HANDLING OF DETAINEES

Ref: A. UNAMIR detainee policy - not yet published
B. Discussion CO/R Ops O 261115B Oct 94

1. Ref B has been drafted by our Legal O in conjunction with the AUSMED Legal O. In short, detainees are to be turned over to the local authority at the earliest time possible. The local authority is the Kigali prosecutor. Further, ICRC is to be notified of any detainees to be turned over to the magistrate.

2. Details about the prosecutors office are:

- a. Address: 49 Avenue de Commerce (across from the market);
- b. Name: Mr Francois NSANZUWERA; and
- c. Time: 0800 to 1700 daily.

3. At Ref B the CO outlined his policy for handling of detainees. It must be noted that this policy is in effect for all detainees incl those who seek protection from the RPA, those caught coming through our perimeter, etc.

4. On capturing a detainee the fol is to occur:

a. By the captor

- (1) complete a search of the detainee, looking for wpns and any stolen goods;
- (2) the detainee is to be taken to the guard room and placed in control of the MP sect;
- (3) hand over all items found in the search of the detainee to the MP Sect; and
- (4) a full report of the incident will be given to the Ops Duty Offr.

b. By the MP Sect

- (1) immediately call the duty medic to complete a med screening;
- (2) retain the detainee in custody until the fol morning if nec, ensuring that appropriate pers needs are met;
- (3) arrange for transfer to the magistrate as soon as is practical incl completion of the Hand Over Proforma at Anx A; and
- (4) keep R Ops D.O. informed on all developments.

c. R Ops.

- (1) Will notify UNAMIR HQ Ops D.O. with all known facts, requesting that UNAMIR HQ notify ICRC; and
- (2) will notify the MP Sect with info from UNAMIR HQ concerning attendance of ICRC reps at the hand-over or other specific direction.

d. Med Pl. Will send duty Med A to the guard house on order to complete an initial med assessment of detainees.

e. Sp Sqn. Be prep to prov food, water, etc for basic sp to detainees.

5. Outdets. Outdets will be responsible to hand over any detainees to the local authority. Whenever possible this should be done through liaison with the bn or coy in loc. A list of local authorities is at Anx B.

3. MISCELLANEOUS INCIDENTS

a. MILOBs reported that the border post between RWANDA and BURUNDI near BUGERAMA CITE was closed by Burundian soldiers.

B. ETHIOBATT have reported that a refugee from BURUNDI, now staying in BUGERAMA, has claimed that soldiers in BURUNDI are firing against opposition forces and that he saw 2 bodies and 2 houses destroyed.

C. BRITCON reported that the larger of the mass graves at CYANIKA (GR 5630) is again suffering the effects of heavy rain. Decomposing body material and contaminated clothing have been brought to the surface with a causing a health risk.

D. A Catholic sister in KARAMA (GR 6011) has reported that the bodies of 15,000 people, killed in April, are still lying unburied in the area. She expressed concern at the health hazard posed by these bodies. A MILOB team will visit the area in order to verify the report. Previous reports have spoken of as many as 20,000 bodies in the area but this is the first report of any unburied bodies.

4. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES

a. RPA the RPA continued to conduct patrols and mount road blocks throughout the country.

(1) Milobs reported that the RPA continued to train new recruits in KIBUYE. In addition the RPA deployed troops around NDABA DP camp after the expulsion of all dps on 18 oct 94. It is reported that the RPA took all of the belongings abandoned by the dps during the expulsion.

(2) BRITCON reported that difficulties had been experienced with an RPA checkpoint in KIGALI (GR 023847) when they attempted to move an Op Homeward convoy through. The RPA soldiers appeared to have been drinking and one of the refugees was beaten up. The situation was only resolved when an RPA officer arrived on the scene.

DCOS OPS

Political Information Officers

1. A critical concern and objective of the United Nations in Rwanda, as established by the Security Council, remains the alleviation of the suffering of the Rwandese people and the restoration of peace and national reconciliation. To this end, the Council has mandated UNAMIR to carry out a number of important humanitarian tasks and has also invited the Secretary-General and his Special Representative, in coordination with the OAU and countries in the region, to continue their efforts to achieve a political settlement in Rwanda within the framework of the Arusha Peace Agreement.

2. Since the RPF's unilateral cease-fire on 18 July and the setting up on 19 July of a Broad-Based Government of National Unity in Kigali, intensive efforts have continued at various levels to facilitate the repatriation of an estimated 4 million refugees and displaced persons and to promote political reconciliation in Rwanda.

3. The United Nations, as reflected in the Security Council presidential statement of 14 October, remains concerned about the need to stabilize the overall situation in Rwanda. In this connection, the Council, in that statement, endorsed the Secretary-General's call on the Government of Rwanda to maintain an open dialogue with all political interest groups in Rwanda in an effort to achieve genuine reconciliation between all elements of Rwandese society, within the framework of the Arusha Peace Agreement and also called for assistance for Rwanda's socio-economic reconstruction, including the restoration of civil administration. The Council, in particular, also encouraged the Rwandese Government to continue its efforts to invite members of the former ruling party, the MRND, who were not involved in the massacres that took place in the country recently, to participate in the Government and to absorb members of the former Rwandese Government Forces (RGF), into the new national army.

4. In pursuance of its overall objective of promoting peace and reconciliation in Rwanda, UNAMIR is deploying Political Information Officers to the five Sectors covering the entire country outside Kigali. These Officers will work in concert with UNAMIR military forces deployed in those sectors, as well as with the provincial, municipal and local administrators and other segments of the society to promote and facilitate reconciliation. Among the specific tasks of the Political Information Officers, are the following:

- assist the Government in the re-establishment of civil administration at the provincial, municipal and local levels, and in the promotion of national reconciliation;
- monitor developments, especially in the areas of peace and national reconciliation, and report to the Office of the Special Representative;
- assist in the coordination of humanitarian relief operations in their respective sectors;
- disseminate information on the activities and programmes of UNAMIR and other United Nations agencies;
- provide political advice to the command and control component in the respective sectors

SUBJECT: Responsibilities of the Receiving and Inspection Unit

A receiving and inspection unit is to be established in all UN missions. This unit is the focal point for the receipt of all incoming shipment. It is responsible for receiving, inspecting, and certifying acceptance or rejection of all items purchased for the mission. In particular it will ensure that specifications have been met regarding quality, quantity, delivery date and any special instruction given to the vendor. The unit is also responsible for maintaining records of all incoming shipments and for promptly notifying EDP, Transport, Communications and PCIU that items of their areas of competence have arrived.

On the arrival of a shipment the RIR Unit will:

- 1 - Receive and inspect all UNAMIR shipped items;
- 2 - certify the acceptance of the items if their quality, quantity, specifications and date of delivery are in conformity with the purchase order, or in case of transfer from other missions, with the PT107 (herewith attached); and fill the Receiving and Inspection Report (PT 31, copy attached) ;
- 3 - inform immediately the respective units, in the case of EDP, BMS, Communications and Transport products as well as PCIU for general services category of items; it will be the responsibility of these units to certify the acceptance or rejection of the goods; the receiving and inspection unit will ensure that these units prepare all the relevant Receiving and Inspection Reports (or Discrepancy Reports); the RIR could be used in both cases, as a formal Discrepancy Report Form already designed does not exist.

4 - if the quality, quantity, specifications or the delivery date are not conform with the purchase order the unit may reject the products. The receiving and inspection unit will prepare a Discrepancy Report, which might be the same as the Receiving and Inspection Report, in 5 copies, explaining the reasons for the rejection and communicate it the Chief Procurement Officer for further action.

The RIR is the basic document for the settlement of the bills for all local purchases and for claims against the vendor, if necessary.

Considering the importance of the work of the RI unit, all concerned are invited to cooperate in order to facilitate it in the performance of its task.

SUBJECT: ACCESS TO KIGALI AIRPORT HELICOPTER HANGAR

1. A recent meeting was held between Air Ops and the Airport Commandant, Mr Busingye, about access to the Canadian Helicopter site. Also present at the meeting was the RPA officer in charge of airport security. The following was agreed.
2. The difficulties experienced in getting UNAMIR vehicles and their passengers across the airfield can be resolved by using an access gate on the southern side of the airfield. The gate is apparently manned 24 hours a day and access will be available to any traffic destined for the Canadian Helicopter site.
3. Attached is a map of the access road to the gate. There are 2 RPA checkpoints on the road, the gate is on a sharp right-hand bend and quite obvious. Once inside the perimeter fence, vehicles must drive across a small aircraft dispersal and in front of the fire station before turning right into the helicopter dispersal.
4. Airfield access permits are issued by the Airport commandant's office on a strictly limited basis. They will only be issued to specific people or posts within an organization, a not unreasonable limitation for an airport. Therefore any personnel in vehicles not in possession of an airfield access permit must use the southern access gate to get to the helicopter hangar.

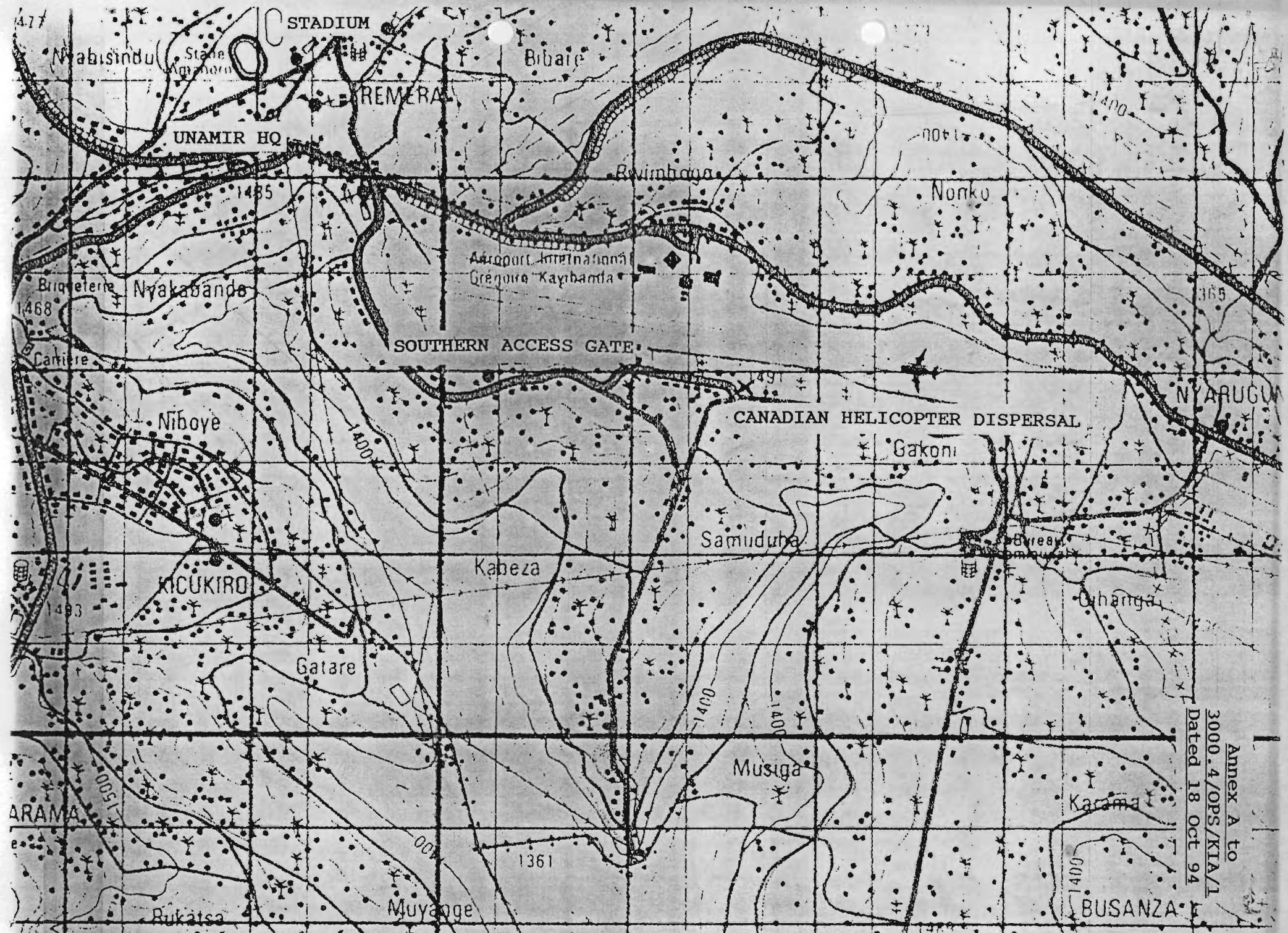

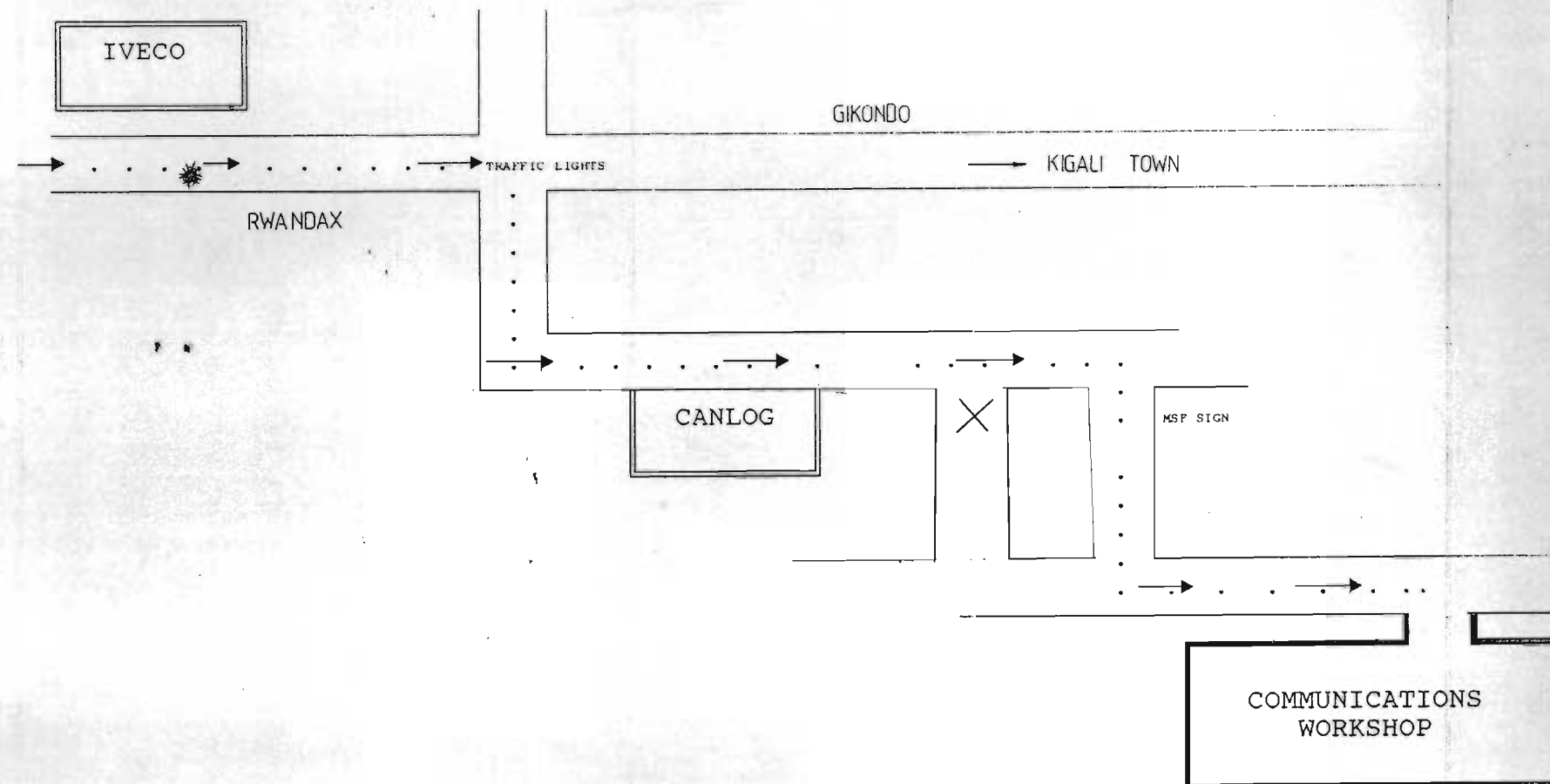

DISCIPLINE - CAR PARKING OUTSIDE SECURE LOCATIONS

Reference:

A. 2000.1/CMPO\DISC dated 17 Oct 94.

1. Further to Reference A, it has been brought to my attention that United Nations Field Operations Manual Chapter 12 makes provision for the driver to be held financially responsible in the event of loss or damage of a vehicle.

2. In the case of accidents which occur while the vehicle is being used for official travel, the driver will normally only be held responsible as a result of gross negligence on his part and the liability will not normally exceed 50% of the value of the vehicle or, in the case of an accident, 50% of the cost of repair.

3. When the vehicle is being used for non-official travel - liberty journeys - the situation is viewed more seriously. The driver is held financially responsible for any loss arising as a result of his negligence - whether gross or not. Assessments may be up to the full cost of replacing the vehicle or, in the case of an accident, the full cost of repair.

4. In the context covered by Reference A, it would be difficult to consider a social visit to a night club to be official travel. Personnel should be warned that, in the event of the loss of a vehicle, they may be held personally financially liable for that loss, to the full replacement value of the vehicle.

5. DFC/COS has remarked that individuals might take greater care of UN vehicles if they had paid for those vehicles themselves.

Some individuals may be paying for vehicles but, by then, they will have been deprived of their use. This should be a powerful factor in considering whether a particular location is a safe place to leave a car.

SUBJECT: UNAMIR Recreation and Welfare Club: Appointment of an
Ad Hoc Welfare Club Committee

The Special Representative of the Secretary General has just approved the creation of an UNAMIR Recreation and Welfare Club to be implemented immediately.

The purpose of the Club is to promote and maintain the highest possible level of morale and welfare among UN staff by providing suitable facilities for outdoor sports, indoor games, a reading room, a video library, swimming facilities, facilities for send-off parties and "happy hours", means for going on hikes, picnics, and carrying out other activities which will enhance the staff members' leisure hours.

The Constitution of the Club calls for elections for members of the Welfare Club Committee. However, for the time being, in view of the urgent need to establish the Club, the Special Representative has authorized the launching of Club activities through a ad hoc volunteer committee made up of two persons each from the following:

Civilian Component
Military Component
UN Agencies (Coordinated by UNDP)
Representatives at large

We shall ensure that the ad hoc volunteer committee has broad geographical and cultural representation, as well as senior, middle and junior ranks of officers and personnel. The office of the OIC Administration shall be responsible for the final selection of the ad hoc committee.

Accordingly, volunteers should express their interest through their respective Heads of Branches/Sections/Organizations. 3. ZAIRE

a. On 171830B Oct 94 Voice of America reported that Zairian troops had begun massing on the Ugandan border. The troops were reported to be equipped with tanks, APCs and heavy equipment. The Ugandan minister of Defence said that Ugandan troops had been put on alert but declined to comment on the reasons for the Zairian activity.

4. RGF/INTERAHAMWE ACTIVITIES

a. Nothing significant to report.

5. RPA ACTIVITIES

a. The RPA continued to clear mines from different parts of KIGALI. A mine was destroyed near the KINIHURURA camp.

b. MILOBs reported that the RPA had arrested 1 person in MASANGO (GR 611544) on 15 Oct 94. It is alleged that the arrested person was 1 of 3 people accused of throwing a grenade at an RPA soldier. The other 2 people had been killed by the RPA as they attempted to escape.

c. MILOBs in Sector 4C reported that 2 RPA soldiers in NYAMASHEKE (GR 9841) had killed 4 fishermen on 16 Oct 94. The fishermen were killed after the soldiers had robbed them of their money at gunpoint. After the incident 1 of the soldiers shot and wounded the other and stole the money. The wounded soldier was admitted to CYANGUGU

hospital.

d. Sector 5 reported that the RPA had arrested a teacher and an agricultural assistant in GASHANGIRO (GR 5936)

e. The RPA in RUHENGIERI conducted a search of 3 houses used by the NGO "Concern". The RPA Bn Comd said that the search was carried out in a polite manner in the presence of the NGO personnel. The object of the search was to locate any military equipment which may have been in the houses.

f. MILOBs report that the RPA have increased their patrol activity in Sector 4C.

g. MILOBs report that the population of NDABA displaced persons camp (GR 4073) has doubled to 10,000 in the last fortnight. The reason given by the people in the camp for their movement is a distrust of the RPA.

SUBJECT: ACCESS TO KIGALI AIRPORT HELICOPTER HANGAR

1. A recent meeting was held between Air Ops and the Airport Commandant, Mr Busingye, about access to the Canadian Helicopter site. Also present at the meeting was the RPA officer in charge of airport security. The following was agreed.
2. The difficulties experienced in getting UNAMIR vehicles and their passengers across the airfield can be resolved by using an access gate on the southern side of the airfield. The gate is apparently manned 24 hours a day and access will be available to any traffic destined for the Canadian Helicopter site.
3. Attached is a map of the access road to the gate. There are 2 RPA checkpoints on the road, the gate is on a sharp right-hand bend and quite obvious. Once inside the perimeter fence, vehicles must drive across a small aircraft dispersal and in front of the fire station before turning right into the helicopter dispersal.
4. Airfield access permits are issued by the Airport commandant's office on a strictly limited basis. They will only be issued to specific people or posts within an organization, a not unreasonable limitation for an airport. Therefore any personnel in vehicles not in possession of an airfield access permit must use the southern access gate to get to the helicopter hangar.

Political Information Officers

1. A critical concern and objective of the United Nations in Rwanda, as established by the Security Council, remains the alleviation of the suffering of the Rwandese people and the restoration of peace and national reconciliation. To this end, the Council has mandated UNAMIR to carry out a number of important humanitarian tasks and has also invited the Secretary-General and his Special Representative, in coordination with the OAU and countries in the region, to continue their efforts to achieve a political settlement in Rwanda within the framework of the Arusha Peace Agreement.

2. Since the RPF's unilateral cease-fire on 18 July and the setting up on 19 July of a Broad-Based Government of National Unity in Kigali, intensive efforts have continued at various levels to facilitate the repatriation of an estimated 4 million refugees and displaced persons and to promote political reconciliation in Rwanda.

3. The United Nations, as reflected in the Security Council presidential statement of 14 October, remains concerned about the need to stabilize the overall situation in Rwanda. In this connection, the Council, in that statement, endorsed the Secretary-General's call on the Government of Rwanda to maintain an open dialogue with all political interest groups in Rwanda in an effort to achieve genuine reconciliation between all elements of Rwandese society, within the framework of the Arusha Peace Agreement and also called for assistance for Rwanda's socio-economic reconstruction, including the restoration of civil administration. The Council, in particular, also encouraged the Rwandese Government to continue its efforts to invite members of the former ruling party, the MRND, who were not involved in the massacres that took place in the country recently, to participate in the Government and to absorb members of the former Rwandese Government Forces (RGF), into the new national army.

4. In pursuance of its overall objective of promoting peace and reconciliation in Rwanda, UNAMIR is deploying Political Information Officers to the five Sectors covering the entire country outside Kigali. These Officers will work in concert with UNAMIR military forces deployed in those sectors, as well as with the provincial, municipal and local administrators and other segments of the society to promote and facilitate reconciliation. Among the specific tasks of the Political Information Officers, are the following:

- assist the Government in the re-establishment of civil administration at the provincial, municipal and local levels, and in the promotion of national reconciliation;
- monitor developments, especially in the areas of peace and national reconciliation, and report to the Office of the Special Representative;
- assist in the coordination of humanitarian relief operations in their respective sectors;
- disseminate information on the activities and programmes of UNAMIR and other United Nations agencies;
- provide political advice to the commanding officer of the UNAMIR military component in the respective sectors.

You are directed to remove the appropriate page and insert the amended page into the Reference. The affected change pertains to the proper sequencing of Sub-paragraphs 14c and 14d.

2. Commanders at all levels are required to:

- a. Have this directive translated and disseminated to every subordinate under their command if other than English/French; and
- b. Ensure that every subordinate under their commands understands the changes to this document.

10. Authority to Detain. Individuals shall only be detained if they commit a hostile act, display hostile intent or carry out any activity which would require that force be used against them under paragraph 8.

11. Once detained, only minimal non-deadly force is authorized to prevent the escape of a detainee, unless there is a necessity to act in self-defence, in which case minimum force, up to and including deadly force, is authorized. However, if the individuals flee and the threat of their use of force has thus been removed, further force of any kind shall not be employed to apprehend them.

12. Any individual detained shall be turned over as soon as possible to appropriate civilian police authorities as designated by the Force Commander. Any weapons seized from detainees shall be confiscated or rendered militarily ineffective.

13. Detainees shall not be subject to intimidation, deprivation or humiliation. Medical care and the attention of medical personnel will be provided when required. Detainees will be given rations and shelter equivalent to that of UNAMIR personnel.

CHALLENGE AND ESCALATION PROCEDURES

14. Except where a response is required in accordance with paragraph 15, the following procedures are to be followed:

- a. Verbal or Visual Warning. Warn the aggressor to stop the activity, which in normal circumstances, should follow the following sequence:
 - (1) depending on the circumstances, a warning may be given orally, by a sign or by illumination (ie, hand-held red flares, search-lights, etc.). The issuance of a warning should also be passed up the chain of command with continuous Situation Reports;
 - (2) repeat the verbal or visual warning as many times as is necessary to ensure understanding or compliance;
- b. Charge Weapons. If authorized under State B of ROE No.2 (paragraph 15 refers);
- c. Non-Deadly Force. If warnings are ignored, employ minimal non-deadly force;
- d. Warning Shots. If the threat continues, employ aimed warning shots in a safe direction so that there is no danger of personal injury or collateral damage;
- e. Deadly Force. If minimal non-deadly force is either not feasible or fails, on order and under the control of a superior, minimal deadly force, such as single aimed shots, may be used until the threat is removed;
- f. Escalation of Deadly Force. Escalatory weapons fire with other weapons systems shall only be on the order of the appropriate commander in accordance with paragraph 6.

1. SUMMARY The situation throughout the country remains calm but TAC HQ report growing apprehension between UN/NGO and the RPA. Since 28 Sep 94 the RPA have become obstructive towards the UN. TAC HQ also report that the civilian population in certain areas remains wary of the RPA.
2. REFUGEE AND DP ACTIVITIES
 - a. It is reported that the incident in KATALE refugee camp which appeared in a media report yesterday began with two rival militia gangs fighting for control of a road junction. Reports speak of between 6-12 casualties. ICRC were informed of the existence of a "hit-list" containing the names of NGOs. It was decided that NGOs should evacuate the camp and the evacuation began at approx 1500hrs on 30 Sep 94.
 - b. A total of 593 refugees are reported to have returned to RWANDA during the reporting period. 340 came through Sector 4C and 253 came through Sector 5. 20 refugees are reported to have left RWANDA through Sector 2.
3. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES.

RPA. Continued to man road blocks and check points in KIGALI and in many parts of the country. Conducted patrols along RWANDA-ZAIRE AND RWANDA-BURUNDI borders.

 - a. The RPA held a number of parades and celebrations yesterday to mark the fourth anniversary of their invasion of RWANDA. Parades were held in KIGALI, RUHengeri, GISENYI and BYUMBA and an evening celebration was held in KIBUYE.
 - b. A money changer in GIKONGORO had a large amount of FRW extorted from him by an RPA soldier. The RPA LO attached to GHANBATT helped to retrieve the money.
 - c. Also in GIKONGORO a local reported that his life had been threatened by an RPA lieutenant who wanted a better exchange rate for hi US dollars. RPA LO was called to assist in investigation. The LO and IO of unit concerned assured UNAMIR that the local man's security will be guaranteed by them.
 - d. Info has been received from a former customs officer to indicate that RPA and Burundian soldiers move freely across the border for R & R. RPA soldiers have been seen crossing in civilian clothing.

e. GHANBATT retrieved 15 cows and 2 sheep seized by rpa soldiers at MBASA Checkpoint (GR 5411) from 5 locals from KIBEHO (GR 5007).

f. RPA soldiers at KIZI check pt (GR 6021) refused a MILOB team from BUTARE access to monitor the check up and registration of returnees. The RPA soldiers ordered the MILOB team to move away. This is the third time that the RPA at this checkpoint have failed to cooperate with the MILOBs.

4. MISCELLANEOUS INCIDENTS


a. A robbery was reported at the Fraternite Sainte Dominique in KIGALI on 30 Sep 94. Two men dressed like RPA soldiers entered the building and forced the 8 civilian workers to hand over money at gunpoint. The house was also looted. A third soldier stood outside and guarded the robbers vehicle. The incident has been reported to the gendarmerie who have agreed to guard the house for a day or two and also to investigate the incident.

b. The GOMA/GISENYI crossing point remains closed to UNAMIR personnel. All personnel crossing into TANZANIA will require a visa and may not cross in uniform. All UNAMIR personnel approaching the BURUNDI/RWANDA border are required to obtain clearance from the RPA.

c. The body of a man aged 20-25 was found on the rubbish dump outside KIGALI at approx 0830 hrs this morning. The man appeared to have had his hands tied behind his back and his throat cut. He was lying on his back.

5. ASSESSMENT

a. The find of the body on the tip is the fourth reported body in the last 3 weeks. All had had their hands tied behind their backs before being killed with machetes or clubs. The circumstances of the deaths imply that the motive was not simple murder and that executions are being carried out in KIGALI and the bodies dumped on the rubbish dump. No effort has been made to conceal the bodies and this would tend to suggest that INTERAHANWE are responsible and that this is part of their plan to show the occupants of KIGALI that they are still in the area.

General Guidelines for the Force Commander

1. Please accept my heartiest congratulations on your appointment as the Force Commander in which capacity you will head the Military Division of the United Nations Assistance Mission for Rwanda (UNAMIR). As the Under-Secretary-General for Peace Keeping Operations, I would like to convey to you general guidelines for your mission.

Authorization and Mandate

2. UNAMIR is a subsidiary organ of the United Nations, established pursuant to Security Council Resolution 872 (1993) of 5 October 1993. UNAMIR's mandate was established in operative paragraphs 2 and 3 of Security Council Resolution 872 (1993), adjusted vide paragraph 8 of Security Council Resolution 912 (1994) and expanded vide paragraph 3 of Security Council Resolution 918 (1994). The mandate was reaffirmed and extended up to 9 December 1994 vide Security Council Resolution 925 (1994). Due to the situation on the ground having rapidly changed the Secretary General's report of 3 August 1994 adapted UNAMIR's principal tasks within the framework of Security Council Resolution 925 (1994) and this was welcomed by the Security Council in the Statement by the President of the Security Council of 10 August 1994. The various resolutions of the Security Council on UNAMIR and other relevant references are listed at Annex A.

Terms of Reference

3. The mandate of UNAMIR specified in Security Council Resolution 912 (sub-paragraph a to c below) and Security Council Resolution 918 (sub-paragraph d and e below) is:

- a. To act as an intermediary between the parties in an attempt to secure their agreement to a cease-fire;
- b. To assist in the resumption of humanitarian relief operations to the extent feasible;
- c. To monitor and report on developments in Rwanda, including the safety and security of the civilians who sought refuge with UNAMIR;
- d. To contribute to the security and protection of displaced persons, refugees and civilians at risk in Rwanda, including through the establishment and maintenance, where feasible, of secure humanitarian areas, and
- e. To provide security and support for the distribution of relief supplies and humanitarian relief operations.

4. Within the framework of Security Council Resolution 925 (1994), UNAMIR is now performing the following tasks:

- a. To ensure stability and security in the north-western and south-western regions of Rwanda;
- b. To stabilize and monitor the situation in all regions of Rwanda in order to encourage the return of refugees and displaced population;
- c. To provide security and support for humanitarian assistance operations inside Rwanda as humanitarian organizations arrange the return of refugees;
- d. To promote, through mediation and good offices, national reconciliation in Rwanda.

Chain of Command between UNAMIR and UN HQ

5. As you are aware, Mr Shahrayar Khan is the Special Representative of the Secretary General (SRSG) for Rwanda and as such has overall responsibility for United Nations operations in Rwanda. You will therefore report through the SRSG on all matters

concerning the functioning of the military personnel of UNAMIR.

6. You will maintain the closest possible working relationship with SRSG, and Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) and keep them fully informed about the organization, deployment and operations of the Military Division.

7. You will consult the SRSG in advance about any decisions of yours which have political implications, and on matters of policy, you will report through him to this headquarters. On purely military and technical matters, you may report directly to me, while keeping the SRSG fully informed.

Reporting

8. The Secretary-General reports to the Security Council about UNAMIR when appropriate, but not necessarily at regular intervals. Any matters which might affect the nature of the continued effective functioning of the mission should be referred to the Council for its decision. On military and technical matters, you may report directly to me, while keeping the Military Advisor in DPKO fully informed.

9. You will keep me fully informed of the developments relating to the functioning of the mission along the lines specified in paragraphs 3, 4, 5 and 6 above. All matters which may affect the nature or the continued effectiveness of UNAMIR will be referred to this headquarters for decision, as will all matters likely to affect the United Nations' relations with the Parties or the troop contributing governments. In this connection, you are asked to prepare and submit to me a weekly and a monthly report reviewing the over all military situation as it affects the work of the mission, and on internal matters including personnel, administration and logistics. You should also submit ad hoc reports on any developments of special importance occurring in the interval between these reports.

Responsibilities of the Force Commander UNAMIR

10. Your responsibilities as Force Commander are as follows :

a. You will be responsible, under the authority and supervision of the Secretary-General, for the organization and smooth functioning of the Military Division of UNAMIR;

b. All military personnel authorized to UNAMIR will be under your command and they will be directly answerable to you for the conduct and performance of their duties;

c. You will have full and exclusive authority with respect to the assignment of members of your Headquarters Staff, except for the Deputy Force Commander (DFC), the Chief Military Observer (CMO) and the Chief of Staff (COS), who will be designated by myself, in consultation with you, on a rotational basis amongst contributing countries. When selecting officers for staff positions in your headquarters, you should make every effort to ensure that all contingents are, to the extent possible, represented;

d. You will have full and exclusive authority with respect to the operational deployment of all military personnel under your command;

e. You will establish a chain of command for UNAMIR, making use of the officers of your Headquarters staff and the commanders of the national contingents made available by the participating governments. You may delegate your authority through the chain of command;

f. As indicated in the notes prepared for the guidance of military personnel, officers shall, during the term of their appointment, carry out their duties and regulate their conduct solely with the interests of the United Nations in view. They shall not seek or receive instructions in the performance of their duties, from any government or any other authority external to the United Nations. They shall exercise the utmost discretion in respect of all matters of official business. They shall not communicate to any person any information known to them by reason of their official position which has not been made public, except as required in the course of their duties or by authorization of the Force Commander. Nor shall they, at any time, use such information to private advantage;

g. You are asked to inform me immediately if it comes to your knowledge that any of the participating governments is attempting to issue orders to its personnel on matters related to their UNAMIR duties or is communicating with them directly on questions of UNAMIR policy;

h. You are required to submit performance evaluation reports on military personnel. Such reports will be forwarded through me to the national authorities concerned;

i. You will be responsible for the good order and discipline within UNAMIR. You may make investigations, conduct inquiries and require information, reports and consultations for the purpose of discharging this responsibility. Responsibility for disciplinary action in national contingents of UNAMIR rests with the commanders of the national contingents. If you consider it necessary, in the interest of the Mission to repatriate military personnel, you should so recommend to me and I will take the

matter up with the Government concerned.

11. In the performance of your duties as Force Commander you will be assisted by :

- a. 320 Military Observers.
- b. 90 Civilian Police Observers.
- c. 5,500 troops and staff.

Organization

12. UNAMIR is headed by the SRSG. The Military Division is headed by the Force Commander. So far the following countries have been approved by the Security Council to contribute to the military component of UNAMIR :

13. UNAMIR headquarters will continue to remain at Kigali with the minimum units required for protection, along with specialized units for communications and logistics, as well as the field hospital. It is envisaged that the area of responsibility will be divided into five sectors with the deployment of troops as shown:

- a. Sector I (north-east): one reinforced company with engineer elements;
- b. Sector II (south-east): one reinforced company;
- c. Sector III (south): one reinforced company;
- d. Sector IV (south-west): three infantry battalions;
- e. Sector V (north-west): one infantry battalion.

Standard Operating Procedures

14. Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs) based on the guideline SOP have been drawn up and should be adhered to.

Communications with Contributing Governments

15. The channel for communications between the United Nations and the participating governments concerning their contingents or UNAMIR itself shall be between the United Nations Headquarters in New York and their Permanent Missions to the organization. It is not permitted that matters of policy or administration be taken up directly between UNAMIR Headquarters and the participating governments.

The Chief Administrative Officer

16. In the exercise of your administrative responsibilities, you will be assisted by the CAO. Under the overall authority of the SRSG, the CAO shall be responsible for:

- a. all administrative functions and all general and technical services relating to the mission's activities, and for providing the requisite administrative support for carrying out the substantive work of the mission effectively and economically;
- b. all administrative and financial certification;

c. the proper implementation of the rules, regulations and instructions issued by the Department of Peace keeping Operations (Field Administration and Logistics Division) with respect to the administration and finance of the mission;

d. the CAO will be assisted by a small number of administrative/finance officers, field services officers and other international and local staff as required;

e. on administrative and financial matters, UNAMIR communicates directly with the Field Administration and Logistics Division. This is normally done by the CAO. However, you may also bring to my attention administrative matters when they have important operational implications.

17. Should you encounter any difficulties relating to administrative matters, you are to refer those matters to me.

Respect for Local Laws

18. It is the duty of members of UNAMIR to respect the laws and regulations of the Host States and to refrain from any activity of a political character in the Host States or other action incompatible with the international nature of their duties. They shall conduct themselves, at all times, in a manner befitting their status as members of UNAMIR.

19. Members of UNAMIR are entitled to the legal protection of the United Nations, pursuant to the applicable provisions of the Convention on Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations.

Visits to UNAMIR

20. Visits to the Mission by officials of the governments contributing military personnel to UNAMIR shall be arranged with you through United Nations Headquarters in New York.

Media Coverage of UNAMIR

21. UNAMIR will be the object of media attention. It is desirable that its work be known and well understood by the public, subject to the information policy laid down by the Secretary-General. You should therefore facilitate the work of



SUBJECT: PROCEDURES FOR TASKING AND OPERATION OF SECOND LINE ROAD TRANSPORT

Introduction.

1. Second line road transport within UNIMAR II is a scarce resource, as it is in all operations. To enable the most effective and economical use of Second Line road transport it must be managed intensively. The result of this intensive management will be prioritisation and consolidation of tasks, improved lift capacity, more timely satisfaction of transport requests, and an overall improved service from the second line vehicle fleet.

Aim

2. The aim of this instruction is to describe the procedures for requesting and tasking UNAMIR II second line road transport resources.

General

3. First Line road transport is organic unit transport, available for tasking by units as they see fit. Second line road transport is controlled by the SO Tpt HQ UNAMIR II and provides the capability to lift bulk loads and formed bodies of troops within the UNAMIR II area of operations. Second Line transport support is allocated in accordance with priorities set by HQ UNAMIR II G3 Ops staff. Third Line road transport will not be discussed in this instruction.

4. The following forms will be used to enable management of the Second Line road transport asset:


- a. Transport Task Request. Transport Task Requests are to be submitted, direct to the SO Tpt, by UNAMIR II military or civilian staff requiring transport support beyond the capability of their own First Line road transport. Effective immediately, requests for Second Line road transport support will only be accepted on a Transport Task Request form. An example Transport Task Request form is at Annex A. The example Transport Task Request should be photocopied as there will not be a bulk issue of forms. Requests should be submitted not less than 48 hours in advance of the task. The SO Tpt will prioritise the Transport Task Requests and consolidate tasks. Requests should include, in the remarks column, a point of contact at both the pick up point and delivery point where possible. Advice will be provided, within 24 hours, as to whether the Transport Task Request has been approved. If the

request cannot be approved (for example, due to a lack of transport resources) an attempt will be made to make alternative arrangements. Alternatives may include providing transport on another day, or exploring other sources of transport support (for example, air transport).

- b. Task Vehicle Availability. Units providing Second Line road transport are to submit Task Vehicle Availability forms, not later than 0900 hours daily, direct to the SO Tpt. Units required to submit Task Vehicle Availability forms will be advised by the SO Tpt. An example Task Vehicle Availability form is at Annex B. The example Task Vehicle Availability should be photocopied as there will not be a bulk issue of forms. By consolidating the Task Vehicle Availability Forms the SO Tpt will be able to determine how much transport resource is available daily to satisfy Transport Task Requests, submitted in accordance with sub-paragraph a. above.
- c. Transport Task Orders. On the basis of Task Requests, as advised in sub-paragraph a. above and, vehicle availability, as advised in sub-paragraph b. above, the SO Tpt will consolidate and assign tasks to Second Line road transport. Transport Task Orders are the sole authority to task UNAMIR II Second Line road transport. An example Transport Task Order is at Annex C. Transport Task Orders can only be authorised by staff of the HQ UNAMIR II Log Coord Cell. Copies of Task orders will be provided to both the unit assigned the task and to HQ UNAMIR II G3 Ops.

Conclusion

5. The Second Line road transport management system described will come into effect upon receipt of this instruction. As a result, it is anticipated that over the coming months the ability of the UNAMIR Second Line road transport organisation to respond to force requirements will be greatly enhanced. The cooperation of UNAMIR civilian and military staff in this endeavour will serve to accelerate this process of improvement.



SITREP COVERING PERIOD 050600 TO 060600 SEP 94.

1. GEN SITUATION. THE SITUATION IN AND AROUND KIGALI REMAINED CALM. ELECTRICITY SUPPLY HAS BEEN RESTORED IN SOME PARTS OF KIGALI CITY. DISPLACED PERS CONTINUED TO RETURN TO KIGALI AND OTHER PARTS OF THE COUNTRY BY VARIOUS MEANS. RADIO RWANDA QUOTING THE INTERIOR MINISTER BROADCASTED THAT THE PREFECT OF KIBUYE, GIKONGORO AND CYANGUGU WILL DEPLOY THE PREFECTURE WEF 06 SEP 94 WITH RPA TO PROVIDE PROTECTION AND SECURITY TO THE PREFECT AND THE LOCAL POPULATION. THE RADIO ALSO MENTIONED THAT INTERAHAWME AND EX MILITIA ARE INFILTRATING IN THOSE AREAS FROM THE OTHER SIDE OF THE BORDER AND TRYING TO DE-STABILIZE THE OVERALL SECURITY SITUATION. SECTOR 4C REPORTS THAT MORE RGF AND GENDARMERIE ELEMENTS SURRENDERING THEIR WEAPONS TO UNAMIR.

2. POLITICAL ACTIVITIES. THE SRSG MET MR. GAMBA AND MR. AHMED OF THE WORLD BANK TO DISCUSS THE \$20 MILLION GRANT THAT WAS RECENTLY GIVEN TO UN AGENCIES. THE SRSG EMPHASIZED THE NEED FOR THE WORLD BANK TO PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS IN RWANDA (IN CONNECTION WITH RENP), SPECIFICALLY FOR ELECTRICITY. HE STRESSED THAT THE GOVERNMENT NEEDS FUNDS URGENTLY IN ORDER TO PAY SALARIES. THE WORLD BANK OFFICIALS RESPONDED IN A VERY POSITIVE AND SUPPORTIVE MANNER.

3. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES

A. RPA. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT DAY AND NIGHT PATROLS IN KIGALI CITY. RPA CONCENTRATED THEIR ACTIVITIES IN BUTARE IN PREPARATION FOR THE VISIT OF MAJ GEN KAGAME TO THAT AREA. RPA BDE COMD IN GITARAMA YESTERDAY THREATENED TO HIJACK FOOD CONVOYS PASSING THROUGH GITARAMA IF NO FOOD AID SUPPLIES CAME TO THEIR AREA. THEY COMPLAINED THAT ALL THE HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE WAS BEING SENT TO SECTOR 4 WHILE THERE ARE THOUSANDS OF NEEDY PEOPLE IN OTHERS AREAS.

B. RGF. RGF TROOPS CONTINUED TO SURRENDERING THEIR WEAPONS TO UNAMIR IN SECTOR 4 AREAS.

C. MILITIA. ACTS OF BANDITRY CONTINUED TO BE REPORTED IN SECTOR 4. ALLEDGED BUT UNSUBSTANTIATED SUBVERSIVE ACTIVITIES CONTINUED IN THAT AREA.

4. OWN MILITARY ACTIVITIES

A. FORCE HQ. NORMAL MILITARY ACTIVITIES WERE CONDUCTED. FC HELD STAFF MEETING AT 0800 HRS. FC ALSO BRIEFED HIS ORDER GROUP REGARDING THE OPERATION TO MONITOR, CONTROL AND FACILITATE THE REINTEGRATION OF THE BBGNU AND THE RPA OF

RWANDA INTO SECTOR 4, COMMENCING WITH THE INSERTION OF PREFECTS ON 06 SEP 94.

B. UNOMUR. AREA OF OPERATION REMAINED CALM. CARRIED OUT ROUTINE PTL IN AOR. THREE HELICOPTERS WERE OPERATIONAL. 2 ARE PRESENTLY LOCATED IN KIGALI.

C. GHANBATT. CONDUCTED DAY AND NIGHT PTLs IN AOR. CONTINUED TO PROVIDE GUARDS AT CENTRE DE SANTE, AICF WAREHOUSE AND DISTRIBUTION CENTRE AT CYANIKA. CONTINUED TO MAN ROAD BLOCKS AND CHECK POINTS AT VARIOUS PLACES IN AOR.

D. MILOB GP. THE SITUATION REMAINED CALM IN ALL SECTORS. CONDUCTED PTLs IN ALL SECTORS. WHILE CARRYING OUT PATROLLING IN BYUMBA AREA MET OFFICIALS OF SAMARITANS TO PERSUE INFORMATION THAT THEY ARE PLANNING TO EVACUATE ABOUT 400 ORPHANS FROM RUTARE ARE TO KIGALI. MILOB TEAM CONDUCTED RECCE MISSION TO KIBUNGO AND UP TO TANZANIAN BORDER. THE OC OF MALAWI COMPANY OBSERVED THE HIJACKING OF A NGO TRUCK BY RPA WHILE RETURNING TO BUTARE FROM GITARAMA. THE INCIDENT TOOK PLACE AT A PLACE APPROX 7 KM NORTH OF RUHANGO GR 7459. SECTOR HQ AT GISENYI ARRANGED A MEETING BETWEEN NIGERIAN TELEVISION TEAM AND UNHCR.

E. BRITCON. MED SECTS AND EHT CONTINUE TO WORK IN THE MORE INACCESSIBLE AREAS OF SECTOR 4, THIS ALLOWS THE NGOS TO WORK CLOSER TO THE MSRs. ADDITIONAL ENGR WORK IS COMMENCING ON THE BRIDGE AT GATUNA TO TRY AND SLOW THE SPEED OF VEHs CROSSING. EOD TEAMS CONTINUED WORK ON UNEXPLODED AMMUNITION WITHIN KIGALI THAT AFFECT THE UNAMIR MISSION. BRITCON WKSP CONTINUED TO REPAIR VEH WITH WORK FOCUSING ON UNOSOM, UNIMOG AND ISUZU VEHs TO ENHANCE THE MOBILITY OF INF BNS. BRITCON MED TREATED 1,369 OUT PATIENTS AND 31 IN PATIENTS DURING LAST 24 HRS.

F. CAN SIGS. DEPLOYMENT OF VHF COMMS, INMARSAT AND V-CRTT2 IS NOW COMPLETED. V-CRTTS CCT HAS BEEN ESTB AND IS AVAIL AT ALL SECT HQs, TAC HQ BUTARE AND UNAMIR HQ KIGALI. A SDS RUN HAS BEEN ESTB TO ENSURE THE EXTENSION OF RTT SERVICES TO ALL UN AGENCIES IN KIGALI IN PARTICULAR MILOB HQ. EFFORTS TO ESTB RTT CCT CONTINUED. CONVOY OF TWO VEHs DEPARTED WITH RADIO RWANDA TECH AND DIESEL FUEL TO ASSIST IN FURTHER RESTORING THE COUNTRY'S PUBLIC BROADCAST SYSTEM. RECENTLY REPAIRED OPERATOR'S FAULT YESTERDAY. WEEKLY SITREP COVERING PERIOD 29 AUG TO 04 SEP 94.

1. **HIGHLIGHTS.** THE GENERAL SITUATION IN RWANDA CONTINUED TO REMAIN CALM. LIVING CONDITIONS IN KIGALI ARE STEADILY IMPROVING. MOST OF THE SHOPS, HOTELS AND BUSINESS CENTERS HAVE STARTED FUNCTIONING. PUBLIC WORK TECHNICIANS ARE RESTORING WATER AND POWER IN THE CITY AND SURROUNDINGS. THE FLOW OF REFUGEES MOVING BACK INTO RWANDA DECREASED SLIGHTLY. SEVERAL ACTS OF BANDITRY AND ALLEGED MURDERS WERE REPORTED IN SECTOR 4 WHICH MAY HAVE CREATED A CLIMATE OF INSECURITY IN THE LOCAL POPULATION IN SOME LOCALITIES. BARONESS CHALKER, THE MINISTER OF STATE FOR FOREIGN AND COMMONWEALTH AFFAIRS AND MINISTER FOR OVERSEAS DEVELOPMENT WAS BRIEFED ON THE SITUATION IN RWANDA AND TO DISCUSS BRITAIN'S INVOLVEMENT WITH AN INDEPENDENT RADIO STN IN RWANDA. UNAMIR ALSO RECEIVED THE VISIT OF H.E MR PATEL, INDIAN HIGH COMMISSIONER TO UK, ALONG WITH HIS MILITARY RECONNAISSANCE TEAM, TO DISCUSS THE POTENTIAL DEPLOYMENT OF AN INDIAN CONTINGENT UNDER UNAMIR COMMAND.

2. **POLITICAL ACTIVITIES.**

A. **HIGHLIGHTS.** THIS WEEK, THE FOCUS CONTINUED TO BE ON THE TRANSITION IN SECTOR 4 FROM UNAMIR TO RWANDESE GOVERNMENT CONTROL. IN THIS CONNECTION, UNAMIR WORKED CLOSELY WITH THE GOVERNMENT TO COORDINATE THIS TRANSITION, BOTH ON THE CIVILIAN AND MILITARY LEVELS. THIS PLAN WILL BE OUTLINED IN THIS REPORT. IN ADDITION, THE FOLLOWING VISITS AND EVENTS WERE OF SIGNIFICANCE:

(1) ON 28 AUGUST, THE SRSG MET WITH GENERAL KAGAME TO DISCUSS THE TRANSITION IN SECTOR 4, SECURITY, THE PROCESS OF RECONCILIATION, DEVELOPMENT ISSUES AND THE RENP, AND REGIONAL CONCERNS (INFILTRATION FROM AND INTIMIDATION IN NEIGHBOURING COUNTRIES).

(2) THE SECURITY COUNCIL COMMISSION OF EXPERTS ARRIVED, AND WILL ACCELERATE ITS WORK TO PRODUCE AN INTERIM REPORT BY THE END OF SEPTEMBER. THE UN CENTRE FOR HUMAN RIGHTS PLANS TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF HUMAN RIGHTS MONITORS ON THE GROUND AS WELL.

(3) THE TROIKA COMMISSION CAME TO UNAMIR HEADQUARTERS TO DISCUSS, AMONG OTHER ISSUES, METHODS OF DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE FOR RWANDA.

(4) BARONESS CHALKER ALSO VISITED UNAMIR TO DISCUSS, AMONG OTHERS, THE ISSUE OF CONTRIBUTING TO AN INDEPENDENT UNAMIR RADIO.

(5) THE SRSG, HIS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AND HIS SENIOR POLITICAL AFFAIRS OFFICER ACCOMPANIED THE GOVERNMENT TO A PEOPLE'S RALLY IN BUTARE AS PART OF THE ON-GOING

POLITICAL INITIATIVE TO REASSURE THE POPULATION.

B. RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT / RENP: THE SRSGS RWANDA
EMERGENCY NORMALIZATION PLAN:

(1) RETURNEES: APPROXIMATELY 1000 REFUGEES PER DAY ARE RETURNING FROM GOMA, ZAIRE. IN GENERAL, THE RETURN AND TRANSPORT OF REFUGEES AND DISPLACED PERSONS IS PROCEEDING WELL.

(2) AIRPORT: AS PART OF ICAO'S PLAN, UNDP HAS OFFERED TO FINANCE THE 20-27 UN VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO SERVE AS AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS OFFICIALS.

(3) UNFORTUNATELY, NO FUNDING OR ASSISTANCE HAS BEEN SECURED TO:

(A) PAY GOVERNMENT SALARIES.

(B) REPAIR IMPORTANT INFRASTRUCTURE SUCH AS ELECTRICITY AND WATER. THE ABILITY OF THE GOVERNMENT TO PAY SALARIES TO ITS MILITARY AND ITS CIVILIAN STAFF AND ALSO TO PROVIDE ELECTRICITY AND WATER TO ITS CITIZENS IS VITAL (ESPECIALLY AT THIS CRITICAL JUNCTURE) TO THE STABILITY OF THIS GOVERNMENT, AND ALSO TO THE STABILITY OF THE COUNTRY AS A WHOLE.

C. CONCERNING THE TRANSITION IN SECTOR 4, UNAMIR HAS PUT INTO EFFECT THE FOLLOWING PLAN:

(1) CURRENT SITUATION: THERE ARE REPORTS THAT THERE ARE AS MANY AS TEN THOUSAND RGF MEMBERS IN ZAIRE ACROSS THE BORDER FROM CYANGUGU. THEY ARE BELIEVED TO HAVE CROSSED INTO ZAIRE WITH APPROXIMATELY 50% OF THEIR WEAPONS. ABOUT TWO-THIRDS OF THESE SOLDIERS WERE RECRUITED DURING THE CIVIL WAR AND ARE PERCEIVED TO BE POORLY TRAINED. THERE HAVE ALSO BEEN REPORTS THAT ZAIRIAN SOLDIERS ARE TRAINING THESE FORCES. NONE OF THESE REPORTS HAS BEEN CONFIRMED. IN ADDITION, MILITARY-AGED MALES, ALONG WITH LARGE SUPPLIES OF RATIONS, WATER AND ARMS HAVE BEEN OBSERVED COMING ACROSS THE BORDERS OF ZAIRE AND BURUNDI INTO SECTOR 4 OF RWANDA. THESE ARE CLASSIC PREPARATIONS FOR GUERILLA WARFARE. AREAS OF CONCERN INCLUDE: THE KIBUNGO PREFECTURE, (SECTOR 2), ESPECIALLY THE AREA OF RUSUMO, THE FORET NATURELLE DE GISHWATI (SECTOR 5, BORDER OF ZAIRE), THE FORET NATURELLE DE NYUNGWE (SECTOR 4) AND LE PARC NATIONAL DE L'AKAGERA (SECTOR 1, BORDER OF TANZANIA). THESE FORESTS ARE DENSE AND DIFFICULT TO PATROL. THE CURRENT SITUATION IN RWANDA IS THUS FAIRLY STABLE, HOWEVER, IT IS IMPORTANT THAT THE GOVERNMENT, AS PART OF THE POST-WAR TRANSITION, GRADUALLY BUT FIRMLY TAKE CONTROL OF ITS SOVEREIGN TERRITORY ON BOTH THE CIVILIAN AND MILITARY LEVELS. IN ORDER, THUS, TO: A)

INCREASE OVERALL STABILITY IN RWANDA, AND B) TO PREVENT THE DEVELOPMENT OF A POWER/SECURITY VACUUM IN SECTOR 4, THE FOLLOWING PLAN HAS BEEN PUT INTO EFFECT:

(2) THE TRANSITION PLAN FOR SECTOR 4:

(A) MILITARY: SHORT-TERM:

I. INCREASE AND INTENSIFY UNAMIR SECURITY IN SECTOR 4. AN ORDER HAS BEEN PUT INTO EFFECT TO ENSURE: A) ACTIVE SEARCHES OF ALL VEHICLES FOR ARMS COMING ACROSS BORDERS AND/OR WITHIN SECTOR 4; B) INCREASE IN NUMBER OF CHECK-POINTS AND MORE ACTIVE SEARCHES OF PERSONS AND VEHICLES AT THESE CHECKPOINTS; AND C) A CONTINUATION OF THE SEARCH FOR ARMS CACHES (SOME HAVE ALREADY BEEN DISCOVERED).

II. PLAN TO DISARM AND FACILITATE INTEGRATION OF FCF-INSTALLED GENDARMERIE: THE FIRST CATEGORY OF GENDARMERIE IN SECTOR 4, WHICH WAS PUT IN PLACE, ARMED AND LEFT BEHIND BY THE FRENCH IS CURRENTLY ONLY IN SECTOR 4-C. THE GOVERNMENT CONSIDERS THEM ILLEGITIMATE AND HAS REQUESTED THAT THEY BE DISARMED. THAT PROCESS HAS BEGUN IN THE FORM OF A VOLUNTARY SURRENDER OF ARMS IN A) KIBUYE, B) GIKONGORO AND C) CYANGUGU. THUS FAR, 154 WEAPONS HAVE BEEN SURRENDERED AND REGISTERED, MOSTLY AT THE CYANGUGU CENTRE, WITH ICRC REPRESENTATIVES PRESENT, AND A NUMBER OF THESE GENDARMES HAVE ACCEPTED TO BE INTEGRATED INTO THE NATIONAL GENDARMERIE.

D. INSTALLATION OF PREFECTS INTO KIBUYE, GIKONGORO, AND CYANGUGU. TODAY, 6 SEPTEMBER, A GOVERNMENT PREFECT, ACCOMPANIED AND SUPERVISED BY TWO TEAMS OF MILOBS, AND AN RPA PLATOON (NUMBERING ABOUT 30), IS TRAVELLING TO EACH OF THE THREE ABOVE-REFERENCED LOCATIONS TO TAKE UP DUTIES.

E. MILITARY LONG-TERM:

(1) PLAN TO SCREEN AND INTEGRATE COMMUNAL POLICE IN SECTOR 4. THE SECOND CATEGORY, THE COMMUNAL POLICE, WERE ELECTED BY THE PEOPLE IN THEIR COMMUNES AND ARMED BY THE FRENCH. THEY ARE DEPLOYED IN 4A, 4B AND 4C. THE POPULATION SEEMS TO BE COMFORTABLE WITH THIS SECOND CATEGORY SINCE THEY THEMSELVES CHOSE THEM.

(2) UNAMIR HAS ASKED THE GOVERNMENT TO DISPATCH A POLICE ADMINISTRATOR TO KIBUYE, GIKONGORO AND CYANGUGU TO SCREEN, AND HOPEFULLY, INTEGRATE THEM AND LEAVE THEM IN PLACE AS PART OF THE NATIONAL GENDARMERIE. THE GOVERNMENT WOULD SANCTION THEM AS SUCH AND PROVIDE THEM WITH AN OFFICIAL UNIFORM AND FORM OF IDENTITY.

UNCIVPOL HAS BEEN ASKED TO SEND AT LEAST ONE CIVPOL TO ACCOMPANY THE GOVERNMENT POLICE ADMINISTRATOR AND TO SUPERVISE THE SCREENING OF THE COMMUNAL POLICE AND THE ISSUANCE OF CREDENTIALS. THESE CIVPOL REPRESENTATIVES WOULD THEN REPORT BACK TO HEADQUARTERS. THE CIVPOL REPRESENTATIVES WOULD ALSO CONDUCT AN INTENSIVE TRAINING PROGRAMME TO INDUCT THE COMMUNAL POLICE, AND SERVE AS ADVISORS AS NECESSARY. THE DISPATCH OF THESE SCREENING TEAMS WILL BE IN APPROXIMATELY FIVE DAYS.

F. ANALYSIS:

(1) THE TRANSITION OF SECTOR 4, ONCE COMPLETED, WILL:
A) PROMOTE GENERAL STABILITY AND B) PREVENT THE DEVELOPMENT OF A SECURITY VACUUM IN SECTOR 4.

(2) THE SIGNS OF GUERILLA WARFARE ARE BEGINNING TO APPEAR. BORDER INCURSIONS BY OPPOSITION AND/OR EXTREMIST ELEMENTS ARE INCREASING, AND SEEM TO BE DEVELOPING INTO A TREND.

(3) TO COUNTER THE DEVELOPMENT OF GUERILLA WARFARE/BORDER INCURSIONS AND TO PROMOTE STABILITY, POLITICAL RECONCILIATION MEASURES SHOULD BE INTENSIFIED IN AN EFFORT TO BRING AS MANY ELEMENTS AS POSSIBLE, AT LEAST THE MORE MODERATE, INTO THE GOVERNMENT. THERE WILL ALWAYS BE EXTREMIST ELEMENTS, HOWEVER, THE GOVERNMENT, WITH UNAMIR'S ASSISTANCE, SHOULD MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO BE AS BROAD-BASED AND AS INCLUSIVE AS POSSIBLE. IF THESE EFFORTS AT RECONCILIATION ARE NOT MADE, THE CYCLE OF WAR, AND POSSIBLY, OF MASSACRES, THAT RWANDA HAS KNOWN COULD CONTINUE. IN ADDITION, THE RISK OF REGIONAL INVOLVEMENT IN THE CONFLICT IS REAL, AND THUS THE PROBLEMS OF POWER-SHARING AND ETHNIC EQUALITY MUST BE ADDRESSED INSIDE RWANDA BEFORE THEY INFILTRATE AND INVOLVE NEIGHBOURING COUNTRIES.

3. MILITARY

A. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES

(1) RPA. RPA HAS BEEN VERY ACTIVE MANNING CHECK PTS AND PATROLLING KIGALI DAY AND NIGHT. THE REASON GIVEN FOR THE INCREASE ACTIVITY WAS THAT THEY WANTED TO CHECK CAR DOCUMENTS AND DRIVERS PERMITS. IT WAS OBSERVED DURING THE PERIOD THAT RPA MILITARY MEN DEMANDED MONEY AND VALUABLE GOODS FROM THE TRADERS. IT WAS ALSO SEEN THAT RPA SOLDIERS PERMITTED TRADERS TO SELL THEIR GOODS OUTSIDE THE MARKET PRESUMABLY AFTER TAKING SOME CASH OR IN KIND FROM THE TRADERS. REPORTS ON CATTLE LIFTING BY RPA SOLDIERS FROM VARIOUS PLACES WERE ALSO OBSERVED. REPORT ALSO RECEIVED ON RPA ENCROACHMENT UPON/VIOLATION OF SECTOR 4/DMZ BOUNDARY CONTRARY TO RPA/UNAMIR AGREEMENT. RPA DENIED THIS AND SUGGESTED THAT SIGHTING COULD BE OF FORMER RGF SOLDIERS/MILITIA SINCE NO

POSITIVE ID WAS DONE. ANY INCURSION BY RPA ELEMENTS WERE APPARENTLY LOCAL INITIATIVES AND NOT SANCTIONED BY HIGHER HQs. ONE RPA SOLDIER WAS BADLY INJURED WITH 3 X BULLET WOUNDS IN HIS LEFT HAND AND WAS BROUGHT TO KIBUNGO HOSP. LATER ON HE WAS BROUGHT TO AUSMED FOR FURTHER TREATMENT.

(2) RGF. RGF AND GENDARMERIE ASSISTED ETHIOBATT IN MANNING TWO BORDERS POSTS. RGF WERE APPARENTLY OBSERVED ACTIVE IN SECTOR 4 AND THEY TRIED TO CONVINCE REFUGEES TO GO TO ZAIRE. THEIR MOVEMENT WITH ARMS WERE ALSO SEEN INCREASINGLY IN THAT AREA. ABOUT 20 OFFICERS AND 100 SOLDIERS JOINED RPA DURING THE PERIOD OF 28 AUG. 114 RGF AND GENDARMERIE INCLUDING 3 X MAJORS, 1 X CAPT, 7 X LT/2LT SURRENDERED TO RPA IN BUTARE. ANOTHER 19 RGF SOLDIERS SURRENDERED TO GHANBATT TPS AT KITABI. REPORT REVEALED THAT THOSE SOLDIERS ESCAPED FROM A CAMP IN ZAIRE. LATER ON THEY WERE HANDED OVER TO MILOBS WHO ESCORTED THEM TO BUTARE FROM GIKONGORO.

(3) MILITIA. ACTS OF BANDITRY REPORTED TO HAVE INCREASED IN SECTOR 4. ALLEDGED INTERAHAMWE ACTIVITIES HAVE ALSO BEEN REPORTED IN KIBUNGO AREA IN SECTOR 2 AND SUBVERSIVE ACTIVITIES IN SECTOR 4 AREAS.

B. OWN ACTIVITIES

(1) UNAMIR. NORMAL ROUTINE WAS CONDUCTED. LT GEN SWINBURN, THE UK FD ARMY COMMANDER VISITED UNAMIR. INDIAN MILITARY RECONNAISSANCE TEAM CARRIED OUT 4 DAYS RECCE TO VARIOUS SECTORS FOR POTENTIAL DEPLOYMENT OF AN INDIAN CONTINGENT UNDER UNAMIR COMMAND. UNAMIR TROOPS DEPLOYED IN VARIOUS SECTORS HAS CONFISCATED MANY ARMS, GRENADES AND AMMUNITION DURING THE PERIOD. FC VISITED SECTOR 4 LOCATION AND DFC ALSO VISITED CYANGUGU, KIBUNGO AND RUSUMO ALONG THE ZAIRIAN BORDER. FC MET THE PRESIDENT AND THE MINISTER OF DEFENCE DURING THE PERIOD. SRSG AND THE FORCE COMMANDER GAVE A PRESS BRIEFING. THEY ADDRESSED THE ISSUES OF:

(A) THE INTEGRATION OF RGF INTO THE NATIONAL ARMY AND THE RESTORATION OF A CIVIL ADMINISTRATION IN SECTOR 4.

(B) THE ROLE AND MANDATE OF THE COMMISSION OF EXPERTS AND OF THE UN CENTRE FOR HUMAN RIGHTS.

THE SRSG AND THE FC ALSO RECEIVED THE TROIKA MISSION, HEADED BY MR REPNIK THE PARLIAMENTARY STATE SECRETARY. SOME LEAFLETS WERE DISTRIBUTED IN SECTOR 4 AREAS TO CALL FOR THE VOLUNTARY SURRENDER OF WEAPONS AMONG GENDARMERIE. 23 PFA CONTINUED TO PROVIDE MED SP FOR DISPLACED PERSON. THEY ALSO CONTINUED TO WORK IN THE MORE INACCESSIBLE AREAS OF SECTOR 4A. BRITCON ENGR HAS COMPLETED THE MAINTENANCE WORKS OF BRIDGE AT GATUNA. THEY ALSO COMPLETED THE MAINTENANCE WORKS ON THE MSR BETWEEN BYUMBA AND GATUNA. CANSIG ESTB VHF VOICE AND

INMARSAT COMM BETWEEN UNAMIR HQ AND SECTORS 4A, 4B, 5 AND 2 (CAN) FD AMB. HF ONLY WITH MILOB, BRITCON, AUSCON AND CANCON AND SECTOR 1, 23 (UK) PARA FD AMB AND FORCE MEDICAL OPS CENTRE. AUSMED CONTINUED TO PROVIDE SECOND AND THIRD LEVEL OF MEDICAL SUPPORT TO UNAMIR TPS THROUGHOUT RWANDA. ETHIOBATT HAVE ARRESTED 11 BANDITS WITH 4 X AK47 RIFLES. RGF HAVE ALSO SURRENDERED LARGE NO OF WPNS AND MIL EQPT AT VARIOUS PLACES. THEY HAVE SURRENDERED 58 DIFFERENT KINDS OF ARMS, 2 X AK47 RIFLE AND 3 DIFFERENT TYPES OF VEHS. US FORCES CONTINUED TO ASSIST FLIGHTS AT KIA IN COORDINATION WITH UNAMIR

(2) UNOMUR. AREA OF OPERATION IS CALM. CONDUCTED ROUTINE PATROLS. PROVIDED HELICOPTERS IN KIGALI AND THE OTHERS ARE OPERATIONAL. THE SRSG WENT TO UNOMUR KABALE ON 4 AUG TO MEET THE UNOMUR REPRESENTATIVES TO PLAN THE CLOSING CEREMONY OF UNOMUR WHICH IS SCHEDULED ON 20TH SEPTEMBER, 1994.

(3) MILOB GP HQ. THE SITUATION REMAINED CALM IN ALL SECTORS. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT PATROLS AND ESCORT DUTIES IN ALL SECTORS. CMO ALONG WITH SECTOR 3 COMD VISITED MILOBS LOC IN BUTARE. FAMILIARIZATION TOUR FOR THE SECOND BATCH OF NEWLY ARRIVED MILOBS HAS COMPLETED. MILOB TEAM IN GITARAMA RECEIVED INFO THAT RUINS OF A CHURCH IN KIVUMU GR 5673 WAS A (PREVIOUSLY REPORTED) MASSACRE SITE. THEY ALSO CONTINUED TO SEARCH FOR MASS GRAVES AND CONCENTRATIONS OF DISPLACED PERS IN THE SECTOR 3. MILOBS KEPT ON MONITORING THE MOVEMENT OF DISPLACED PERS ON MOST BORDERS WHICH SEEMS TO BE STABILIZING. MORE AND MORE PEOPLE ARE RETURNING HOME AND REBUILDING THEIR HOMES. MANY RETURNEES HAVE INFORMED THAT REFUGEES ARE COMING EITHER UNDER COVER OF DARKNESS OR DURING FIRST LIGHT TO AVOID POSSIBLE INTERAHAMWE ATTACK ON THE ZAIRIAN SIDE OF THE BORDER. ONE DOCTOR WAS SHOT BY AN UNKNOWN ARMED MAN IN THE VILLAGE OF KIRAHU GR 5131. BANDITRY AND MURDERS APPEAR TO BE ON THE INCREASE. OR ARE REPORTED MORE DUE TO INCREASED OBSR AND BETTER COMMS. THIS SIT IS CAUSING SOME CONCERN IN LOCAL POPULATION. CMO HELD HIS WEEKLY MEETING WITH THE SECTOR COMDS AT SECTOR 3 HQ AND DISCUSSED OPS, ADMIN AND OTHER LOG PROBLEMS. THERE ARE REPORTS OF AS MANY AS 10,000 RGF MEMBERS LOCATED IN ZAIRE OPPOSITE CYANGUGU. THESE SOLDIERS ARE BELIEVED TO HAVE CROSSED WITH 50% OF THEIR PERSONAL WEAPONS. THE POSSIBILITY OF HAVING HEAVY WEAPONS CAN NOT BE DISREGARDED. ABOUT TWO THIRDS OF THESE SOLDIERS WERE RECRUITED AND TRAINED DURING THE CIVIL WAR AND ARE BELIEVED TO BE POORLY TRAINED. THERE ARE STRONG RUMOURS THAT THESE SOLDIERS ARE BEING TRAINED BY THE ZAIRIAN ARMY. NONE OF THESE REPORTS/RUMOURS HAVE BEEN CONFIRMED. DURING THE PAST WEEK, THERE HAVE BEEN REPORTS OF RGF MEMBERS BEING SEEN ENTERING RWANDA IN SMALL GROUPS. THERE ARE ALSO REPORTS OF RGF MEMBERS

BLOCKING REFUGEES RETURNING TO RWANDA.

4. HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES. UNAMIR CONTINUED TO COORDINATE HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES IN CLOSE CONSULTATION WITH THE GOVERNMENT AND AID AGENCIES. IOM, UNHCR, UNAMIR CONTINUED TO PROVIDE TRANSPORT FOR DISPLACED PEOPLE FROM VARIOUS SECTORS TO KIGALI AND OTHER DESTINATIONS. HAC ALSO RECEIVED THE REQUEST FROM REFUGEES AT BURUNDI TO BE EVACUATED TO RWANDA. HAC DELIVERED FOOD ASSISTANCE TO VARIOUS ORPHANAGES IN RWANDA. MINISTRY OF REHABILITATION AND SOCIAL REINTEGRATION HAS ASKED UNAMIR'S ASSISTANCE IN PROVIDING FUEL TO RUN THE GENERATORS FOR THEIR NEW BUILDING. THEY HAVE ALSO REQUESTED UNAMIR TO ASSIST IN RETURNING RWANDESE REFUGEES FROM BURUNDI DUE TO THE INCREASED TENSION IN THAT AREA.

7. CONCLUSION. THE CURRENT SIT IN RWANDA IS FAIRLY STABLE. HOWEVER IT IS IMPORTANT THAT THE GOVERNMENT AS PART OF THE POST WAR TRANSITION GRADUALLY BUT FIRMLY TAKE CONTROL OF ITS SOVEREIGN TERRITORY ON BOTH THE CIVILIAN AND MILITARY LEVELS. IN THIS CONNECTION UNAMIR WORKED CLOSELY WITH THE GOVERNMENT TO COORDINATE THIS TRANSITION BOTH ON THE CIVILIAN AND MILITARY LEVEL. IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT THE BBGNU RECEIVE SOME FUNDS FOR SALARIES SO THAT IT CAN BUILD AND MAINTAIN ITS INFRASTRUCTURE.

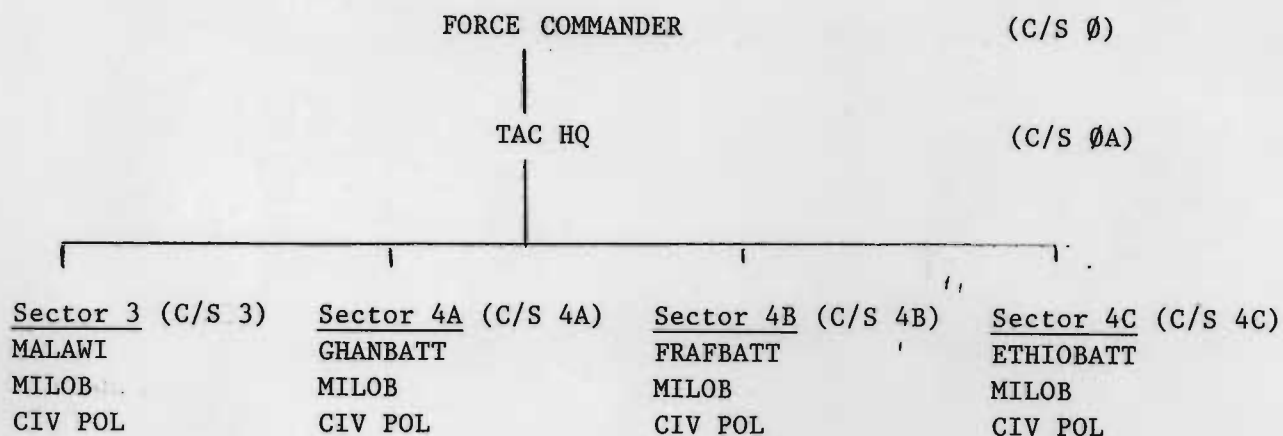

OPORD 18 (Maj Lidstone)

1. OPORD 18 (3000.15 (Ops) 31 Aug 94) and TACHQ Actuation Order (3000.15 (Ops) 21 Aug 94) establish TACHQ Butare as the Headquarters responsible for conduct of operations in Sector 3 and 4. The chain of Command/Organization is:



2. Effective this date, all communications requests and reports to be addressed to TAC HQ BUTARE (C/S ØA) only. TAC HQ will be only unit to speak with UNAMIR HQ Kigali and any direction from UNAMIR HQ Kigali to units is to be referred to TAC HQ BUTARE. This includes SITREPs which are to be addressed to TAC HQ only.

RELIEF IN PLACE GHANBATT/ZAMBATT

4. GHANBATT to keep TAC HQ advised on events for the relief in place. TAC HQ does not want to interfere with the operation but must be aware of activities and problems.

DISARMAMENT OF GENDARMES

5. It was determined that Gendarmes in Sector 4B and 4C are communal police forces and although armed have conducted themselves properly and with restraint. Both GHANBATT and FRAFBATT trust these forces and use them to augment security within their AOR.

Decision: TACHQ will determine if plan FOXTROT applies to all police forces or just those in Sector 4C.

CIVIL AUTHORITY

6. Commanding Officer GHANBATT advised there is no central civil authority within his Sector but rather the traditional communal structure still exists. Commanding Officer FRAFBATT advised that there is no legally constituted civil authority however some groups were deputized by the French and that these groups are speaking with the RPF/Kigali Government.

Decision: Commanding Officers were asked to review the current civil authority situation/capacity and prepare a written report. An assessment of communal police is to be part of the report.

RULES OF ENGAGEMENT

7. The Commanding Officer FRAFBATT asked to have Rules of Engagement translated/provided in French.

Decision: UNAMIR HQ will provide soonest.

DEFENSIVE MEASURES

8. Units are asked to critically examine each position for defense capability. Some positions are so close to crowds that they are open to attack and not easily defensible without harming innocent people.

Decision: Commanding Officers to decide whether to move vulnerable positions or provide/improve positions so that they are not vulnerable to small arms and grenades.

FORCE COMMANDER VISIT

9. It was announced that during the Force Commander Visit, it is expected he will advise who the RPA LO to each Battalion Commander will be.

HUMANITARIAN AFFAIRS (Maj Pazik)

10. Advised there were 82 Non-Government Organizations (NGOs) officially operating in Rwanda under the coordination of UNREO. Not all were in every Sector and their activities are not well coordinated.

Decision: Battalions to appoint an officer to liaise with and advise TACHQ of this officer's rank, name and location. If the unit can not spare an officer then advise TACHQ so that a Humanitarian Officer can be assigned from UNAMIR HQ.

REPORTING OF HUMANITARIAN PROBLEMS

11. It was requested that any problems, concerns or requests or humanitarian assistance be included in SITREPs under paragraph 5. Humanitarian Activities. Maj Pazik will address these issues.

Decision: Identify problems, concerns or requests in SITREPs under paragraph 5.

PRISONERS OF WAR AND CRIMINALS

12. Procedures for handling POWS (former RGF and Militia arrested for a criminal activity) and criminals (anyone not suspected of being a former RGF or Militia who is caught committing a crime/civil offence) were briefed:

- a. Prisoners of War (POW) - anyone suspected of belonging to the former RGF or Militia and who surrenders or is caught committing a criminal offence is to be disarmed, have military equipment seized, and taken to the nearest RPA check point where, in the presence of the Red Cross or a MILOB, the person is to be turned over to a RPA officer, not less than the rank of Lieutenant (LT). The seized firearms, ammunition and military equipment is to be disposed as per UNAMIR HQ Instructions.
- b. Criminals: anyone caught or suspected of a criminal offence AND who is not also suspected of being a member of the former RGF and Militia, is to be arrested, disarmed and taken to the nearest RPA checkpoint where in the presence of a Human Rights official or MILOB the person will be surrendered to the RPA.

13. In all cases, an individual will not be handed over to the RPA without a UN official being present. If necessary the unit shall confine the individual until such time as arrangements can be made for the surrender. While under confinement, the individual will be treated with dignity and provide with food, water and blankets.

PROTECTION/EVACUATION OF NGOS

14. UNAMIR troops have a responsibility to protect NGOs regardless of the circumstance.

Decision: Units to identify and maintain current, a listing of NGO people and where they live and work and then develop a plan to bring these people to safe havens pending evacuation. Note Plan Turtle (to be issued) will form the base for the evacuation of NGOs.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

15. Repairs to roads and bridges must be completed before the rainy season or there will be no movement. Commanding Officers were requested to identify what work was required. GHANBATT expressed the concern that NGO vehicles were too large for the roads.

Decision: Commanding Officers to identify work required and submit in writing. Commanding Officer have the authority to place

weight restrictions upon routes.

FREEDOM OF MOVEMENT

16. Although RPA forward positions may say/believe that there are areas UN troops may not enter, this is not true except for fixed installations.

Decision TACHQ will pursue through UNAMIR HQ and RPA HQ Kigali.

RESUPPLY AND EQUIPMENT (Maj Cooper-Glawu)

17. Units must submit their requirements in writing for material and stores required. The period required to demand and deliver the stores will depend upon the type of item requested. Stores such as fuel, rations and water are stockpiled and their delivery depends upon transport. As stores will be delivered to units once every 7 days, units must plan/anticipate their needs for the next 7-14 days.

Decision: Units must anticipate what they will need for the next 7-14 day period then submit their needs in writing to G4. Emergency demands will be filled as quickly as stocks, transportation and the Tactical situation permits.

18. G4 will arrange resupply to FRAFBATT before 15 Sep 94.

UNIT CONCERNS

19. FRAFBATT identified the need for perimeter lights, barbed wire and sand bags.

Decision: Units to submit their requirements in writing to G4.

20. Upon deployment, FRAFBATT was advised that the Nigerian Coy would occupy Sector 4B-C thus freeing the current deployed company as a reserve.

Decision: TACHQ will confirm the planned deployment of the Nigerian Coy.


PROBLEMS

21. Units are to identify possible problems as early as possible to TACHQ so that a plan to resolve the problem can be made.

22. TACHQ intends to conduct regular meeting at Butare and unit

DAILY REPORT ON RADIO RWANDA PROGRAMMES

Kigali, March 22, 1995 - A UNAMIR soldier of the Nigerian contingent deployed in Byumba, in secteur Buhambe, identified as Sergeant Okun, on Sunday night shot and killed a UNAMIR employee, Mr. Alphonse Gacamumakuba. According to eyewitnesses, Sergeant Okun who appeared to be drunk arrived from his sentry post at a bar where Gacamumakuba who also was drunk, was quarrelling with a barmaid who was known as a mistress for both Gacamumakuba and Sergeant Okun. Sergeant Okun intervened to separate Gacamumakuba from the barmaid to prevent a clash, but was not involved in the dispute. At about 20 hours, Gacamumakuba left the bar to go home, in the proximity of the UNAMIR compound, and was followed by Sergeant Okun, and a man called Sendongo. At about 1 hours, Gacamumakuba was shot dead near the UNAMIR compound by Sergeant Okun, as eyewitnessed by a neighbour named Bertin Nyangezi.

The local military commander at Byumba confirmed that Sergeant Okun killed Gacamumakuba in a rivalry over a woman they both loved. The Councillor of Buhambe sector where UNAMIR troops are deployed complained that UNAMIR troops were bringing to Byumba unidentified people, especially women from Uganda, Tanzania, and all prefectures of the country, who came to sleep with the soldiers for dollars, and caused insecurity in the area, and that UNAMIR presence was useless in the area.

UNAMIR has published its version of the circumstances of the incident which confirms that UNAMIR troops shot dead a Rwandese civilian national who tried to force his entry into the UNAMIR camp.

- A cabinet meeting met on Tuesday under the chairmanship of President Pasteur Bizimungu of Rwanda. The cabinet examined the law on investment, and privatisation of public companies. The

cabinet also dismissed the rumours speaking of massacres allegedly planned for the month of April, and impending armed attack on Rwanda from outside the country, and reassured the population.

The cabinet also discussed the issue of a national airplane Boeing 707 that was sold in last March at a lower price. The Minister for Transport and Communications was charged to follow-up the matter.

The cabinet also approved the appointment of the ambassadors of Burundi, Egypt, Netherlands, India, and the Vatican, to Rwanda.

- RWF 122 million have been embezzled from the Rwandese Ministry of Finance by two civil servants working with the Ministry. The money consisted of taxes collected from the Brewing company BRALIRWA based in Gisenyi. One of the two civil servants has been arrested, and his colleague has disappeared from the country via Gatuna border with the money. Investigations are underway into the incident.

- The Special Representative of the United Nations Secretary-General for Rwanda, Ambassador Shaharyar Khan told the BBC that a clandestine group of Rwandese nationals who recently arrived in Ivory Coast was involved in the killing of Rwandese nationals originally living in that country. He said that he informed Ivory Coast about the incident and the Ivory Coast Government pledged to investigate the matter.

DAILY REPORT ON RADIO RWANDA PROGRAMMES

Kigali, March 23, 1995 - The dead body of the late Mr. Alphonse Gacamumakuba, a Rwandese national who was employed by UNAMIR in Byumba, and who was shot dead by a UNAMIR soldier on March 20, was on Wednesday handed over to his family in Byumba by UNAMIR. Speaking at the ceremony, a UNAMIR representative regretted the incident but wished that it should not be the pretext for mistrust between the Rwandese population and UNAMIR. He also announced that UNAMIR was conducting investigations into the incident in order to take measures against those responsible.

The local Military commander in Byumba, Major Birasa said that the Rwandese have the right to pursue the author of the crime and to ensure that he be punished in an exemplary manner.

- Three Members of the Rwandese Parliament were sworn in on Wednesday in Kigali in the Parliament House, in a ceremony presided over by President Pasteur Bizimungu of Rwanda. 66 MPs have been sworn in so far in the 70 MPs that will compose the Rwandese Parliament. According to the Speaker of the Parliament, Mr. Juvenal Nkusi, the four remaining MPs will be sworn in on 12 May.

In his address on the occasion, President Bizimungu said that the Government had submitted draft laws to the Parliament proposing that loans be given to Rwandese for their rebuilding work, and to businessmen to resume their activities.

President Bizimungu also dismissed the rumours alleging that reprisal massacres are planned to take place in Rwanda in the month of April, and speaking of an impending armed attack on Rwanda from neighbouring countries.

- The Rwandese Ministry of Finance and the Rwandese Brewing Company BRALIRWA, on Wednesday denied the reports carried by Radio Rwanda on Tuesday alleging that rwf122 million have been embezzled from the Ministry of Finance by two of its employees.

- The Rwandese Minister for Foreign Affairs, Dr. Anastase Gasana on Wednesday received a British delegation led by the Spokesman for the British Foreign Ministry, Mr. Robin Cook. Their talks centered on the repatriation of Rwandese refugees, the relations between Rwanda and Great Britain, the International Tribunal, and the NGOs operating in Rwanda. Mr. Gasana expressed his satisfaction with the foreign NGOs humanitarian contribution, especially in the areas of Health and Agriculture.

Dr. Gasana also received a Canadian delegation led by the Canadian ambassador to Rwanda. He invited the Canadian ambassador as well as the former UNAMIR Force Commander, General Romeo Dallaire, to attend the public funeral of the national heroes that will take place on 7 April, at Rebero hill in Kigali. Those remains of the national heroes include the remains of the late Agathe Uwilingiyimana, who was Prime Minister, and other Rwandese Government ministers, who were massacred in April 1994.

- Security problems are still reported in Rutsiro commune, in Kibuye prefecture, where a group of people known as "Ingamba" hiding in Gishwati Forest, cause instability.

- The Rwandese Minister for Primary and Secondary Education, Mr. P.C Rwigema on Wednesday announced that 22 Rwandese secondary schools in the 80 registered secondary schools would re-open by the end of the month of March, with the assistance of the UNHCR which will provide 16 vehicles, and food supplies, in cooperation with the WFP.

A. POLITICAL. A MEETING ON "IDP CAMPS" WAS ORGANISED IN THE PREFECTURE FROM 0830 HRS TO 1030 HRS. IT WAS CHAIRED BT THE PREFECT, MR Z FELIX. THE FOLLOWING ATTENDED:

THE PREFECT STATED THAT THE IDPs WERE HESITANT TO RETURN TO THEIR HOME COMMUNES, AND THE REASONS WERE, THE PRESENCE OF THE FORMER RGF AND INTERHAMWE IN THESE CAMPS WHO WERE PRESSURISING THE DPs NOT TO RETURN, FALSE RUMOURS, THE VESTED INTERESTS OF THE NGOS AND THE UNCERTAIN SECURITY SITUATION IN THE HOME COMMUNES. IN THE DISCUSSION THAT ENSUED SUGGESTIONS WERE GIVEN BY SOME REPS TO WORK OUT THE MODALITIES OF REPATRIATING THE IDPs TO THEIR HOME COMMUNES. THE PREFECT SUGGESTED THAT THIS TASK HAS TO BE DONE JOINTLY AND SOME NGOS AND MILOBS SHOULD MONITOR THE HOME COMMUNES. HE ALSO SUGGESTED THAT KAMANA 5196 CAMP SHOULD BE THE FIRST TO CLOSE DOWN, DUE TO ITS PROXIMITY TO THE BURUNDI BORDER. THE IOC SUGGESTED A FRESH INFORMATION CAMPAIGN TO BE LAUNCHED, TO ENCOURAGE THE IDPs TO RETURN. HE STATED THAT AT KIGALI, HE WOULD LIAISE WITH THE GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS TO FINALISE THE MEANS AND WAYS OF IMPLEMENTING THIS CAMPAIGN. HE EXPECTED THE SAME TO BE LAUNCHED BY 26 MAR. THE HUMAN RIGHTS STATED THAT IT IS VERY IMPORTANT TO IMPLEMENT

JUSTICE, SO THAT THE FEAR FROM THE MINDS OF THE PEOPLE IS ERADICATED. THE RPA COMMANDER APPRECIATED THE CONCERN, BUT MENTIONED THAT WE CAN NOT KEEP WAITING FOR THIS, AS JUDICIAL PROCESS MAY TAKE EVEN FOUR YEARS TO TAKE SHAPE. IT WAS DECIDED TO HOLD THE SAME MEETING AGAIN ON 30 MAR, AND ALL PARTICIPANTS WERE URGED TO COME WITH SOME CONCRETE SUGGESTIONS.

COMMENTS: THERE WAS GENUINE INTEREST SHOWN BY EVERYONE, AND SEEMS TO BE A GOOD EFFORT IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.

B. MILITARY. NORMAL RPA FOOT AND MOBILE PATROLS WERE OBSERVED. IT WAS REPORTED THAT THE RPA HAS FORCIBLY OCCUPIED A BUILDING COMPLEX OF THE CARITAS AT RWAMIKO 4914. IT IS FURTHER ALLEGED THAT THEY INTEND TO OCCUPY THIS BUILDING FOR AN INDEFINITE PERIOD, THOUGH IT WAS INITIALLY OCCUPIED TO MONITOR THE EXAMS.

3. OWN ACTIVITY.

A. SECTOR HQ. THE HQ MONITORED AND COORDINATED ACTIVITIES OF THE TEAMS. THE OPS OFFICER ATTENDED A MEETING AT THE PREFECTURE. THE SECTOR COMMANDER PROCEEDED TO KIGALI.

B. TEAM 1. THE TEAM ON STANDBY DUTY DUE TO NON AVAILABILITY OF VEHICLE.

C. TEAM 2. THE TEAM MONITORED OP RETOUR AT KIBEHO 5107 AND NDAGO 520023. THEY REPORTED FOOD DISTRIBUTION AT RWAMIKO 4914 BY THE ICRC. 10 TRUCKS WERE USED TO CARRY THE FOOD AND DISTRIBUTED TO 12000 DPs. THE STRENGTH OF THE CAMP IS 22000. THE TEAM REPORTED FORCIBLE OCCUPATION OF A CARITAS BUILDING, AND A CASE OF BANDITRY AT THE SAME PLACE.

D. TEAM 3. THE TEAM AT OP RUBY AND PATROLLED KAMANA 5196, MUNINI 4899, NDAGO 520023, KIBEHO 5107, RWAMIKO 4914, BUHORO 465213, NYAMIGINA 4523, AND GIKONGORO. THEY REPORTED FOOD DISTRIBUTION AT KAMANA BY THE ICRC.

E. TEAM 4. THE TEAM WITNESSED THE HANDING TAKING OVER OF A SUSPECT, BY THE ZAMBATT, AT THE PROSECUTORS OFFICE. THE ACCUSED, EMMANUEL BANGUWILA, OF IDP CAMP KIBEHO HAD RAPED A 08 YEARS GIRL, IN FEB 95.

F. TEAM 5. THE TEAM PATROLLED GIKONGORO, KIGEME 475257 AND MURAMBI 3538. AT MURAMBI THERE ARE PROBLEMS OF ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD. AT KIGEME CAMP THE DOCUMENTATION PROCESS HAS COMMENCED FOR THE SUBSEQUENT REPATRIATION OF THESE REFUGEES TO BURUNDI. THE STRENGTH OF THE CAMP IS 2151.



SUBJECT: PROTECTION OF DISPLACED PERSONS CAMPS - ROE

Ref: A. FRAGO No. 02 to OPORD 20 dated 22 oct 94
B. UN Security Council Resolution 925 dated 8 June 94
C. OPDIR No. 2 - ROE dated 6 Oct 94

1. Reference A directs all commanders to increase UN presence in refugee camps within RWANDA. Contingency plans have been developed to reinforce certain sectors in the event that displaced persons (DPs) are forcibly removed from their camps.

2. Clearly, if this situation arises, the potential for confrontation will emerge. Under these circumstances, a sound understanding of the applicable Rules of Engagement is fundamental.

3. Reference B mandates UNAMIR to "contribute to the security and protection of displaced persons, refugees and civilians at risk in RWANDA" and "Recognizes that UNAMIR may be required to take action in self-defence against persons or groups who threaten protected sites and populations, United Nations and other humanitarian personnel or the means of delivery and distribution of humanitarian relief".

4. Reference C provides clear guidance for the application of Resolution 925. The following provisions should be specifically noted:

- a. Authority to use force. The use of force is authorized to protect the above designated individuals against forcible removal from the camps which they occupy (Ref C, para 8).
- b. The principles for the use of force must be adhered to (Ref C, para 7).
- c. Challenge and escalation procedures are to be followed (Ref C, paras 14 and 15).



Political Information Officers

1. A critical concern and objective of the United Nations in Rwanda, as established by the Security Council, remains the alleviation of the suffering of the Rwandese people and the restoration of peace and national reconciliation. To this end, the Council has mandated UNAMIR to carry out a number of important humanitarian tasks and has also invited the Secretary-General and his Special Representative, in coordination with the OAU and countries in the region, to continue their efforts to achieve a political settlement in Rwanda within the framework of the Arusha Peace Agreement.

2. Since the RPF's unilateral cease-fire on 18 July and the setting up on 19 July of a Broad-Based Government of National Unity in Kigali, intensive efforts have continued at various levels to facilitate the repatriation of an estimated 4 million refugees and displaced persons and to promote political reconciliation in Rwanda.

3. The United Nations, as reflected in the Security Council presidential statement of 14 October, remains concerned about the need to stabilize the overall situation in Rwanda. In this connection, the Council, in that statement, endorsed the Secretary-General's call on the Government of Rwanda to maintain an open dialogue with all political interest groups in Rwanda in an effort to achieve genuine reconciliation between all elements of Rwandese society, within the framework of the Arusha Peace Agreement and also called for assistance for Rwanda's socio-economic reconstruction, including the restoration of civil administration. The Council, in particular, also encouraged the Rwandese Government to continue its efforts to invite members of the former ruling party, the MRND, who were not involved in the massacres that took place in the country recently, to participate in the Government and to absorb members of the former Rwandese Government Forces (RGF), into the new national army.

4. In pursuance of its overall objective of promoting peace and reconciliation in Rwanda, UNAMIR is deploying Political Information Officers to the five Sectors covering the entire country outside Kigali. These Officers will work in concert with UNAMIR military forces deployed in those sectors, as well as with the provincial, municipal and local administrators and other segments of the society to promote and facilitate reconciliation. Among the specific tasks of the Political Information Officers, are the following:

- assist the Government in the re-establishment of civil administration at the provincial, municipal and local levels, and in the promotion of national reconciliation;

- monitor developments, especially in the areas of peace and national reconciliation, and report to the Office of the Special Representative;

- assist in the coordination of humanitarian relief operations in their respective sectors;

- disseminate information on the activities and programmes of UNAMIR and on United Nations agencies;

- provide political advice to the administrative component in the respective sectors.

NTYAZO AND MUYIRA

1. AS A FOLLOW UP TO A VISIT TO NTYAZO 27 SEP, A SUBSEQUENT PATROL ON 28 SEP WAS CONDUCTED BY A MEMBER OF TAC HQ STAFF, BUTARE HAC OFFR AND A MILOB TM, FIRST TO NTYAZO THEN TO MUYIRA. THE RECEPTION AT NTYAZO COMMENCED WITH A HASTY BARRICADE AT THE BACK ENTRANCE TO THE RPA CONTROLLED COMMUNE OFFICES. TWO NGO REPS FROM FROM FEED THE CHILDREN WHO ACCOMPANIED OUR VEHICLES WAS SHOWN BY US TO THE SCHOOL. IT SHOULD BE NOTED THAT AN RPA LO WAS UNABLE TO COME WITH US AND THE SOUS-PREFET WAS APPARENTLY NOT WILLING TO COME WITH US WITHOUT THE RPA LO. IT WAS AGREED AT NGO MTG THE PREVIOUS NIGHT THAT AT 0900 HRS BOTH WOULD ACCOMPANY US TO NTYAZO. WE HELD OUR DEPARTURE UNTIL 1030 HRS AND EVEN MADE A PERSONAL VISIT AND 2 PHONE CALLS TO THE PREFET OFFICE. WE WERE REQ TO GET PERMISSION FROM THE SECUR OFFR ON BEHALF OF THE SOUS-PREFET. ALTHOUGH THIS IS NOT NORMAL, NOR APPROPRIATE, WE OBLIGED AND WENT TO SEE HIM. WE WAITED, BUT WERE UNSUCCESSFUL TO SEE ANYONE.

2. SOLDIERS AT NTYAZO (GR 8731) WERE EVEN MORE DEFENSIVE AND NEGATIVE TODAY THAN THE DAY BEFORE. AGAIN, NO OFFICER OR SENIOR PERS WAS PRESENT TO SPEAK WITH. A MAN DRESSED IN CIV CLOTHES ACCOMPANIED BY AN ARMED COMMANDO FROM THE RPA ENTERED THE RPA LINES BUT WOULD NOT SPEAK WITH US. WE WERE TOLD THAT THE BURGEMEISTER WAS NOT THERE. A WOMAN WHO ADMITTED BEING RPA SHOWED UP CLAIMING TO WORK FOR THE BURGEMEISTER. SHE WAS VERY APPREHENSIVE AND DEFENSIVE WITH US. SHE DID NOT KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT REFUGEES ARRIVING TWO DAYS AGO, HOW MANY REFUGEES HAD RTN IN THE RECENT WEEKS, NOR EVEN HOW MANY PEOPLE WERE IN THE COMMUNE. SHE, LIKE OTHER CIVIC OFFICIALS IN THAT AREA, WERE NOT FROM THERE, BUT FROM ELSEWHERE. SHE WAS FROM BURUNDI. ALL CONVERSATIONS TOOK PLACE AT THE RPA GATE, NOT IN COMMUNE LINES OR OFFICES. THIS WAS INAPPROPRIATE AND WAS WITNESSED BY SEVERAL LOCALS WAITING TO SEE THE BURGEMEISTER. WE WERE NOT ALLOWED PAST WITHOUT WRITTEN PERMISSION FROM THE RPA. AS WAS MENTIONED BY THE RPA 27 SEP, THE RPA REPEATED THEIR NON-INTEREST IN COMMUNE MATTERS. THEY APPEARED VERY SUSPICIOUS OF OUR PRESENCE AND WOULD NOT GIVE ANY NAMES, EXCEPT THE NAME OF THE BURGEMEISTER, NAMED SILAS MUNYAMPUNDU.

3. IT WAS REITERATED BY UNAMIR OFFICERS THAT IT WAS OUR MISSION TO CONDUCT RECCE OF FACILITIES AVAL, CFM IF THE COMMUNE WAS ABLE TO HANDLE AN INFLUX OF RETURNING REFUGEES, AND IDENTIFY AND ASSIST IN ANY PROBLEMS ASSOC WITH COORD AND ORGANIZATION OF REDIRECTING SP TO THE COMMUNE FOR MED, EDUCATIONAL, FOOD NEEDS, ETC. THEY WERE NOT INTERESTED IN HELPING IDENTIFYING THESE REQUIREMENTS, NOR WAS ANYONE WE SPOKE TO REALLY CAPABLE TO GIVE US THE DATA. WE COULD NOT LOOK AT ANY STRUCTURAL COMMUNE FACILITIES (EXCEPT THE SCHOOL) SINCE THEY WERE ALL BEHIND RPA LINES. AGAIN, NO REFUGEES COULD BE FOUND THAT WERE DROPPED OFF AT NTYAZO ON THE 26 SEP.

4. RPA SOLDIERS WERE SPARSE AND POORLY EQUIPPED IN COMPARISON WITH OTHER UNITS, AND AGAIN, NO LEADERS WERE PRESENT. SEVERAL FIRING POSN AND BUNKERS ARE MAINTAINED THROUGHOUT THE AREA. ALL HAD BEEN IN POSN FOR SEVERAL MONTHS AND MANY WERE POORLY POSITIONED. IT'S POSSIBLE THAT SOME OF THESE BUNKERS AND TRENCHES WERE ORIGINALLY RGF POSITIONS. LOCALS AND OFFICIALS CLAIM THERE WAS NO MILITARY BATTLES IN THE AREA, ONLY INTERAHAMWE/CIV ACTIVITY, BOTH WITH FIREARMS AND MACHETE. NO PRISONERS OR APPARENT GUARDS COULD BE SEEN TODAY IN THE LOC THEY WERE OBSERVED YESTERDAY. IT IS POSSIBLE THAT THE CELL WAS SINCE MOVED. ALTHOUGH THESE THINGS WERE OBSERVED, RPA DENIED TO HAVE ANYTHING TO DO WITH PRISONERS WHEN ASKED THE PREVIOUS DAY.

5. AT MUYIRA (GR 8540), THE GREETING WAS ALSO NOT VERY POSITIVE AT THE START. UPON FINDING THE BURGERMEISTER, HE FELT IT UNNECESSARY TO SHOW US WHERE WE COULD FIND REFUGEES THAT HAD ARRIVED TWO DAYS AGO. HE DEPARTED MID-CONVERSATION TO TALK WITH SOMEONE ELSE, AND CAME BACK SAYING HE WAS GOING TO EAT AND REST, THEN MAYBE HE COULD HELP US. FURTHER NEGOTIATION ENSUED, AND AFTER A 30 MIN WAIT, THE BURGERMEISTER AND HIS ASSISTANT BOARDED OUR VEHICLE AND WE DROVE 10 KM NE TO MUNYINYA (GR 9245) AND LOC A FAMILY OF FOUR THAT HAD RTN FROM GIKONGORO BY UNAMIR TPT. ALL WAS OK AND THEY WERE LIVING IN THEIR PREVIOUS HOME. ALL PEOPLE IN THE AREA ARE LIVING WITHIN AN ETHNICALLY MIXED COMMUNITY. THEY SPOKE OF OTHERS THEY HAD RTN WITH AND GAVE NO INDICATION OF ANY GRAVE PROBLEMS. DURING THE DRIVE AND THE VISIT, THE MEETING WITH COMMUNE OFFICIALS THROUGHOUT THE VILLAGES BECAME MORE AND MORE POSITIVE. JULES, THE ASSISTANT, AND OPINION LEADERS OF THE COMMUNE WERE VERY HELPFUL IN PROVIDING INFORMATION.

6. LOCAL OFFICIALS AT MUYIRA WERE QUERIED WHY THERE WAS SUCH AN APPARENT DIFFERENCE IN THE GEN SIT AND ATTITUDE BETWEEN MUYIRA AND NTYAZO. THE COMMUNE OFFICIALS STATED THAT THERE WERE SEVERAL REASONS BASED ON RPA LIAISON AND THEIR OWN OPINION. THE MAIN CROSSING POINT FROM BURUNDI IS IN CLOSE PROXIMITY TO NTYAZO. THIS AREA WAS UTILIZED BEFORE AND DURING THE WAR. NTYAZO WAS ALSO A PRIMARY COMMUNE WHERE MANY OF THE ANTI-TUTSI ATROCITIES HAD STEMMED FROM. ALL TUTSI HOMES IN THIS AREA HAVE BEEN DESTROYED AND THEIR CATTLE EITHER KILLED OR STOLEN. MANY PEOPLE FORMERLY FROM NTYAZO DO NOT WISH TO RETURN TO THIS LOCATION AND HAVE RESETTLED IN MUYIRA. MANY RESIDENTS NOW LIVING IN BURUNDI ARE ACTUALLY FROM NTYAZO AND MUYIRA AREA. IT IS APPARENTLY THESE PEOPLE, NOT RGF/MILITARY ACTION, THAT ARE CROSSING THE BORDER AT THE NTYAZO AREA AND STEALING MATERIAL AND CATTLE; IN SOME CASES, FROM THEIR FORMER HOMES, AND THEN RETURNING TO BURUNDI. THERE ARE ALSO INCIDENTS WHERE THESE PEOPLE ARE POSSIBLY INTENDING TO MURDER CURRENT RESIDENTS THAT MAY HAVE WITNESSED MURDERS TAKE PLACE IN AN ATTEMPT TO COVER UP CRIMES THAT THEY HAVE COMMITTED. BOTH THE BURGERMEISTER AND HIS ASSISTANT ADMITTED THAT THE SECUR IN AND AROUND NTYAZO WAS DIFFICULT FOR THE RPA TO COORD AND CONTROL. A PROPOSAL TO POSITION UNAMIR TROOPS IN THE NTYAZO AREA TO INCREASE

SECUR OF ITS RESIDENTS AND CREATE A BETTER ATMOSPHERE TO ENCOURAGE RETURNEES WAS QUERIED TO MUYIRA COMMUNE OFFICIALS. ONE OF THESE OFFICIALS WAS CFM AS RPA. BOTH HIM AND OTHERS WERE VERY RECEPTIVE TO THIS AND WOULD SP THE IDEA. UNFORTUNATELY, THIS QUERY COULD NOT BE ALSO BE PASSED IN ANY OFFICIAL CAPACITY AT THE COMMUNE OF NTYAZO ITSELF.

7. UNTIL OFFICIALS FROM THE BUTARE PREFECTURE AND THE RPA VISIT NTYAZO AND MAKE SOME KIND OF PRELIMINARY ARRANGEMENTS FOR UNAMIR AND NGO COORD, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT NO FURTHER REFUGEE TRAFFIC BE TPT TO NTYAZO. IT IS BELIEVED, HOWEVER, THAT WITH IMPROVED SECUR TOGETHER WITH NGO SP FOR MED AND FOOD, THE AREA HAS POTENTIAL FOR RESETTLEMENT. MANY CHILDREN WITH DISTENDED STOMACHS WERE OBSERVED IN BOTH AREAS, AND LIKE OTHER LOCS, MOST SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN ARE FEMALE. THREE TEACHERS ARE IN LOC AT NTYAZO, BUT ARE SEVERELY LACKING SUPPLIES AND MATERIAL. TIME IS SHORT FOR CROP CULTIVATION AND SEEDING. EFFORT MUST BE MADE TO COORD UNAMIR/NGO ACCESS, FOR THE COMMUNE TO COLLECT DATA ON IT RESIDENTS, AND COMPLETE FURTHER LIFTS TO THE AREA WITHIN THE NEXT FEW WEEKS. REGARDING UNHCR REGISTRATION AT THE DEPARTURE CAMPS AND OF NO UNHCR FOLLOW UP THUS FAR, THE PROCEDURE OF HAVING THE COMMUNE CONDUCT THE REGISTRATION AT THE DESTINATION WITH HCR ASST SHOULD BE CONSIDERED. THIS IS SUBSTANTIATED IN THE CASE OF NTYAZO, WHERE APPARENTLY ALL REFUGEES WHO PREVIOUSLY REGISTERED FOR NTYAZO, AND SUBSEQUENTLY DROPPED OFF THERE, CANNOT YET BE LOCATED AND MAY HAVE WALKED TO MUYIRA COMMUNE INSTEAD.

MOVEMENT OF DISPLACED PERSONS FROM SECTOR 4

1. The problems associated with the movement of DPs from sector 4 are well documented but there are several points which should be actioned if the plan is to succeed. This letter is written to amplify BRITCON observations which have been passed to this HQ from our med assets within sector 4.

2. At a meeting in GIKONGURU on 29 Sep 94, the NGOs present requested that UNAMIR confirm or deny the rumours of human rights violations by the RPA. Without an authoritative answer, the NGOs working within the DPs camps stated that there were not prepared to assist in OP HOMEWARD. Representatives from ICRC and UNHCR stated that it was not their responsibility to persuade DPs to return home; a point which is closely linked to the subject of reassurance about human rights violations.

3. It is suggested that a joint operation with UNAMIR and the NGOs be established which is coordinated with the RPA to reassure these Dps. It is suggested that:

a. UNAMIR should brief the NGOs on the facts concerning human rights violations.

b. Satisfied returnees be identified to visit camps and confirm conditions.

c. Community leaders be allowed to recce their home communes.

d. Initiate a psychological operations campaign to counter the RGF radio broadcasts from ZAIRE and BURUNDI.

e. Confirm the government's position regarding the DP problem and attempt to involve the RPA as part of the overall plan. This should include reassuring speeches within the camps and better treatment of the returnees at the registration points. It is also suggested that the RPA policy of burning out the DPs is sending the wrong message.

4. If OP HOMEWARD is to be resumed, then it should be noted that attempts to move DPs on market days or food distribution days will result in a poor response. It is suggested that the

SITREP COVERING PERIOD 160600 TO 170600 AUG 94.

1. GEN SITUATION. THE OVERALL POLITICAL AND MILITARY SITUATION IN RWANDA REMAINS CALM. DISPLACED PERSONS CONTINUED TO RETURN TO KIGALI AND SURROUNDING AREAS. THERE WAS AN INCREASE IN THE NUMBERS OF PEOPLE MOVING FROM KIBUYE TOWARDS THE SOUTH. THE VISIT OF THE GOVERNMENT DELEGATION TO GIKONGRO WAS A GREAT SUCCESS. THE NEW FORCE COMMANDER WAS BRIEFED YESTERDAY BY THE OUTGOING FC AND BRANCH HEADS ON THE OVERALL SITUATION AS PART OF THE HANDING OVER PROCESS. HE ALSO MET THE VP OF RWANDA. FIVE FLIGHTS INTO KIGALI BROUGHT IN MORE ETHIOPIAN TROOPS AND THEIR EQUIPMENT.

2. POLITICAL ACTIVITIES: EX RWANDESE POLITICIANS ARE REPORTED TO BE CONDUCTING RALLIES IN CYANGUGU TO INCITE THE PEOPLE TO LEAVE FOR ZAIRE. A TEAM OF RWANDESE MINISTERS ACCOMPANIED BY THE CMO AND A UNAMIR POLITICAL OFFICER VISITED GIKONGORO TO ADDRESS THE LOCAL POPULATION. THE VISIT WAS A BIG SUCCESS WITH OVER 10 000 COMING TO LISTEN.

3. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES:

A. RPA. CONTINUES TO COORDINATE HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES WITH UNAMIR AND OTHER AGENCIES. PATROLLING IN KIGALI CITY ON A 24 HOUR BASIS.

B. RGF. REPORTED TO BE IN CAMPS OUTSIDE GOMA. ELEMENTS RGF IN GIKONGORO ARE REPORTED TO HAVE MADE CONTACT WITH RPA WHO WILL ESCORT THEM TO BUTARE SOON.

C. MILITIA. THEIR ACTIVITIES ARE STILL CONCENTRATED IN BUKAVU AND AROUND CYANGUGU.

4. OWN MILITARY ACTIVITIES:

A. FORCE HQ. NORMAL STAFF WORK WAS CONDUCTED. FC HELD STAFF BRIEF AT 0800 HRS. THE INCOMING FC AND STAFF WERE BRIEFED ABOUT THE OVERALL OPERATIONAL CONCEPT OF UNAMIR BY FC, OPS STAFF AND BRANCH HEADS. THE NEW FC MET THE VICE PRESIDENT OF RWANDA LATER IN THE AFTERNOON.

B. UNOMUR. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT PATROLS WITHIN THE AOR. ALL HELICOPTERS WERE OPERATIONAL WITH TWO NOW IN KIA.

C. GHANBATT. THE OVERALL SITUATION IN THE SECTOR IS CALM. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT DAY AND NIGHT PATROLS IN AND AROUND GIKONGORO AND SOUTH/NORTH PART OF AOR IN HPZ. EXODUS OF DISPLACED OBSERVED TO BE MORE PRONOUNCED IN GEN AREA KARAMA, CYANIKA AND RUKONDO. VISITING GOVERNMENT DELEGATION MADE UP OF

THE MINISTERS OF PUBLIC WORKS AND NATIONAL RECONCILIATION HELD MEETING AT BATTALION HQ LOCATION AT MURAMBI AND LATER ORGANIZED FORUM AT GIKONGORO AND CYANIKA TO EDUCATE MASSES ON DEVELOPMENTS IN THE COUNTRY AND THE FUTILITY OF THEIR EXODUS INTO NEIGHBOURING COUNTRIES. MEDICAL TREATMENT WAS GIVEN TO 87 DISPLACED PERS BY THEIR OWN MEDICAL STAFF AT MURAMBI.

D. MILOB GP. CONTINUED ORIENTATION FOR NEW UNMOs. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT PATROLS IN ALL SECTORS. THE SITUATION IN SECTORS 1, 4 AND 5 ARE REPORTED CALM. MILOBs CARRIED OUT NUMBER OF ESCORT DUTIES. CMO ACCOMPANIED A TEAM OF RWANDESE MINISTERS TO GIKONGORO AND SOME OTHER TOWNS IN HPZ AS PART OF A MEASURE TO WIN THE CONFIDENCE OF THE PEOPLE IN THE HPZ PRIOR TO TAKE OVER OF THE AREA BY UNAMIR FROM THE FRENCH. CMO BRIEFED THE INCOMING FC UNAMIR ABOUT THE FUNCTIONS OF MILOB HQ, THEIR DEPLOYMENT IN THE VARIOUS SECTORS AND TASKS BEING CARRIED BY MILOBs. MR FELLAY, ICRC REP VISITED SECTOR 1 HQ. FOR COORD MEETING.

E. BRITCON. NTR.

F. CAN SIGS. CONTINUED TO PROVIDE COMMS BETWEEN UNAMIR HQ AND SECTORS 4A, 4B, 4C AND 5 WITH HF VOICE AND INMARSAT. HF ONLY HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED WITH MILOB HQ, BRITCON, AUSCON AND CANCON. LIAISED WITH ETHIOPIAN BATTALION ON COMM REQUIREMENTS. ASSISTANCE IN RESTORING TELECOMMUNICATION INFRASTRUCTURE IN RWANDA CONTINUES.

G. AUSMED. CONTINUED TO PROVIDE MEDICAL ASSISTANCE TO THE FORCE AND RWANDESE AT CHK.

H. ETHIOBATT. CONTINUED TO RECEIVE STORES AND EQUIPMENT BY AIR THROUGH KIGALI AIRPORT. WILL START DEPLOYMENT TO SECTOR 4C TODAY.

5. FRENCH COALITION FORCES. CONTINUED TO PROVIDE HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE TO DISPLACED PEOPLE IN GOMA AND THE HPZ. THINNING OUT FROM THE HPZ IN PROGRESS.

6. US FORCES. CONTINUED TO COORDINATE FLIGHTS AT KIA

7. UNCIVPOL. COMMENCED TRAINING OF NEW GENDARMES.

8. HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES: AN INVESTIGATION INTO THE CANCELLATION OF THE AIRLIFT OF ORPHANS FROM BUKAVU TO KIGALI WAS STOPPED ON THE ADVICE OF UNHCR IN GENEVA. THEY INDICATED THAT THE OPERATION WILL NOT COMMENCE UNTIL THE SITUATION IN KIGALI HAS RETURNED TO NORMAL. UNHCR RETURNED 310 DISPLACED PERSONS TO KIGALI FROM GISENYI. IOM MOVED 450 DISPLACED PERSONS FROM BYUMBA UNDER UNAMIR ESCORT. IOM WILL MOVE ANOTHER 400 ORPHANS FROM BYUMBA TO THE GOVERNMENT SPONSORED ORPHANAGE AT ST PAUL TODAY. AN IOM VEH DROVE OVER A LAND MINE RESULTING IN THE DEATH OF

THE DRIVER WITH FOUR OTHER INJURED IN MUGAMBAZI NORTH OF KIGALI. A MEETING WAS HELD AT THE UNREO CONFERENCE ROOM. IN ATTENDANCE WAS MR HEIN AND MR JAMES BAKER, DIRECTOR OF HUMANITARIAN AFFAIRS FOR THE UN IN NEW YORK. THE HIGHLIGHTS OF THE MEETING ARE AS FOLLOWS:

- A. ALL AGENCIES OPERATING IN THE HPZ CONTINUE TO REPORT OF MOVEMENT OF PERSONS TOWARD ZAIRE.
- B. MDM WHO HAVE BEEN OPERATING IN THE AREA FOR SOME TIME WERE EXTREMELY PESSIMISTIC AND INDICATED THAT NO EFFORTS TAKEN TO KEEP THE POPULATION IN THE COUNTRY WOULD BE SUCCESSFUL.
- C. ALL UN AND NGO ORGANIZATIONS AT THE CONFERENCE GENERALLY AGREED THAT FOOD, WATER AND MEDICAL SUPPLIES IN CYANGUGU AND GIKONGORO WERE INSUFFICIENT AND THAT IS THE REASON FOR THE DISPLACED PERSONS MOVING.
- D. A RWANDESE REPRESENTATIVE MENTIONED THE FACT THAT ANY PERSON WHO HAD KILLED SOMEONE IN THE INITIAL DAYS WOULD FLEE TO ZAIRE ANYWAY TO AVOID PROSECUTION.

WFP DISTRIBUTED 120 TONS OF MAIZE AND BEANS IN THE GIKONGORO AREA. WFP INFORMED UNAMIR THAT THEY PLAN TO DELIVER A LARGE QUANTITY OF FOOD TO CYANGUGU VIA BUJUMBURA ON 18 AUG 94.

WEEKLY SITREP COVERING PERIOD 08 TO 14 AUG 94

1. HIGHLIGHTS. THE OVERALL MILITARY SITUATION IN RWANDA CONTINUED TO REMAIN CALM. REFUGEES AND DISPLACED PERSONS CONTINUED TO RETURN TO THEIR HOMES. LOCALS IN THE HPZ REMAINED APPREHENSIVE ABOUT THE WITHDRAWAL OF THE FRENCH TROOPS. THERE WERE REPORTS OF THE CONTINUED MOVEMENT OF PEOPLE FROM THE HPZ TOWARDS CYANGUGU WITH SOME CROSSING THE BORDER TO BUKAVU. GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS VISITED KIBUYE TO APPEAL TO THE LOCAL POPULATION NOT TO CROSS THE BORDER INTO ZAIRE. MS CATHERINE BERTINI EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF WFP VISITED KIGALI. SHE WAS BRIEFED BY THE SRSG. LT GEN GORDON RAEY, COMMANDER LAND FORCES COMMAND AND LT COL RALPH COLEMAN, CHIEF PLANS LAND FORCES COMMAND VISITED KIGALI. THEY WERE BRIEFED BY THE FC AND ALSO HELD DISCUSSIONS WITH THE VICE PRESIDENT. DEPLOYMENT OF BRITISH MEDICAL TEAMS IN RUHENGERI CONTINUED. BRITCON STARTED OPERATING A VEHICLE MAINTENANCE WORKSHOP IN KIGALI. THE CANADIAN SIGNALS SQUADRON CONTINUED TO ESTABLISH COMMUNICATIONS FACILITIES BETWEEN HQ AND THE VARIOUS SECTOR HQs. THEY ALSO ESTABLISHED LIAISON WITH RWANDA TELECOMMUNICATIONS TO PROVIDE TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE. INSTALLED POWER WAS RESTORED TO THE NYANZA INTERNATIONAL SATELITE GROUND STATION. COORDINATION FOR TRAINING OF GENDARMERIE CONTINUED WITH THE RPA. THE VOLUME OF AIR FLIGHTS AT KIA CONTINUED TO INCREASE WITH AN AVERAGE OF 30 FLIGHTS PER DAY.

2. POLITICAL ACTIVITIES. THE FOCUS THIS WEEK WAS ON THE TRANSITION IN SECTOR 4, THE HUMANITARIAN PROTECTION ZONE. UNAMIRs EFFORTS DURING THIS WEEK FOCUSED ON:

A. DRAWING THE POPULATION EASTWARDS (INCLUDING REFUGEES FROM ZIARE AND DISPLACED PERSONS IN THE HPZ).

B. REASSURING THE POPULATION IN THE HPZ THROUGH:

(1) THE PROVISIONING OF HUMANITARIAN AID.

(2) DEPLOYMENT OF UNAMIR TROOPS.

(3) VISITS BY RWANDAN GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS TO THE HPZ TO REASSURE THE POPULATION, AND THROUGH "COMMITTEES OF CONTACT" FROM THE HPZ VISITING KIGALI AND OTHER RPF-CONTROLLED AREAS. IN THIS REGARD THE FOLLOWING REPRESENT THE SIGNIFICANT DEVELOPMENTS AND ACTIVITIES:

(A) UNAMIR WORKED CLOSELY WITH THE UNREO TO COORDINATE UNREO'S PLAN OF ACTION FOR THE SOUTHWEST AND UNREO'S CONTINGENCY PLAN FOR THE SOUTHWEST. THE CONTINGENCY PLAN IS IN THREE PHASES; (1) CONTAINMENT: CONCENTRATION OF RELIEF ASSISTANCE IN THE PREFECTURES OF KIBUYE AND GIKONGORO IN SUPPORT OF ONGOING POLITICAL EFFORTS TO DRAW BACK REFUGEES FROM ZAIRE AND PREVENTING THE POPULATION IN THE HPZ FROM FLEEING; (2)

POSITIONING: ESTABLISHMENT OF CAMPS IN THE CYANGUGU PREFECTURE TOGETHER WITH THE MASSIVE INFLOW OF HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE, POSSIBLE ESTABLISHMENT OF A SAFE ZONE; (3) DISASTER: HUMANITARIAN COMMUNITY WOULD FOLLOW THE REFUGEES INTO ZAIRE (THE PLAN HOWEVER SEEKS TO AVOID THIS SCENARIO). IN THIS CONNECTION, THE SRSG MET WITH MS. BERTINI TO CLARIFY WFP'S ROLE AND TO EXCHANGE VIEWS ON THE COORDINATION OF THE HUMANITARIAN OPERATION.

C. THE SRSG DISTRIBUTED THE RWANDA EMERGENCY NORMALIZATION PLAN (RENP) WHICH WILL BE CONTINUALLY UPDATED. THIS DOCUMENT WILL BE USED TO TRACK THE PROGRESS OF NORMALIZATION AND TO PROVIDE DATA ON THE NEED FOR TECHNICAL AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE IN EACH SECTOR.

D. THE SRSG WORKED CLOSELY WITH THE AMERICAN GOVERNMENT TO COORDINATE THE AIRLIFT OF ETHIOPIAN TROOPS AND TO ALSO FACILITATE THE TRANSPORTATION OF HUMANITARIAN AID INTO RWANDA.

E. THE SRSG AND HIS STAFF COLLABORATED WITH THE RWANDAN GOVERNMENT TO LAUNCH A CONCERTED POLITICAL EFFORT TO REASSURE THE POPULATION IN THE HPZ. THE SRSG ACCOMPANIED THE MINISTERS OF INTERIOR, PUBLIC WORKS AND REHABILITATION TO KIBUYE. THE VISIT WAS COORDINATED WITH THE FRENCH FORCES ON OPERATION TURQUOISE. THE DELEGATION WAS ACCOMPANIED BY AND THE DEPUTY FORCE COMMANDER, THE CHIEF MILITARY OBSERVER AND THE SRSG'S POLITICAL AFFAIRS OFFICER.

G. ANALYSIS. THE POSSIBILITY OF OPERATION TURQUOISE REMAINING IN THE HPZ BEYOND 22 AUG IS BEING CONSIDERED AND DISCUSSED. IF THIS SCENARIO WERE TO BE ACCEPTED, IT WOULD FACILITATE THE EXODUS AND REVERSE THE OUT FLOW OF REFUGEES TOWARDS BUKAVU AND ALSO GIVE THE GOVERNMENT TIME TO:

(1) SET UP A CIVIL ADMINISTRATION IN THE HPZ.

(2) MAKE SYSTEMATIC EFFORTS TO REASSURE THE POPULATION ABOUT SECURITY AND THE RESTORATION OF PROPERTY. (THE PRESIDENT HAS HOWEVER URGED UNAMIR TO DO ALL IN ITS MEANS TO TAKE OVER FROM OPERATION TURQUOISE BY 21 AUGUST 94).

THE VISIT OF THE RWANDAN GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS AND THE SRSG TO KIBUYE WAS FRUITFUL. IT IS EVIDENT THAT MUCH OF THE POPULATION STILL HAVE DOUBTS ABOUT THEIR SECURITY AND POSSIBLE OF REPRISALS AND EXTRA-JUDICIAL ACTIVITY. THERE ARE STILL REPORTS OF INTIMIDATION BY THE EX RGF AND MILITIA ELEMENTS IN THE HPZ. MORE VISITS BY THE GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS WITH REASSURANCES, ALONG WITH ACTION ON THE GROUND, CAN POTENTIALLY COUNTER THE FEARS HARBoured BY THE PEOPLE.

3. MILITARY

A. FACTIONAL ACTIVITIES

(1) RPA. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT 24 HR PATROLS IN KIGALI AT NIGHT IN ORDER TO RESTORE LAW AND ORDER. CONTINUED TO COORDINATE HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES WITH UNAMIR AND NGOS. REPORTED TO BE DIGGING DEFENSIVE TRENCHES ALONG THE NORTHERN BOUNDARY OF THE HPZ. ASSURED SAFE AND FREE MOVEMENT OF HUMANITARIAN AID CONVOYS TO KIBUYE THROUGH THEIR CHECK POINTS. URGED PEOPLE TO RETURN TO THEIR VILLAGES. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT STRINGENT SECURITY CHECKS ON PEOPLE RETURNING TO THEIR HOMES FROM THE HPZ.

(2) RGF. CONTINUED TO BE IN CAMPS AROUND GOMA. REPORTED TO BE INVOLVED IN LOOTING AND ACTS OF BANDITRY IN THE HPZ. 4 EX RGF OFFICERS WITH 3 NCO'S AND THEIR FAMILIES SURRENDERED TO THE RPA. RGF ARE REPORTEDLY REGROUPING IN BUKAVU AND ARE ENCOURAGING LOCALS IN THE HPZ TO LEAVE THE AREA FOR BUKAVU (ZAIRE).

(3) MILITIA. REPORTED TO BE INTIMIDATING REFUGEES IN CAMPS OUTSIDE RWANDA IN AN ATTEMPT TO PREVENT THEM FROM RETURNING. ALSO INVOLVED IN BANDITRY AND LOOTING IN THE HPZ.

B. OWN

(1) UNAMIR. FC VISITED KIBUYE AND MET THE FRENCH LOCAL COMMANDER IN THE AREA. LT GEN GORDON RAEY, COMMANDER LAND FORCES COMMAND AND THE FC MET WITH THE PRIME MINISTER AND THE VICE PRESIDENT. DFC RECEIVED GHANANIAN TROOPS AT ENTEBBE. MR PADDY BLAGDEN, UN DEMINING EXPERT ARRIVED IN KIGALI. HE HELD DISCUSSIONS WITH UNAMIR EOD TEAM AND RPA TO FORMULATE A DEMINING PLAN FOR RWANDA. SRSG VISITED GIKONGORO AND BUTARE TO ASSESS THE MILITARY AND HUMANITARIAN SITUATION IN THE AREA.

(2) UNOMOR. AREA OF OPERATION REMAINED CALM. CONDUCTED ROUTINE PATROLS. A/CMO VISITED CHECK POINTS ALONG THE BORDER. DETAILS OF BORDER CROSSING ARE:

(A) TO RWANDA

(3) MILOB GP. PROVIDEDD LIAISON TEAMS WITH THE FRENCH IN GOMA. CONTINUED TO CONDUCT PATROLS WITHIN THEIR SECTORS. CMO VISITED SECTOR 3. PROVIDED ESCORT TEAMS FOR HUMANITARIAN AID CONVOYS TO KIBUYE AND WITHIN KIGALI INCREASED NUMBER OF DISPLACED PEOPLE MOVING FROM GIGONGORE AND KIBUYE TO CYANGUG AND BUKAVU. ORIENTATION FOR NEWLY ARRIVED UNMOs FROM UNOMOR CONTINUED.

4. HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES. THE FORCE CONTINUED TO COORDINATE HUMANITARIAN ACTIVITIES WITH OTHER HUMANITARIAN AID AGENCIES. CONTINUED TO TRANSFER DISPLACED PEOPLE RETURNING TO THEIR HOMES. WPF AND OTHER AID AGENCIES CONTINUED TO DELIVER FOOD AND OTHER AID ITEMS TO DISPLACED PEOPLE. TRANSFER OF ORPANS FROM BUKAVU TO KIGALI USING CC-130 WAS POSPPONED. UNAMIR IN CONJUNCTION WITH US FORCES ASSISTED 1 CRC AND UNICEF TO TRANSPORT GENERATORS TO LOCATIONS IN TOWN. DISPLACED PEOPLE CONTINUED TO RETURN TO THEIR HOMES. IN THE HPZ FEARS AMONGST LOCALS CONTINUED TO RISE, AS THE FRENCH FORCES WITHDRAW. MOVEMENT WAS OBSERVED FROM GIKANGORO AND KIBUYE TOWARDS CYANGUGU.

7. CONCLUSION: THE SECURITY SITUATION IN THE COUNTRY CONTINUED TO IMPROVE. THE GOVERNMENT CONTINUED ITS EFFORTS TO APPEAL TO REFUGEES AND DISPLACED PEOPLE TO RETURN TO RWANDA. FC AND SRSG VISITED KIBUYE TO ASSESS THE MILITARY AND HUMANITARIAN SITUATION IN THE AREA. TROOPS FROM CANADA, BRITIAN, GHANA AND ETHIOPIA CONTINUED TO ARRIVE IN THE MISSION AREA. US FORCES CONTINUED TO COORDINATE WITH UNAMIR ON HUMANITARIAN AND AIR ACTIVITIES.
