FORM AIRPORT AND STADIUM

1. ENCLOSED FIND A CONSOLIDATED LIST OF ALL AMMUNITION SEIZED FROM THE AIRPORT AND THE STADIUM BY THE CANADIAN CONTINGENT. THESE ITEMS ARE NOW STORED AT 3 CSG. IT IS REQUESTED THAT BRITCON EXAMINE THE CONDITION AND STORAGE OF THE AMMUNITION.
2. THE AMMUNITION AT 3 CSG AND THE RECENTLY INSPECTED AMMUNITION AT THE AIRPORT WILL BE DISTRIBUTED TO THE VARIOUS CONTINGENTS.
3. LOG COORD CELL IS STILL WAITING ON THE FINAL LIST OF THE AMMUNITION A THE AIRPORT. EARLIEST NOTIFICATION OF THE QUANTITIES AND NATURES AT THE AIRPORT WOULD BE APPRECIATED.

SUBJECT: RECCE REPORT ON HPZ AND GISENYI-RUHENGERT ROUTE

1. Maj Kirschner and Capt Demers visited the HPZ and the Gisenyi area from 21 aug 1994 to 23 aug 94. The route was as follow: Kigali, Gitarama, Butare, Gikongoro, Cyangugu, Kibuye, Gisenyi, Goma, Ruhengeri, Kigali. Contact was made with UNMOs in Gikongoro, Cyangugu, Kibuye and Gisenyi.

2. KIGALI-GIKONGORO:

a. At Km 69 minus 50 meters on the route to Butare HAC recce discovered 15 bodies killed execution style in the ditch on the right side of the road. Most of the 4 to 6 weeks old bodies were killed with their arms tied behind their back (rope around the elbows).

b. The RPF border check point for the HPZ was quiet. Some displaced persons (DPs) were observed at the border and were in the process of being searched by the RPA soldiers before being allowed to go on to BUTARE.

c. Road between HPZ border to Gikongoro was quiet with very little DPs movement. Situation in Gikongoro is quiet with no apparent mass exodus towards Cyangugu. According to UNMO in this location, during the hand over period between UNAMIR and OP TURQUOISE, DPS left for Cyangugu.

3. GIKONGORO-CYANGUGU:

a. HAC recce witnessed about 4000 DPs on the road, concentrated on the second half of the route. According to the UNMO team leader in Cyangugu a flow of 15000 DPs/day for the period of 18 to 20 aug 1994 arrived in Cyangugu. He expected this number to go down to 10000 DPs/day for the period of 21 to 23 aug 1994.

b. After discussion with UNHCR, 4 transition camps have been identified: MURURU (capacity of 15-20000 DPs, 2 Km from Cyangugu); CYIMBOGO (6 Km from Cyangugu); MUSHAKA (24 Km from the city) and MASHA. UNHCR rep indicated that only 600 DPs were presently in the MURURU camp. Attempts to persuade the DPs to move into the camps were met by refusal. The main reason being strong opposition and propaganda from the ex-RGF leadership and the fact that many of the DPs have family already in BUKAVU.

c. Border check point RUZIZI 1 & 2 were closed on 19

and 20 aug 1994. After intervention by the UNHCR, RUZIZI 2 check point was opened late in the afternoon of the 21 aug 1994. UNHCR organized transport from RUZIZI 1 to RUZIZI 2 in the morning of the 22 aug 1994 and were also organizing with the help of various NGOs transport from the border to the camps in BUKAVU area.

d. Current official authority in Cyangugu rest with Maj Cyiza, an ex-gendarmerie officer with probable ties with the RPF. His force is about 100 strong with small arms. He used to assist the OP TURQUOISE forces with the counter-banditry activities in the area and he does not seem to be able to control ex-militias which were seen carrying weapons among the DPs.

4. CYANGUGU-KIBUYE:

a. No DPs movement was observed on this route by the HAC recce.

b. Locals interviewed indicated that there was a fear of the RPF but as long as UNAMIR maintains a presence in the area DPs intend to stay. They also indicated that food is becoming short, medical care is presently not sufficient for the needs of the DPs. Radio Rwanda (RPF) is reaching Kibuye area since last week.

c. Situation in Kibuye is calm but Senegal Bat CO indicated that more food and more medical care is required in order to keep the situation stable.

5. KIBUYE-GISENYI:

a. HAC recce could not observe any large concentration or troop movement of RPA soldiers. Situation at border HPZ is very calm, only 3 small RPA check points along the road. No clearances were required in order to cross the border.

6. GISENYI/GOMA CITY AREA:

a. Situation in Gisenyi is calm. Almost no refugee movement.

b. Situation in Goma city area is normal. City is completely clear of refugees. HAC recce could not observed any refugees coming in or out at border check point.

7. GISENYI-RUHENGERI-KIGALI:

a. The road between Gisenyi and Ruhengeri is calm, DPs and local population are using the medical facilities along the road in large numbers. Business traffic is back on the road

and HAC recce observed numerous small markets and "kiosks". People seems to be going back to the fields.

b. Road to Kigali from Ruhengeri is also calm. DPs movement, in small numbers, was observed going both ways along this axis.

8. CONCLUSION: After initial shock of the OP TURQUOISE withdrawal the people in the HPZ have accepted UNAMIRs presence as a viable replacement for OP TURQUOISE troops. Fear of the RPA moving in have been proven wrong. Situation in Cyangugu is still tense and UNHCR is going against UNAMIR's policy by providing transport to BUKAVU for the DPs. The largest problem, besides food and medical care, for the DPs is the lack of contact with the RPF authorities to counter act the RGF propaganda, as the refugees in the camps in Bukavu and Goma are being held hostage by ex-RGF authorities. If we are to keep the DPs in the area of Kibuye and Gikongoro we have to increase our efforts to bring food, medical care and communication to this area.



SUBJECT: OPS ROOM DUTY OFFICERS

1. Before my departure home on the 12 Jul 94, there were 5 officers performing duty in the Ops Room. Out of the 5, two are staff officers while the other three are MILOBS.
2. On my return, I was informed that 2 of the three MILOBS are on CTO/Leave while one of the two staff officers, Capt Leblanc had been posted to the Log Branch wef 6 Aug 94 with Capt Nani also a MILOB as his replacement.
3. As the cross posting of Capt Leblanc from Ops to log and Capt Nani from Log to Ops has not been formalized, MILOB GP HQ is asking Capt Nani to return to their HQ.
4. This development leaves only 2 officers to perform duties in the Ops Room.
5. It is kindly requested that the Canadian Contingent be asked to provide one officer to replace Capt Leblanc as soon as possible.

RECONNAISSANCE MISSION REPORT

43

INTRODUCTION

1. The conquest of Kigali and Butare by the Rwanda Patriotic Front created the displacement of population and establishment of refugee camps along and around the routes Kigali - Gitarama. Butare and Burundi border. This necessitated the need to determine Humanitarian requirements for these displaced populace. The rapid reaction teams with G2 were tasked with determining Humanitarian Requirement along and around these routes.

AIM

2. The aim of this report is to highlight the Humanitarian requirement of towns, villages and refugee settlements along and around the routes of Kigali - Gitarama - Butare - Burundi frontier.

OBJECTIVES

3. The teams conducted reconnaissance patrol in conjunction with RPF guides along and around the routes KIGALI - GITARAMA - BUTARE - BURUNDI FRONTIER.

EXECUTION

4. The teams departed from Kigali at 1330 hrs due to late clearance from the RPF and was joined at Ruyenzi by 2 RPF guides. The teams visited 5 camps namely Ruyenzi, Runda, Taba, Save, Butare and Burundi Frontier.

OBSERVATIONS

5. The teams observed that the roads along the routes were in good conditions and accessible by wheeled and tracked vehicles from Kigali to Burundi Frontier. The conditions of the routes and routes were good mostly tarmacked.

6. The team noted that some of the refugee camps were situated along the major road namely Rehenzi, Runda and Butare while others were off the major roads. These include Taba and Save.

7. The team observed that along the routes some towns and village were deserted while some others are occupied. In the towns and villages occupied are the 2 major tribes of Hutus and Tutsis but majority are of the Tutsis tribe. The teams was unable to enumerate the actual figure of people but estimated as listed below:

- a. Ruhenzi - About 2000 inhabitants.
- b. Runda Refugee Camp - Deserted.
- c. Taba including Remera - Rukoma - 500.
- d. Save - 5000.
- e. Butare - About 1000 still moving towards save.

8. The team noted that throughout the areas and routes visited, the RPF is in control and providing security. However the provision of food, water, sanitation and hygiene were left to the whims of the refugees. In most of the camps there is no water and where available, it is obtained from very far and not drinkable.

9. At present in all the camps, there is no formal system of government assistance. Also there is no presence of any NGO or humanitarian assistance group.

10. The team discovered that the living conditions of people and refugees in towns, villages and camps are precarious and leaves a lot to be desired, there is no water, food and lack of any form of medical assistance this aggravating the living conditions of the inhabitants and displaced persons.

11. No refugee was located at the Burundi frontier.

NEEDS AND REQUIREMENTS

12. It is of utmost importance that food, water and medical aid and assistance should be provided immediately to the displaced persons and refugees in all the places mentioned.

START OF SUMMARY

1. TEAM RECEIVED A RANGE OF DETAILED BRIEFINGS IN AM AND THEN A TOUR OF KIGALI IN PM AND FINAL DISCUSSIONS WITH FC. DURING THE AM BRIEF WITH FORCE COMMANDER (FC), HE STRESSED THAT THE DEPLOYMENT OF A VIABLE, ABCA TYPE MEDICAL FACILITY IS ESSENTIAL FOR THE SCHEDULED DEPLOYMENT, AND CONTINUING OPERATION OF UNAMIR. HE INDICATED THAT THE NON-AVAILABILITY OF THIS FE WOULD SLOW FURTHER DEPLOYMENTS, WITH SUBSEQUENT POLITICAL IMPACT ON UNAMIR'S ABILITY TO ACHIEVE ITS MANDATE. THIS THEME OF THE IMPORTANCE OF AUSTRALIA'S CONTRIBUTION, AS SOON AS PRACTICABLE, WAS A CONSTANT THEME DURING THE BRIEFINGS. BRIEFINGS ON THE CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS AND THE LOGISTICS SUPPORT PLAN, INDICATE THAT BOTH ARE WORKABLE.

2. WITH THE LIKELIHOOD OF A CEASEFIRE, AND WORKABLE CONCEPTS, ADF PARTICIPATION IN UNAMIR IS VIABLE.

3. FC HAS CONFIRMED THAT AN ASC WOULD FUNCTION AS A COHESIVE GROUP AND HE HAS OFFERED A NUMBER OF HQ POSITIONS TO AUSTRALIA.

END OF SUMMARY

FC MORNING BRIEFING

4. FC CONFIRMED:

A. ASC WOULD OPERATE AS A COHESIVE GROUP, PREFERABLY FROM A PERMANENT HOSPITAL STRUCTURE IN KIGALI. A NUMBER OF SITES WERE VISITED DURING THE AFTERNOON RECON.

B. TASKS OF ASC WILL INCLUDE PROVIDE HEALTH SUPPORT TO THE FORCE AND, WHEN POSSIBLE, PROVIDE HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE.

5. HE SEES THE MEDICAL SUPPORT GROUP AS CLOSELY LINKED TO THE HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE MANDATE OF UNAMIR AND THAT IT WOULD PROVIDE A FOCAL POINT FOR NATIONAL STABILITY AND RE-BUILDING BY OPERATING A HOSPITAL IN KIGALI, THAT BOTH SUPPORTS UNAMIR II AND PROVIDES A DEGREE OF HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE.

6. WE SUBSEQUENTLY DISCUSSED HQ STAFF POSITIONS AVAILABLE FOR AUSTRALIA. COMASC WOULD BE THE FC MEDICAL ADVISER AND HE MAY BE ABLE TO DEPLOY WITH A SMALL MEDICAL STAFF AS PART OF FORCE HQ. FC IS STILL AFTER A LOGISTICS PLANNING GROUP, NOW A MAJOR AND TWO CAPTAINS, AS CANADA IS PROVIDING THE PREVIOUSLY REQUESTED LTCOL.

7. FC IS HAPPY THAT, IF APPROVED, AUSTRALIA WOULD PROVIDE THE FORCE HQ MEDICAL STAFF OF COL(MED) AND TWO SO2s.

CHIEF OPERATIONS OFFICER (COO) BRIEF

8. UNAMIR COO (COL MOEN, BANGLADESH) BRIEFED TEAM ON BACKGROUND TO UNAMIR OPERATIONS AND NEW CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS,

3050.1(00)

BASED ON ZONE CONCEPT MENTIONED IN SITREP NO.2. CONCEPT IS THREE ZONES, WITH UNAMIR SUPERIMPOSED. ZONES ARE RGF/INTERIM GOVERNMENT, RPF AND FRENCH PROTECTED ZONE.

9. THE UNAMIR MISSION REMAINS HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE, USING FIVE BNS. CURRENTLY, ONLY THREE COUNTRIES (GHANA, ZIMBABWE AND ETHIOPIA) HAVE MADE FIRM OFFERS OF TROOPS. MORE INFORMATION MAY BE AVAILABLE AFTER THE 7 JUL TROOP CONTRIBUTORS MEETING IN NEW YORK. UNAMIR HAS STILL NOT RECEIVED OFFERS FOR ENGINEERS OR HELICOPTERS.

10. IN THIS CONCEPT, GHANAIA BN WOULD DEPLOY INTO RGF SECTOR, SECOND BN INTO FRENCH SECTOR AND REMAINING BNS INTO RPF SECTOR. COO REMARKED THAT EVEN IF CEASEFIRE HOLDS, THE POTENTIAL STILL EXISTS FOR GUERRILLA WARFARE TO OCCUR.

11. WITH THE LIKELY COMMENCEMENT OF A CEASEFIRE, THIS CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS IS ASSESSED AS BEING WORKABLE.

ENGINEER BRIEF.

12. TEAM WAS BRIEFED ON MINE THREAT IN NORTHERN RWANDA. BRIEFING NOTES WILL RTA WITH THE TEAM.

HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

13. TEAM WAS BRIEFED BY CHIEF OF HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE CELL, COL YAACHE (GHANA). HE BRIEFED ON UNAMIR SUPPORT FOR DISPLACED PERSONS IN RWANDA, PARTICULARLY KIGALI. CURRENTLY, UNAMIR ONLY HAS ACCESS TO NORTHERN CCAMPS IN RPF HELD AREAS.

14. UNAMIR IS PROVIDING PROTECTION AND FEEDING, STAFFED THROUGH AN OPS AND LIAISON CELL IN UNAMIR HQ. THIS CELL LINKS INTO THE UN RWANDA EMERGENCY OFFICE (UNREO).

15. A LIMITED NUMBER OF NGO'S CONTINUE TO OPERATE IN NORTHERN RWANDA.

16. A COPY OF THE BRIEF WILL RTA WITH THE TEAM.

MILITARY OBSERVERS GROUP

17. 222 UN MILITARY OBSERVERS ARE ASSIGNED TO UNAMIR. CURRENTLY 94 ARE DEPLOYED IN RWANDA PERFORMING ESCORT AND LIAISON TASKS. IT IS PLANNED THAT THEY WILL DEPLOY INTO THE ZONES NOTED ABOVE AS BNS DEPLOY.

LOGISTICS

18. LOGISTICS SUPPORT IS TO BE CONTRACTED TO BROWN AND ROOT. IT IS EXPECTED THAT THIS SUPPORT WILL BE IN COUNTRY BY AUG 94. BROWN AND ROOT WILL PROVIDE:

- A. MOVEMENT FACILITIES AT ENTEBBE.
- B. WATER.
- C. INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT.
- D. ELECTRICITY.
- E. WAREHOUSING.
- F. SECOND AND THIRD LINE TRANSPORT.
- G. BASIC ENGINEER SUPPORT.
- H. A ROAD CONSTRUCTION TEAM.
- I. VEHICLE AND EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE FOR UN SUPPLIED VEHICLES.

19. RATIONS WILL BE PROVIDED BY KANDY(UK).

20. ASC WOULD STILL NEED TO DEPLOY WITH 60 DAYS COMBAT RATIONS.

21. FC DOES NOT SUPPORT THE USE OF DAR ES SALAAM AS A POE, AND RECOMMENDS THE MAXIMUM USE OF AIR FOR INSERTION.

22. NO VEHICLES WILL BE AVAILABLE FOR ANY ASC AS THEY WILL BE ALLOCATED TO DEPLOYED BNS.

23. COMMENT. ALTHOUGH ANY ASC WOULD NEED TO DEPLOY WITH 60 DAYS SELF-SUFFICIENCY, FOR MOST CLASSES OF SUPPLIES, THE LOGISTICS CONCEPT FOR UNAMIR II IS WORKABLE.

CITY RECON

24. TEAM VISITED KING FAISAL HOSPITAL, ICRC HOSPITAL, CENTRAL HOSPITAL IN KIGALI AND THE AIRPORT. THE RECON WAS A SOBERING EXPERIENCE.

25. THE TRAGIC CIRCUMSTANCES OF KIGALI HIGHLIGHT THE NEED FOR UNAMIR AND ITS TASK OF HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE.

RPF ASSESSMENT

26. RPF WERE NOTED IN STRENGTH THROUGHOUT CITY. NO FIRING HAS BEEN HEARD TO DATE AND RPF ARE CLEARLY IN CONTROL OF KIGALI. RECON TEAM ENCOUNTERS WITH RPF HAVE CONFIRMED THE CURRENT GOOD RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN RPF AND UNAMIR. RPF ARE WELL ARMED AND WEAPON MAINTENANCE IS HIGH, REFLECTING GOOD LEVEL OF DISCIPLINE.

27. CURRENT THREAT FROM RPF IS LOW ALTHOUGH POTENTIAL EXISTS FOR INCIDENT TO OCCUR ONCE INITIAL EUPHORIA OF RPF VICTORY SUBSIDES. IT IS LIKELY THAT RPF NUMBERS WILL BE REDUCED IN KIGALI TO AVOID SUCH AN OCCURRENCE.

FINAL DISCUSSION WITH FC

28. FOLLOWING THE CITY RECON, THE TEAM HELD DISCUSSIONS WITH THE FC. HE AGAIN EMPHASISED THE IMPORTANCE OF A MEDICAL SUPPORT GROUP TO THE FUTURE SUCCESS OF UNAMIR.

1. At the refs, I have submitted information concerning the formation of the future UNAMIR MP COY.
2. Specially in light of the fact that the DFC has asked UNNY to consider the deployment to Rwanda of the MP Coy a high priority, I feel obliged to speed the completion of relevant details regarding the formation of the Company, its personnel and equipment requirements, duties, powers and area of operations
3. While refs B and C covered those specific areas, the intend of this Memo is to provide additional details on the composition in manpower of the Company.
4. The MP Coy must be constituted from MP coming from all contributing countries to UNAMIR. In Annexes A to E, I have identified the exact manpower requirement for the Company including those positions which, based on my personal experiences with UN MP Coy should be covered by bilingual (French/English)

Canadian MP. As for the remaining positions, they must be a mixture of MP from the contributing countries. It must, however, be noted that each person posted to the MP Coy must be a qualified policeman being civilian or military and must be capable to speak and write in English. Speaking French would also be very useful.

5. In terms of equipment, while the major requirements have been identified at Annex G to K, there are still a very large amount of smaller items which will be required as soon as the Coy or an element of it deploys. The following are examples:

- a. various signs together with what it is required to "sign" routes; and
 - b. the stationery including proper ledgers and evidence continuation sheets which are required for military police investigation reports.




1. Currently, different operational units of the mission face problems communicating with the local population for the achievement of their mission.
2. In the north, we have a BYUBAT Coy deployed with its three platoons in Kinigi, Kidaho and Nkumba. As they need contact with the locals for performing their patrols and collecting information, they face a language barrier.
3. This same problem occurs in the Byumba area where an Engineer Coy from Bangladesh and another BYUBAT Coy are located with the BYUBAT Battalion staff. Another BYUBAT Coy is deployed in Ngarama.
4. In Kigali, we still face some problem in the UNAMIR Field Hospital; they have one translator but only during working hours and only for five days a week. As you know, illness and injuries have no timings and the Field Hospital is regularly called upon to intervene at night, which means after working hours, or during the weekend. This problem also affects the effective execution of the mission of the Duty Officers.
5. To be able to overcome the communication gap, there is an urgent need to hire local people with verbal communication skills. This calls for the ability to understand and speak English, French and Kinyarwanda. Those selected individuals do not necessarily have to write the three languages. It is believed that you already have a list of Rwandese locals whom you have already tested but yet employ. Of course, locals for the north should be hired nearby the locations of the troops.
6. A rapid check of the above show that about 9 people should be hired as a matter of urgency.





Subject: URGENT OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS

Reference: MILOB 6005 dated 9 March 1994

1. The reference has been reviewed in detail and studied in the greater context of the Force as a whole. You are very correct when you state that cooperation and flexibility are principles of war. Given our present shortages in personnel, vehicles, communications and other equipments, we must cooperate and be flexible in the distribution of these precious resources. In addition, we have to ensure they are deployed in such a manner so as to achieve the greatest possible operational effectiveness.

2. Personnel. The SRSG and the FC have been informed by DPKO in New York that UNAMIR will not receive an authorized increase in personnel with the corresponding budget increase. We can only increase our personnel strength by absorbing the cost within our present inadequate budget. This is highly unlikely, although it is being examined as a possible solution. In addition, the SRSG has supported the FC in his request for 48 more Military Observers for the Southern Sector in his report to the SECGEN for our mandate report of 4 April 1994. Without a BBTG, it is unlikely that this increase in personnel will be authorized. In conclusion, we must plan to accomplish all assigned tasks within our present personnel limits by reallocating personnel and saving positions that are not absolutely critical to the operation.

3. I have reviewed this problem and have some suggestions for a study I want you to prepare for the FC upon his return. These suggestions are:

- a. Cut UNMO teams from 6 to 5 UNMOs.
- b. Cut Sector HQs Rapid Reaction Teams.
- c. Replace some UNMO monitoring teams, specifically in Kigali and the DMZ with OPs from the Bn Recce Platoons.
- d. Discuss with Plans Branch how many assembly points will be required for the demobilization process and seek economies in personnel. For example RPF Sector

could be reduced from 12 to 10 or even 8 points with a savings of two to four teams. Possibly the same could be done in the RGF sector.


4. Consider these options. You are tasked to prepare a detailed UNMO disposition plan, with various options, which will account for each UNMO and match them to all present and foreseen tasks. This plan will be submitted to the FC no later than 30 March 1994. No reallocation of UNMOs from Kigali or DMZ Sector as requested in para 13 of the reference will be approved until the study is completed and a plan is prepared for all present and future taskings. You may reallocate UNMOs from RGF, RPF and Southern Sector. In your study, examine UNOMUR to see if a reorganization could free up some UNMOs.

5. Communications. Your request for a repeater station is approved and I will take up this matter with MGen Kagame at our next meeting. You will be kept informed of any progress in this area that I will treat as an urgent requirement.

6. Vehicles. I will re-examine the vehicle disposition of UNAMIR, but I do not believe that your request for 7 more 4X4 can be made available at present. However, you will be informed in due course of the vehicle redistribution. The issue of repair kits is to be addressed, with a consolidated demand, from your CLogO to the Force CLogO for immediate action. This is a safety question that cannot be delayed.

7. Other Equipment. Your CLogO is to prepare a consolidated and realistic demand for other equipment which you deem to be of an urgent operational necessity. This demand is to be submitted by 30 March 1994.

8. In conclusion, let me state that I appreciate the study and effort that went into the reference. I also appreciate your concern with the safety of your personnel and with your obvious desire to achieve your mission. However, we are operating with severe shortages in all areas and our mutual effort must be to ensure the best possible allocation of our existing resources. Be assured that at Force HQ, staff effort will aim at improving the resource allocation for our field troops.

DAILY PRESS BRIEFING OF OFFICE OF SPOKESMAN FOR SECRETARY-GENERAL

Joe Sills, the Spokesman for the Secretary-General, began today's noon briefing by announcing that the Secretary-General had met at 11 a.m. with Mahmoud Mestiri, Head of the Special Mission to Afghanistan. They had discussed the mission he would be undertaking to that country and the general situation there. The Mission would be in response to General Assembly resolution 48/208, which had asked the Secretary-General to send a mission to "canvass a broad spectrum of Afghanistan's leaders to solicit their views on how the United Nations can best facilitate national rapprochement and reconstruction, and report to the Secretary-General their findings, conclusions and recommendations for appropriate action". The Secretary-General had appointed Mr. Mestiri to head the Mission. Due to the state of security in Afghanistan, no date had yet been set for the trip.

At 11:30 a.m., the Secretary-General was meeting with Mate Granic, Foreign Minister of Croatia. The meeting had been postponed from yesterday. Mr. Granic would talk to the press at 12:30 p.m. at the Delegates Entrance.

Then, at 12:15, the Secretary-General was due to meet the Permanent Representatives of Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden. They would discuss personnel matters. At 12:45 p.m., he would meet with Dr. Mustafa Tolba, the former Head of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP).

He would meet at 4:30 p.m. with Archbishop Renato Raffaele Martino from the Holy See, and at 5:45 p.m., with Sahabzada Yaqub Khan, Special Representative of the Secretary-General for Western Sahara.

Mr. Sills said that a statement released late yesterday from Lord Owen and Thorvald Stoltenberg, Co-Chairmen of the Steering Committee of the International Conference on the Former Yugoslavia, was available in the Spokesman's Office. In addition, briefing notes from Eugene Forson, the acting Spokesman for the United Nations Operation in Somalia (UNOSOM II), were available. They contain information on actions being taken to fight the cholera outbreak there. At least 186 wells, water supplies in 23 schools and three ice factories had been chlorinated. They were also intensifying the water chlorinating programme in the town of Bossaso.

Mr. Sills also announced that the World Chronicle programme would be aired at 2:30 p.m. on in-house channels 6 and 23. It would feature Charles Constantinou, Chief of the Energy and Natural Resources Branch, Department of Policy Coordination and Sustainable Development.

The United Nations International School would be holding its annual conference on 3 and 4 March, Mr. Sills said. Entitled "International Responsibility: Power and Politics", the conference would have a number of panel discussions in the General Assembly Hall. The media were invited. The programme would be posted.

Referring to questions on Srebrenica, Mr. Sills said that a Dutch infantry company had moved there from Tuzla yesterday evening. Two convoys of engineering equipment and a field dressing station had also arrived. The rotation was proceeding later than had been hoped for, but it was, nevertheless, going ahead.

Asked if the presence of former Afghan President Najibullah in the United Nations compound had complicated the planned mission to that country, Mr. Sills said that the two issues were not directly related. It was a long-standing situation, which the United Nations wished to see resolved. The problem with sending the mission at this time was the fighting in Afghanistan.

In response into a question on the staffing of the United Nations offices in Afghanistan, he said that there were some agency personnel west and north of Kabul. He did not believe there was any international staff in the Afghan capital right now, but the Organization was working to send relief supplies into the city. He understood that a convoy was to deliver food there in the last day or so, despite the blockade around the town, but he would have to confirm that.

Asked whether Canadian troops had left Srebrenica, Mr. Sills said that, as far as he knew, they were still there. Asked what had delayed the deployment of Dutch troops, he said that it had been caused by the negotiations which had thus far not been concluded successfully.

On when the Secretary-General's report on Cyprus would be released, Mr. Sills said that it would be out shortly. He still did not have a definite date.

In response to a question citing an article in The New York Times that had suggested the United Nations had stopped pushing for district councils throughout Somalia, Mr. Sills said he had been surprised at that report. The United Nations was still working to set up district and regional councils and the Transitional National Council in Somalia because they were important. There were disagreements on their composition with some, specifically General Mohamed Farah Aidid. Talks were going on to resolve those disagreements.

Replying to a question on whether there had been any sign of the initiative from the Haitian Parliament expected by Dante Caputo, Special Envoy of the Secretary-General for Haiti, Mr. Sills said that he was not aware of any new development of that type. He added that the Secretary-General would meet with Jean-Bertrand Aristide, the President of Haiti, at 11 a.m. on Saturday, 5 March. He would prefer to await the outcome of that meeting before making further statements.

In response to a question on the recent deployment of Malaysian troops in Bosnia and Herzegovina, he said that he needed to get more reliable numbers on the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR) troops. He would try to have a note to correspondents on that later.

Asked whether sanctions on Croatia would be lifted as a result of calls for such an action being made by the Washington, D.C. talks between Croats and Muslims, Mr. Sills said that, without commenting negatively on those talks, which the Secretary-General had yesterday congratulated, the decision

to lift sanctions was the prerogative of the Security Council. The Council had not taken any action based on the decision made in Washington, or as a follow-up to its call for the withdrawal of Croatian troops.

On whether the Council would meet to pass a resolution on the situation in the occupied territories, he said that discussions on that had been suspended because of disagreements over the wording of a resolution. Members were having bilateral consultations. As of now, there were no plans for consultations of the full Council or a meeting today. That could change, he added. If an agreement on a resolution was reached, the Council could meet very quickly to approve it. (Note: Later in the afternoon, the Council announced that it would meet on the situation in the occupied territories.)

On whether there was a United Nations deadline for opening the Tuzla airport, Mr. Sills said there was none. The planning date by which the Organization wanted it opened was 7 March. The word "deadline" had never been used. The United Nations would try to get it open as soon as possible. He added that news from Moscow was also positive in that regard. But there was no firm date as to when the airport would be opened. Yasushi Akashi, the Secretary-General's Special Representative, had in fact been in Tuzla yesterday, and his negotiations on reopening the airport were continuing.

On a successor for Melissa F. Wells, the former Under-Secretary-General for Administration and Management, he said that he expected one to be named shortly. He confirmed that the post was not currently encumbered, in answer to a further question.

Asked if the Russians had requested at the Moscow talks to have their aircraft become the first ones to land at Tuzla, Mr. Sills said that there were press reports on what had happened there and on what the Russians had said. He had seen no official communication. However, as far as he knew, there had been no decision by the UNPROFOR Force Commander on how that would be done. He repeated that there was no certain date for reopening the airport. The question of the necessary staffing to run the airport would also have to be dealt with.

In response to further question on the date for opening the airport, he explained that the 7 March date mentioned by Lieutenant-General Michael Rose and Kofi A. Annan, the Under-Secretary-General for Peace-keeping Operations, was not meant to be an ultimatum. It was a date that was set for planning purposes, but it would most probably not be met.

GENERAL

1. The main body of the Bangladesh Contingent comprising 371 all ranks will arrive in Kigali in two batches tentatively on Saturday 29 Jan 94 and Sunday 30 Jan 94. The two batches will be made up of 187 and 184 all ranks respectively. The exact timings will be communicated when officially confirmed. These instructions are designed for planning purposes for those who would be involved in the reception.

AIM

2. The aim of this plan is to assign responsibilities to concerned appointment holders to ensure a smooth and orderly reception for the main body of the Bangladesh Contingent.

ACCOMMODATION

3. The arrangements for accommodation are detailed below:

a. The Log Coy elements of the main body will be accommodated in the Log Coy location.

b. The Engr Coy will be located at Byumba. The advance party of Engr Coy currently in Amahoro Stadium will be moved to their new location in Byumba. Ops sec is requested to issue necessary instruction in this regard.

c. Med pers will be accommodated in the UNAMIR Field Hospital at King Faisal Hospital.

d. Accommodation is available for Rutbat tps at the Amahoro Stadium, 2IC RUTBAT to coordinate.

FEEDING

4. The advance party comds of the Log Coy, Engr Coy and the Med Pl are to co-ordinate the feeding arrangements in consultation with the CLOGO.

BRIEFING

5. Comds of the advance party coys should co-ordinate the briefing for their main body elements. Assistance in this regard could be obtained through the CMPO.

RESPONSIBILITIES

6. Responsibilities for the reception are detailed below:

a. Force Commander. Gratefully requested to meet the Bangladesh Contingent Commander at the airport on arrival. The ETA will be communicated as soon as it is received.

b. SAO. The SAO is requested to arrange warehousing facilities at the airport for the safe custody of stores and equipment until they can be moved to their final destination.

c. TTAO. The TTAO is requested to make the following arrangements:

(1) Immigration clearance for the troops in conjunction with the OIC MOVCON.

(2) Customs clearance for the stores equipment and personal effects in conjunction with the OIC MOVCON.

(3) Clearance for dangerous cargo, if any.

d. CTO. The CTO is to provide transport as detailed below:

(1) Provide transport to move the advance party of Engrs currently in the Amahoro Stadium to Byumba. The date and time of move will be decided by Ops Sec.

(2) Provide transport to convey Engrs of the main body from the airport initially to AMAHORO Stadium and subsequently to Byumba.

(3) Provide transport to lift the remainder of the main body from the airport to their various destinations in Kigali.

e. Sect Mil Pers Offrs. The Mil Pers Offrs of Kigali and DMZ Sectors are to liaise with the SO Mil Pers Sec for the documentation of the troops.

f. CLO. The CLO is requested to liaise with the RGF on the movement of the Engrs from Kigali to Byumba.

g. CLOGO. The CLOGO is requested to:

(1) Assist the SAO in arranging for warehousing facilities for the stores and equipment.

(2) Arrange for fork lifts to off-load pallets from the aircraft to the warehouses.

(3) Inspect the accommodation secured for the Engrs in the DMZ and to supervise the lodging and feeding of all troops.

(4) Be ready to support the troops on request.

h. OIC MOVCON. The OIC MOVCON is requested to:

(1) Arrange immigration and customs clearance for the personnel and stores respectively in conjunction with the TTAO.



PROPOSAL FOR THE FORMATION OF WORKING GROUPS

Reference: Arusha Peace Agreement, dated 4 August 1993

1. In accordance with the article 79 of the reference, the Joint Commission of Programs will restart its work to consider military aspects of the Arusha Peace Agreement. It is recommended that the Commission form a number of working groups which the Commission requires to meet the demands of the peace process.

2. UNAMIR Force HQ Staff have completed an analysis of the military aspects of the Arusha Peace Agreement and a number of operational, force structure, training, administration and logistics matters must be discussed and agreements obtained from all the concerned parties in order to implement the protocols of the Peace Agreement.

3. It is proposed that the Joint Commission of Programs become the forum for all major military matters through regulations and guidance of work in the Peace Process. This Joint Commission should focus on major issues and direct the work of subordinate working groups who will concentrate on detail. The Joint Commission should be responsible for reviewing and approving the draft agreements reached by subordinate working groups. The Joint Commission in fact become the Level One of the chain of meetings between our respective groups. It is proposed that the structure and meetings of the Joint Commission of Programs be as follows:

- a. Chairmanship-Force Commander or in his absence the Deputy Force Commander\Chief of Staff UNAMIR.
- b. Membership-Chief of Staff of the Rwandese Patriotic Front Forces, the Rwandese Government Forces and the National Gendarmerie.
- c. Meetings be held as required and on call of any of the parties (UNAMIR,RPF, RGF).
- d. Meetings should be held at ~~KM 64 Meeting Location~~ ^{N400301}. Escort and security will be provided by UNAMIR in accordance with present escort procedures. All parties should provide their own logistics support (ie. sport, secretarial, food etc).

4. It is proposed that three working groups be formed. These working groups would be the Level Two of Meetings between our respective groups. These groups would deal with subject areas of national concern and become the forum of detailed work on specific topics. These groups would deal with the following subjects:

5. The aim of these groups would be to discuss and obtain consensus in draft agreements that they would submit to the Joint Commission for approval. A number of preliminary topics are outlined in Annex A to this letter. It is proposed that the structure and meetings of the working groups be as follows:

- a. Chairmanship-Chief Military Plans and Subject Matter experts from UNAMIR.
- b. Membership-Subject Matter Experts from each of the Rwandese Patriotic Front Forces, Rwandese Government Forces and the National Gendarmerie.
- c. Operations and Force Structure Working Group meet every Wednesday at 0900 Hours at KM 64 Meeting Location.
- d. Training Working Group meet every Monday at 1300 Hours at KM 64 Meeting Location.
- e. Administration and Logistics Working Group meet every Friday at 0900 Hours at KM 64 Meeting Location.
- f. Escort and security will be provided by UNAMIR in accordance with present escort procedures. All parties should provide their own logistics support (ie transport, secretarial, food etc).

6. The first order of business will be to prepare a draft work plan for approval of the Joint Commission. Once work plans are approved, the groups will focus on the preparation of draft agreements, on each topic area, for approval by the Joint Commission.


7. Level Three Joint Meetings would be local meetings between respective commanders or staffs on local issues. Procedural and administrative details of these meetings would be worked out by the respective commanders.

8. It is proposed that the working groups commence work with the Operations and Force Structure Working Group with a meeting on 15

December 1993 and the schedule of meetings continue as per paragraph five.

9. The major advantage of this method is that detailed work can be achieved by the working groups, thus allowing the Joint Commission to focus on major issues, while reserving the responsibility of approving all agreements.

10. For the peace process in Rwanda to be successful, a number of urgent issues must be addressed immediately. Your support of this proposal is solicited.

 - c. Deploying the RPF Battalion to Kigali.
 - d. Transforming Army and Gendarmerie Bases into Assembly Points.
 - e. The Disengagement process.
 - f. The movement of troops and their weapons and equipment to their respective assembly and cantonment points.
 - g. Movement of Army and Gendarmerie personnel of the two parties to the integrated training centres.
 - h. Mine Clearance Project.
 - i. Weapons and Ammunition Clearance Project.
 - j. Movement of Army and Gendarmerie personnel from the integrated training centres to their respective bases.

k. RPF Kigali Battalion Demobilization.

l. National Army Units Establishment.

4. The initial issues the Training Working Group should deal with are:

a. Pre-Deployment Training of the RPF Kigali Battalion.

b. Training in Assembly Points.

c. Training of Rwandese Instructors for the Integrated Training Centres.

d. Establishment of the Integrated Training Centres.

e. Training in the Integrated Training Centres.

f. Training of Rwandese Instructors for the National Gendarmerie.

g. Establishment of the National Gendarmerie Training Centre.

SUBJECT: REPORT ON RECCE TO KAGITUMBA

1. The patrol to assess the security situation in the northern border to KAGTUMBA was carried out on 27 Dec 93 by the DCOO Major Diague and Capt Olessongo. The situation in the border area is calm. Only one Refugee camp of Hutus from Tanzania at KABURUNGO camp was seen. The refugees are supported by the KABURUNGO health centre, the Belgian Red cross and the NGO International care. Besides lack of blankets and cooking utensils the condition of these refugees is very satisfactory.

2. Troop Activities There are no troops concentrations in the area except some check points along the road KIGALI - Rwamagana and Kagitumba.

a. KAYONZA. A section of Gendarmes (05) have a permanent road block in the cross - roads Kayonza - Kibungo and Kayonza - KAGTUMBA.

b. KAZIGURO The RGF control post is established in this point about 500 m from the Refugee camps.

c. Cross - Road NGARAMA - KAGTUMBA. An RGF Section of 10 men control this area.

d. Cross - Road NYAGATARE - KAGTUMBA. The check point is controlled at any one time by a detachment 03 soldiers.

e. KAGTUMBA Post. There are two positions on either side of the border. On the Rwandese side an RGF section (-) controls the post. On the Uganda side there is a platoon based there on surveillance this information is according to RGF report.

3. Infrastructure. 8 buildings near the Rwanda border were all destroyed during the post war. None of them has any roof. The road Kigali - Rwamagana - Kagitumba is a standard paved road suitable for movement in any weather.

4. Social The refugees along the side of the road seem to be the main problem in this general area. The effort by the international organisations seems to pay tribute as no major problems have been experienced so far.

5. Conclusion. The reconnaissance patrol was carried out in good condition. The only recommendations are that:

a. There is little traffic in this area as such two vehicles are required to support each patrol to the area and to render easy help in case of any break down. Repair or recovery facilities are far from the border area and no communication is available in this area.

b. The area can be kept under surveillance by patrolling constantly to maintain UN presence there. It is not of much significance as the southern part.

Faisant suite à votre lettre ci-dessus citée en référence, je vous prie de noter ce qui suit :

L'Assistance que le PAM a apportée aux Réfugiés Burundais n'a pas été entièrement puisée sur le pipeline des déplacés de guerre. Il l'a été pour le Maïs et pour le Haricot essentiellement. La farine de Maïs par exemple a été empruntée à un projet de développement et cette farine a même été prêtée en faveur des déplacés.

Si j'ai demandé de réserver le haricot pour les réfugiés durant les prochaines semaines, c'est parce que nous avons été informé des livraisons de 1.500 Tonnes de lentilles en cours de réception par le CICR dont la distribution a commencé et de l'accord du CRS de donner 1.320 Tonnes de lentilles actuellement disponibles au CICR. Une bonne partie de ces lentilles étant sur place, des efforts peuvent être faits pour les distribuer et permettre aux réfugiés de bénéficier de quelques Haricots étant donné leur taux excessivement élevé de malnutrition : 35% selon les ONGs.

S'il s'avérait impossible de poursuivre la distribution de lentilles, le PAM serait alors d'avis de sensibiliser tous les bénéficiaires de haricots pour une reprise des distributions d'une demi-ration de cette denrée comme nous l'avons fait en octobre dernier.

S'agissant des engagements du PAM avec le Gouvernement pour fournir une assistance alimentaire aux Déplacés de guerre, tout engagement du PAM de ce genre est toujours assortie de la Clause : "selon les disponibilités du PAM". En outre, le PAM n'est pas le seul à s'être engagé dans l'assistance alimentaire aux déplacés de guerre.
