconut oil and soybean oil, from the United States. We understand that there is approximately 1500/2000 tons of soybean oil on the Atlantic Coast. We are endeavoring to arrange for this quantity to be loaded on the SS TALISSE for Rotterdam to be re-shipped to Czechoslovakia. The coconut oil on the Pacific coast is approximately 7,000 tons. You will endeavor to secure sufficient babassu oil to fill a tanker of approximately 9500 tons capacity.

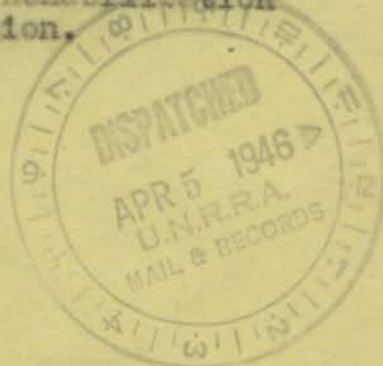

1. Substitute for rice suggested only because of shortages and your suggestion. We will accept any food which will help prevent famine. In Central China hundreds of people are dying every day from starvation. 370,000 tons rice desperately needed and is our minimum requirements. Other grains are not a substitute for rice. They are an alternative to supplement our small allocation.
2. Minister of Food has advised Dr. Soong during Olmsteads trip to Chungking that 2,000,000 piculs rice may be available for export from Szechuen to Hunan. It has not moved because transportation is not available. Swenson and Olmstead got agreement from FLC in Manila to sell 50 FS boats to UNHRA for \$115,000 each. These are shallow draft high powered cargo boats and could probably be used to transport this rice. They cannot be used until we can employ foreign crews as requested teletype conversation from Manila.
3. China unable meet urgent need rice even with 370,000 tons minimum requirement from UNHRA. The only surplus rice in China is in Szechuen. It cannot be moved until transportation available and people are now starving in Kwangsi, Hunan, Hopeh. These areas can best be supplied by shipment via Kowloon and Handow. We are now able to make shipments via these routes. We advised you of Szechuen surplus to emphasize immediate need for shipping. It amounts however to only 100,000 tons and many authorities doubtful obtaining much at present. It is not nearly enough to meet urgent critical needs of war devastated area in Central China alone.

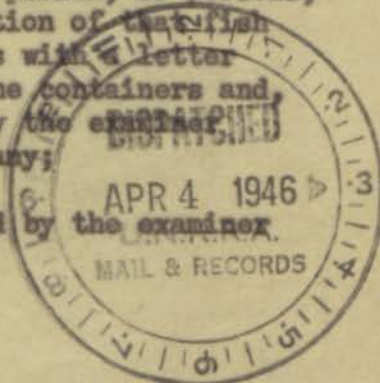

1. A decision relative to the suggestion made in earlier discussions and correspondence that we give consideration to assuming the contracts held by the Commodity Credit Corporation for the purchase of salted fish in Peru, has been delayed pending the return from South America of Mr. G.L. Peterson, Chief of the Fish and Codliver Oil Branch of the Food Division of UNRRA.
2. On the basis of information now at hand, we have concluded that it would be inadvisable for UNRRA to assume the aforementioned contracts. We are, however, prepared to take over, from the Commodity Credit Corporation, all the fish produced on these contracts after arrival in the U.S. at 8¢ and 10¢ per lb. in large and small barrels respectively, plus cost of freight and other usual handling charges. The price of 8¢ and 10¢ per lb. is understood to be f.o.b. Peruvian shipping point and is for net weight of fish exclusive of water and salt.
3. This offer is subject to receipt of a letter from the U.S. Department of Agriculture assuring us that the following terms and conditions will be met:
  - (a) that the U.S. Department of Agriculture have each lot of fish arriving in the U.S. examined by a person, or persons, qualified to pass judgment on the condition of that fish as well as the containers and furnish us with a letter stating the condition of the fish and the containers and, in addition, the recommendations made by the examiner regarding necessary reconditioning, if any;
  - (b) that such measures as may be recommended by the examiner.

for putting the product and containers in each lot in good condition for export, will be complied with and without cost to UNRRA;

- (c) that the services of Dr. Harvey C. MacMillen, under whose supervision the fish purchased on these contracts are produced, be continued during the life of these contracts. Mr. Peterson reports that Dr. MacMillen is performing an outstanding job in Peru and that the expense which might be involved in checking, weighing, reconditioning, or any other reconditioning, as well as the quality of the fish itself, will be reduced to a minimum if his services are continued.

4. It is understood that this offer applies to the lots of Peruvian and Chilean fish which have now arrived in the U.S. since our letter of 20th February in which we agreed to take over the supplies of bonito fillets then in warehouse in the U.S.

5. We shall cooperate with you to the fullest extent in all measures to effect rapid transfer of title and to reduce handling charges from the time of arrival in the U.S. until taken over by UNRRA.

Dear Roy:

I am very sorry that a previous engagement which I could not change made it impossible for me to attend yesterday's conference with you. However, Mr. Viton has given me a detailed account of the discussion.

As I understand it, it was agreed, at your suggestion, that there be established a working party on food with the following functions:

- (1) To prepare for use by the Combined Food Board commodity committees periodic overall surveys of food conditions in all countries, indicating the per capita caloric consumption and the approximate composition of foods consumed in the various countries in terms of calories, especially by the non-farm population.
- (2) After the CFB makes an allocation recommendation to UNRRA, this working party, of which UNRRA is of course to be an integral part, will submit a recommended breakdown of the allocation among the UNRRA claimants for the guidance of the Administration.

I am writing to tell you that, in my opinion, your suggestion represents a constructive step in the direction of closer, more integrated relations between the CFB and UNRRA. The first function of the committee should make it possible to avoid a large proportion of the controversies as to the factual situation in various countries, which have proved so troublesome at meetings of the commodity committees. Under this arrangement, the committees will at least have agreed basic consumption data from which to proceed. Furthermore, each committee will be able to examine its commodity allocation problems in relation to the total overall food situation in each country, and to consider these facts before recommending an allocation, together with the numerous other factors less amenable to statistical measurement which have to be taken into consideration.

As to the second function of the committee, I am confident that this will make it possible for all of us to do a much more effective job. A great deal of misgivings which now exist among commodity committees of the CFB, and which could not but have some influence on the allocation recommendations made to UNRRA, will be effectively eliminated by means of this organization.

I am taking the matter up with the other members of the CFB and I would appreciate it if you would be so kind as to nominate UNRRA's representative. 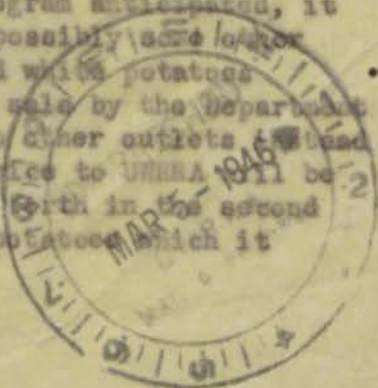

In order to enable the lowering of the cost of processing, it has been agreed that specifications and packaging standards could be adjusted from those applicable in other contracts, such as those of the U. S. Army. UNRRA will rely upon the Department of Agriculture for the handling of these technical aspects, with the understanding that the dehydrated white potatoes to be furnished will be a good edible product, packed in containers suitable for export.

While our requisition covers the maximum dehydration program anticipated, it is understood that Great Britain and India, as well as possibly some other countries, may desire to purchase some of the dehydrated white potatoes produced. In that event, UNRRA has no objection to the sale by the Department of Agriculture of potatoes covered by the requisition to other outlets, provided of to UNRRA. It is understood that in such case, the price to UNRRA will be reduced proportionately on the basis of the figures set forth in the second paragraph, so as to reflect only the proportion of the potatoes which it acquires.
