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OPS BRIEF FOR VISITING TEAMS.

The FC, Distinguished Visitors, Gentlemen, I am Col Kattah - DCOS  
(Ops) UNAMIR.

AIM

1. To give you an insight into our current Operations as directed and given in the Present Mandate which started on 9 Jun 95 to 8 Dec 95. But before then allow me to give you a brief account of the formation of UNAMIR, and also a map orientation.

BACKGROUND HISTORY

2. ZAIRE, RWANDA and BURUNDI have identical colonial past in that they were all under the Belgian domination and collectively were known as BELGIAN CONGO.

3. RWANDA and BURUNDI were both originally inhabited by the TWA tribe 1%. Then came the HUTUS 85% from the North, hundred of years ago followed by the Tutsis 14% during the 18th century. Under colonial rule the three tribes suppressed their ill feelings against each other until they gained independence. The Tutsis who took advantage of western education during the periods of colonial domination became increasingly dominant and became the ruling class even though they did not form the majority of the population. The Tutsi domination created problems in both countries.

4. In Burundi the military, Civil Service, wealth and power was and is still concentrated around the Tutsi minority.

5. The situation is slightly different in Rwanda. The Tutsi

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domination of the majority Hutu was rejected through a rebellion in 1959 resulting in the overthrow of the ruling Tutsis. The rebellion led to the fleeing of over 160,000 Tutsi into neighbouring countries while an estimated 20,000 were killed. A UN supervised referendum brought victory to the Hutu led party known as the "Party of Hutu Emancipation Movement (PARME HUTU) in 1961. Thus in Rwanda the power base shifted to the Hutus the majority population 6. The situation in Rwanda though tense was stable until in Oct 1990 when an estimated force of about 10,000 men largely made up of exiled Tutsis crossed into North Eastern Rwanda from Uganda. This initial attack was repulsed by the RGF with the help of Zairian and French troops. The force known as the Rwandan Patriotic Force turned guerrilla with most of its attacks on Rwanda coming from the North and North West. The attacks which were initiated from Uganda, led to accusations of complicity being levelled against the Ugandan Government which it denied. These attacks continued with the RPF gaining ground till March 1993 when a cease fire agreement was signed between the Government and the rebels. Under the truce, the RPF gave up about half the territory it controlled to give way for the creation of a 19 KM wide demilitarized Zone. On 04 August 1993 the RPF and RGF under the aegis of the OAU signed the ARUSHA PEACE AGREEMENT which called upon the UN to put in place an International neutral force known as UNAMIR to assist in a 22 month peace process starting from 5 Oct 93. At Arusha the warring factions agreed to:

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- a. Install a Broad Base Transitional Government.
- b. Set up transitional institutions
- c. Deploy a neutral international force
- d. Withdraw foreign troops from Rwanda.
- e. Deploy an RPF bn in Kigali to protect RPF dignitaries.
- f. Integrate Gendarmerie into National Defence Force
- g. Protect expatriates and ensure the security of humanitarian agencies operating in Rwanda.
- h. Integrate OAU observers into UN observers
- i. Repatriate refugees and resettle displaced persons.
- j. Ensuring a secure atmosphere for a general election.

**FORMATION OF UNAMIR**

7. Based on the Arusha Agreement, the Security Council adopted Resolution 846 which sent a Reconnaissance Mission to Rwanda on 17 Aug 93. The mission was assigned the task of assessing and reporting on the contributions which the UN could make to assist the OAU in the implementation of the peace agreement. It was also assigned the task of assessing the requirements in human and material resources essential to the implementation of the peace agreement. On 5 Oct 93 the Security Council adopted Resolution 872 which gave UNAMIR a mandate for 6 months.

8. Prior to the arrival of UNAMIR troops in Rwanda, the OAU had an observer team of 104 officers to monitor the cease fire. These officers were absorbed by UNAMIR when it was established.

9. During the war, the deteriorating situation led to the scaling

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down of the UNAMIR force from 2517 to just under 500.

10. On 17 May 94, and 8 June 94, the Security Council passed Res 918 and 925 respectively expanding the force to over 5,500 strong.

11. UNAMIR mission between 08 JUNE 94 and 08 JUNE 95 was to assist and co-ordinate the humanitarian support of participating countries and NGOs with the view to bringing an end to the crisis in Rwanda.

12. The thrust of UNAMIR's effort was to bring back refugees and displaced persons and settle them in their respective home areas.

**THE PRESENT MANDATE**

13. On 09 JUNE 95 UN Security Council Resolution 997 extended UNAMIR Mandate to cover the period 09 JUNE 95 to 08 DECEMBER 95, which shifted the focus from Peace Keeping role to that of humanitarian assistance which we believe should be the role for UN Agencies and NGOs. (UNHCR, UNREO etc).

14. For the performance of the tasks specified by the mandate, the UNAMIR AOR, is divided into five sectors (As Shown).

- a. **Sector 1.** (KIGALI) INDBATT AND GHANCOY with MILOBS & CIVPOL.
- b. **Sector 2.** (KIBUNGO) - GHANCOY, MILOBS & CIVPOL.
- c. **Sector 3.** (GIKONGORO) - MALICOY, MILOBS & CIVPOL.
- d. **Sector 4.** (SHAGASHA) - MALAWICOY, MILOBS & CIVPOL.
- e. **Sector 5.** (NYUNDO/GISENYI) - NICOY, MILOBS & CIVPOL.

**TASKS**

15. In all the sectors, the units and MILOBS to include CIVPOL are to.

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- a. Build confidence in the population by our presence in the sectors.
- b. Provide tpt for the movement of refugees.
- c. Provide Sy for UNAMIR personnel and property.
- d. Contribute to the Sy of the International Tribunal.
- e. Contribute to the security of Humanitarian Agencies in case of need.
- f. Contribute to the Sy of personnel and premises of UN Agencies.

16. Since the Current Mandate UNAMIR has under taken many Humanitarian tasks to help the Rwandese people through the following activities:

a. **Medical**

- Immunized thousands of Rwandese against diseases;
- Medically treated thousands of Rwandese;
- Distributed life-saving medicines to local dispensaries;
- and
- Assisted in the training of hospital medical staff.

b. **Mine Safety**

- Safely cleared and defused several thousand land mines and explosives; and
- Conducted mine awareness training programmes in communes. It is worthy to note that the Mine and EOD incidents are on the increase now.

c. **Transportation Assistance**

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- Assisted in the transportation and safe return of refugees back to their home communes;
- Provided vehicle for and escorted hundreds of humanitarian relief convoys; and,
- assisted in the transportation of schoolchildren, food, textbooks, **RPA** soldiers, government and commune officials, construction material, seeds and critically injured people.

d. **Engineering**

- Assisted in the construction of refugee transit camps and detention centres; and,
- Repaired roads, bridges, schools, orphanages, electrical lines, telecommunications and water services.

e. **Orphanages**

- Carried out electrical and plumbing repairs as well as medical and humanitarian assistance to orphanages throughout the country.

f. **Firefighting**

- Assisted in firefighting operations in Kigali.

g. **Donations**

- Donated seeds, blankets, shoes, mattresses, food and stationary to orphanages and communes throughout Rwanda

17. **STRENGTH**. The strength of UNAMIR has been reduced over the years as per each mandate and presently the Formed Tps Strength Stands at 1783, Staff 38, MILOBS 285 and CIVPOL 85. I wish to

mention here also the reduction of our helicopter fleet from 5 to 3 since 1 Nov 95. This reduction is making the tasks of our MILOBS, CIVPOL and Humanitarian Agencies rather difficult since they perform the majority of the humanitarian tasks which require mobility into the hinter lands and depend very much on the helis for these tasks. One important operation undertaken by UNAMIR under this Mandate was the transportation of Rwandan Refugees who were forcibly repatriated by Zaire starting on 19 Aug 95 and suspended on 24 Aug 95 after 13579 had been pushed into RWANDA. The repatriation (not forced) is still going on but at a very low scale. And as at today 4993 refugees have returned to Rwanda from neighbouring countries by our records.

18. **Security Situation** The Sy Situation generally is stable but tense in the Western part of Rwanda where a War of Insurgency by the FRGF is underway, through infiltrations, political killings and sabotage of infrastructure and utility services. We must say however that the Rwandese Govt and the RPA have taken a grip on the security in the Country, but of late has taken to the harassment of the populace. The treat to RWANDA UNAMIR UN AGENCIES & NGOS now is the Mine Warfare which is now in the increase.

The RPA has undertaken an offensive operation on IWAWA Island on 04 and 05 NOV 95 against the FRGF and killed about 171, indicating that the RPA intention is now to aggressively respond to the destabilization activities of the FRGF. .

19. The MILOBS and the CIVPOL have been the ears and eyes of the



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Force in monitoring activities of the factions (RPA/FRGF), Human Right violations, situation in the prisons and even the work of the UN Agencies and NGOs. I must say that they have indeed done a good job so far.

20. In the performance of our tasks as per the present mandate, some problems were encountered.

a. The mandate itself is restrictive in the sense that the usual Peace Keeping tasks have been substituted with Humanitarian tasks.

b. That for the performance of these humanitarian tasks Resources have not been made avail to the Force for such tasks. (enough vehs) Drugs, Food and Engineering Eqpt.

c. The Formed Tps seem now to be in Sp of the Humanitarian Agencies and the MILOBS instead of the other way round.

21. **To conclude my brief.**

a. I wish to state that our operations have been successful as specified within the confines of this mandate. But it could have been more successful if the resources for such humanitarian tasks were provided to the Force.

b. Looking beyond this mandate, if it is to be extended, the mandate might have to be redefined to give more meaning to the presence of Formed Tps by way of giving them a more Peace Keeping oriented mission and more resources placed at their disposal. At the moment we are developing plans towards the

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*closure of the Mission ,should the Mandate not be extended.*

*c. I would advise also that the UN Agencies and NGOs working in the field should be provided with protective clothing and eqpt and explosive ordnance device experts as part of their organization to deal with the increase in Mines Incidents if they are to effectively carry out their tasks.*

OPENING ADDRESS

1. The Chairman welcomed everybody present to the maiden Ops Offrs conference outside Kigali. He wished the conference would be brief and straight to the point. He also wished all members a fruitful deliberation.

WELCOME ADDRESS

2. The 2ic NICOY welcomed the DCOS OPS and all offrs present on behalf of the Comd who was unavoidably absent.

DCOS OPS BRIEF

3. The chairman said he was impressed by the conducted tours he carried out throughout the whole sectors on assuming office as the DCOS OPS. The tours provided him first hand knowledge of the working condition within the various contingents. He said efforts were made to resolve those issues addressed during the tours

04. He said the information we received about the closure of the mission has been cancelled. He said the closure of the mission would be based on whether the mandate is extended or not, however if the mandate is extended we will be informed. He went further to say that preparation for packing should start in all Contingents. Mission closure report should also be prepared to cover such areas as Admin, logistics, Ops, problems and lesson learnt.

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## ACTION

5. The chairman said there is information received about an impending forceful repatriation of refugees he said everything has been put in place to support the UNHCR.

6. The chairman stated that insurgency is being carried out in sectors 4 and 5 he emphasised that everybody should be at alert and advised that every sector be adequately protected. He added that every sector must have a rough evacuation plan and every soldiers must be conversant with it. He has also directed that all units should continue with training and concentrate on specific areas of interest as regards the mission.

7. The chairman said that traffic accident is still on the increase and directed that drivers must be more careful on the roads as the roads have become more dangerous as a result of the rains.

8. The chairman stressed the importance of security and that personal security is most important. We should carry out necessary protective measures against our property as domestic workers may start pilfering our properties in view of the closure of the mission. Equipment and stores should be well protected from falling into wrong hands.

MILOB SECTOR 5 COMD BRIEF

9. The MILOBS sector 5 Comd thanked DCOS OPs for giving him the opportunity to attend the conference. He briefed the conference on the general security situation in sector 5B. He said the local population in the sector is about 90 - 94% Hutu this has made the security situation tense as there is the likelihood that they may harbour some militia. He said the border with Zaire remain prone in spite of RPA efforts. He said there is a training camp for the militia in Ijwi Island. The Militia use boats to cross the lake and land on the Rwandan bank regularly which they use as their operational base. Recently RPA captured 1 prisoner, 2 were killed, and the rest escaped. He received a report of mine explosion in Inshira at the boarder with sector 5A. He said a lot of killings and kidnapping have been going on in the sector. About 100 FRGF crossed the border into Rwanda. The situation in the refugees camps in Zaire influences the general security situation in the sector. He stated that after the Kanama incident the RPA Comd was replaced and our

relationship with the new Comd has been good. The Comd said they have a very reliable source of information in the sector mainly through the NGO's and Human rights.

10. The chairman thanked the sector Comd for his detailed brief on sector 5B in spite of the short notice of the conference given to him.

G3 OPS BRIEF

11. The G3 Ops said the situation in all sectors remain stable except sector 4 and 5. He said all the sectors have been carrying out humanitarian activities as per the current mandate such as medical care and rehabilitation by Force Engineers.

12. The G3 Ops said that all sectors should be ready to transport refugees, as approximately 20,000 refugees would be expected daily when the forced repatriation commences. He said Mobutu Seseseko, the President of Zaire has requested that the refugee camp should be moved far inside Zairian territory. He said the expected repatriation of the refugees would commence on the 1 st of Nov and instructions have been issued to all concerned.

13. He said the Kanobe airport has been closed due to the fact that UN personnel are obliged to go through customs check. Shagasha is being used as an alternative Airport. From the 1st of Nov only 2 or 3 helicopters would be available for use.

14. He talked about the increasing rate of Robbery incidence in Kigali and urged all to be careful.

15. He went further to say that MALICOY should give details of patients treated in their Humanitarian clinic in their daily sitrep as this information is needed in UN HQ in New York.

16. Finally the G3 Ops said there has been some tempering on IMERSAT C and this is not permitted. The FSO would send in technicians , if there is any problem. He concluded by saying that the next sector Comd conference would hold on 15 Nov in Gikongoro.

FORCE ENGINEER OFFICER'S BRIEF

17. The FEO outlined the areas where the UNAMIR

Force Engineer is involved, these among others includes:

- a. Rehabilitation of schools in Butare for demobilised Children formerly in RPA. The water and electricity problem has been improved.
- b. Rehabilitation of prisons in Ruwamagana and Kigali.
- c. Levelling of the Nkamira refugee camp.
- d. Digging of pit for sanitary condition and rehabilitation in the last few months.
- e. Construction of Bridge at Kibungo (Ghanbatt 11) location.
- f. Improvement of refugee site, levelling of the area, construction of roads and water supply.

18. The FEO said lectures on mine awareness were delivered in all the sectors to Contingents, MILOBs and NGO's. He said the supply of Engineer equipment to Contingents has been hampered by lack of trailers. He said any Contingent that carry out EOD tasks should let him know. He said a lot of Engineer equipment for operations and humanitarian used has been received and any Contingent in need can put in request for the items.

19. He said all the Contingents are reasonably accommodated, the only complaint was from NICOY at Nyundo, but they have not got any feedback from them. He said stores for improving roads and Bridges are in short supply. Contingents should source for materials within their locality. Finally the Force Engineer Officer said any Contingent that needs packing materials should put in request for them.

20. She said there would be mini activity by 95 CMSG on 11,16 and 17th of Nov as they would be celebrating their remembrance day. Contingents should take note in view of any request they would want to make.

21. She said they have a heavy duty recovery truck and any Contingent in need can demand for its use.

OPS OFFR INDBATT'S BRIEF

22. He said there has been acts of banditry and extortion by RPA. Some RPA Bn have been moved within the last one Month. The security situation within Kigali remains safe from violence. \$500 stolen from the home of the manager of the PX shop.

On 24 Oct 5000 Francs stolen from a shop in Kigali when it was raining. In Kigali town there was a reported case of 10 people killed in two families.

23. Medical treatment was given to about 15,000 locals in the Month of Oct. Within the month also there were about 2,160 returnees. Indbatt offered transport assistance to RPA for the transport of 55 tonnes of ration from Kigali to Butare. Transport assistance was offered to WFP, salvation Army and Food for the Hungry from Kigali to Gitarama weighing about 45 tonnes.

24. The President of Ireland visited Kigali and was briefed by the Force Comd and a guard of honour was mounted by Indbatt. Gen Fred Rwigyema was reburied during the month in Kigali. The 50th Anniversary of the UN was celebrated in Kigali, the sports activities brought about much interaction between UNAMIR and the local populace.

OPS OFFR GHANBATT'S BRIEF

25. The Ops offr Ghanbatt briefed the conference about the overall security situation in sector 2. He said the sector remains calm. He said vehicles were provided for transport of refugees. There has been a slight increase in patients treated in the humanitarian clinic, especially Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays. They now treat an average of 150 patients daily as against 100 patients in the past.

26. He said the Coy has been concentrating on training of soldiers. They concentrate on areas like Geopolitical vent likely to have effect on situation in Rwanda, Road accidents and mode of recovery, search and locate procedure incase MILOBs and NGOs might need help. He said some officers and soldiers from the Coy visited Contingents within UNAMIR.

locations and he is grateful for the various sectors on behalf of his Comd for the reception offered them.

27. He said the lecture on mine awareness was conducted in the sector and it was beneficial to all. He said the task order for the repatriation of refugees has been received and action is being carried out on it.

28. The RPA has scalped down the no of road blocks between Kigali and Kibungo. Now there is only 1 located at Ruwamagana. This is as a result of incidence of extortion by RPA in one of their road blocks and witnessed by the RPA Bde Comd by way of assessment he hopes sector 2 will remain calm that is if and only if there is no harassment from RPA and local authority.

29. Finally, he said the Force Comd delivered a lecture to them in Kibungo on 16 Oct and all officers benefitted tremendously from the lecture. They are grateful to the FC for honouring their invitation to give the lecture.

TRIBUNAL COY OC BRIEF

30. The tribunal COY OC said the investigators who are all civilians are going round the Country carrying out their investigations. About 9 of them went to Kibuye and have so far interrogated 57 people. Whenever they are going to any location, the COY informs the MILOBs so that they can arrange for their security. If they travel with Armed escort it might jeopardise their source of information.

31. The Ops officer said sector 3 remains calm, and they have good relationship with the RPA. His COY escorts fuel and water to Cyangugu and Shagasha. He said they are still waiting for Engineer team for the fencing of their location. He said the rules of engagement cards are needed in his COY. At this stage the G3 plans said they have been ordered from Nairobi and as soon as they are available they will be sent to them.

32. On the 27 Oct 95, mine awareness lecture was delivered at Gikongoro, MILOBs, and NGO's were in attendance. On the humanitarian aspects he said transport assistance was given to CARITAS, SOS,

Save the Children. They also transported food and stores for the Prefect of Gikongoro. Malicoy medical staff treated about 1000 locals up till the 28 Oct 95.

33. There have been increased incidents of sabotage, assassinations, ambushes and Robbery within, the sector. The security situation in the sector is not good due to the location of the sector most of these activities are carried out by the Militia from Ijwi Island. (in Zaire)

34. There have been two acts of sabotage this month on 10 and 25 Oct. These acts were directed at electricity poles at Cyanguu and communication lines. On the 10th a pole on the distribution line to Bugarama cement factory was blown. The supply line to the juice factory within Cyanguu was disrupted. On 25 Oct 95, RPA made use of locals as guards to the poles, the Militia caught some of the locals, tied them together and threw grenade at them, one died and some were injured. Apart from these there are other incidents which show that they are following a pattern towards Bugarama.

35. Assassinations and shootings are carried out randomly the most recent is in Nyamasheke on 25 Oct. On oct 8, an officer and 3 others were killed in Chimbogo area on 14 Oct, there was exchange of fire between RPA and FRGF from Ijwi Island. No casualty was reported. One Mr Harimana and wife were killed in their bedroom, the previous day they had assisted the RPA in looking for FRGF. On 4 Oct the house of the councillor of Nyamasheke sub sector was attacked, they did not meet him at home but met the wife whom they beat up.

36. On 21 Oct in the forest RR 08338 workers of IOM were ambushed and shot at but no lives was lost. At the Kanambe airport a mine was exploded by a 16 year old girl. Another 40 year old man stepped on an antipersonnel mine.

37. On 4 Oct, at about 2300 hrs a robbery attempt was made on ICRC. On 6 Oct, some bandits took 21 fishing boats from fishermen and made away with them to Ijwi Island. On 10 Oct 7 additional boats were robbed from some fishermen. Same day some bandits from Burundi stole 30,000 Francs and some Logs. On 11 Oct 3 fishing boats were stolen and taken to Ijwi Island and 2 fishermen were missing. On 28 Oct a robbery incident took place at KRC office and \$4,000 worth of equipment was stolen. An ICRC vehicle with money and building materials was hijacked near Gitarama.

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ACTION

38. Treatment of locals by Maliwicoy has been reported on a weekly basis. Treatment has also been given to 93 workers in a nearby tea plantation. Transport assistance was also provided for ICRC and RPA.

39. The Ops officer Malicoy concluded by informing the conference that they have been carrying out some form of training within the COY. The mine awareness lecture was well attended and everybody gained tremendously. Areas concentrated on during their training includes CASEVAC exercise, the UN mandate and UNAMIR SOP.

OPS OFFER NICOY'S BRIEF

40. He welcomed everybody to Nyundo camp and thanked the DCOS Ops for giving NICOY the opportunity of hosting the maiden conference outside Kigali. He said as per the security situation within the sector the MILOB sector 5 Comd has said almost everything during his brief however he mentioned some few points.

41. He said NICOY has been attending morning briefing with MILOBs sector 5B on a daily basis less sundays to keep abreast of all the happenings in the sector. Training has been going on smoothly within the camp and morning PT and evening games are compulsory for all.

42. RPA has been concentrating its troops along the border with Zaire. The RPA Bn at Nkamira rotated with the one in Butare. Relationship between NICOY and RPA cordial same goes for the Gendarmerie. The Ops officer stated that the killings in Kanama commune on 11 Sep is well known to everybody. After the Kanama incident 2 people were killed in a separate incident it is suspected that the Militia were responsible. On the 16th Sep RPA took a civilian to the border to show them the Boundary between Zaire/Rwanda but the person was taken away by Zairian soldiers, RPA could not react because they were fewer number Human Right were informed. On 19 Sep a teacher was killed by Armed men in Kayove commune. On 24/25 six RPA soldiers were shot at during patrol but there were no casualties. On 26 Sep at about 1600 hrs the Burgermaster of Kayove and 1 other were ambushed and murdered. Each person received about 5 bullets. On 17 Oct 6 infiltrators were intercepted in Rubavu commune one was shot dead and 5 were arrested. On the 23 an anti tank mine was found near Kabilira.

43. On the humanitarian aspect, our relationship with the NGO's cordial. We maintain a mobile clinic at Kayove

twice a week and at the Mbabazzi Orphanage in Mutura. 143 patients were treated on 30 Oct 95 by own medical personnel. We also assist Nyundo maternity whenever the request is made. This morning own medical doctor left for Kigali with 2 RPA Soldiers, one was seriously wounded by mine and the other had a motorcycle accident. NICOY also assist RPA and locals in terms of transportation and other amenities. The unit assisted in the decongestion of Gisenyi prison by transporting some inmates to Ruhengeri prison.

44. On the 20 Oct mine awareness lecture was delivered at own location, MILOBs, NGOs and own troops attended the lecture. He suggested that there should be more participation to include the locals and also it would be advisable if there is an interpreter in the local language. The Ops offr used the opportunity to put in request for a truck for the Contingent in view of our engagement in Mt Karongi and the humanitarian request put in by MILOBs sector 5C.

DCOS OPS CONCLUDING BRIEF

45. The DCOS Ops concluded the conference with two final points which he said were for emphasis and highly important. He said when any Contingent is providing transport for movement of prisoners, they must insist RPA provide security. Secondly he said with the increasing number of patients in the humanitarian clinics contingents should be cautious not to over stretch their medical resources. He said locals should not be treated at the detriment of own personnel.



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

<p><b>ITEM 1. WELCOME ADDRESS BY SECTOR COMD 5C</b></p> <p>1. Lt-Col Chomba welcomed all present. He thanked particularly the SRSG who took time to attend this conference, clearly showing his recognition of the importance of MILOBS operations within UNAMIR.</p>	
<p><b>ITEM 2. OPENING ADDRESS BY THE CHAIRMAN</b></p> <p>2. The DFC/CMO, before starting his address, requested that all stand in silence for a moment in remembrance of our colleagues who died in this area. After this, he passed on the congratulations and encouragement of the FC. He then outlined the changes in the political, security and social situations since the last conference. He singled out the incident at KANAMA, in Sector 5B, as being the most important event of that period. He concluded by wishing everyone a good conference.</p>

<p><b><u>ITEM 3. OPENING REMARKS OF THE SRSG</u></b></p> <p>3. The SRSG first praised the MILOBS for their work at obtaining valuable information and the job that they are performing in this mission. Now that we are reaching the end of mandate, it is possible that we will be continuing for three to four or six months; or it is also possible that we windup and our strength is reduced gradually after 9<sup>th</sup> Dec 95. He informed that within two to three weeks, UNAMIR will be getting clear ideas regarding the mandate. He enquired whether or not RADIO UNAMIR was received in the Sectors. He enquired what difficulties were encountered in Sectors where formed troops were not available.</p> <p>4. He emphasized on the importance of the following points on which he would like to receive specific feedback from the Sectors :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. Is the system of justice prevailing ?</li> <li>b. What is the status of refugees/returnees ?</li> <li>c. What is the state of economic activity ?</li> <li>d. What is the state of the reconciliation process ?</li> </ul> <p><b><u>ITEM 4. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 1A</u></b></p> <p>5. The situation in the sector seems to improve greatly with locals and RPA soldiers becoming more friendly. The Sector has also seen a large influx of returnees during the past months.</p> <p>6. The number of returnees that have come into the Sector is estimated at 6,900 from August to October (about 2,000 old case load and 4,000 new case load). Most returnees have resettled very well with their old relation but still some require accommodation, food, seeds, and farming implements.</p> <p>7. The general conditions of communes seem to be greatly improving as the rehabilitation work of many buildings continues and as life gradually normalizes. The problems faced by most communes are no different than in any other sectors.</p> <p>8. The sector has 19 commune prisons with a total of 12,900 inmates. Most of the prisons living conditions are pathetic, except for the communes of Rushashi and Ngenda where the room is enough and relatives are free to visit their relations.</p> <p>9. There is no proper judicial system prevailing in this sector. Not much progress has been done by the government to promote reconciliation in the sector.</p> <p><b><u>ITEM 5. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 1B</u></b></p> <p>10. In general, the situation in the sector is calm, but numerous killings, arbitrary arrests and acts of banditry could easily warrant the label of "tense". The population shows signs of insecurity throughout the Gitarama prefecture.</p>	

DISCUSSION	ACTION
<p>The RPA does not have support of the population at large.</p> <p>11. The most significant problem in the sector is still the overcrowding of the Gitarama prison. No serious improvement had taken place since the movement of 225 prisoners to Nyanza prison on 14<sup>th</sup> July 95.</p> <p>12. The general condition of the returnees is fairly good, as most have settled in their former homes after receiving on month basic needs on arrival from UNHCR. One of the acute problems faced by some of the returnees is the reconstruction of their destroyed houses.</p> <p>13. The general condition in the communes could be referred to as satisfactory, even though a feeling of insecurity persists. The major problem in communes is insecurity in the form of banditry, often performed by soldiers.</p> <p>14. The judiciary system in the sector can be expected to operate in early January 96. No noticeable improvement to the reconciliation process has been noticed in this sector.</p> <p>15. Radio UNAMIR cannot be received in Gitarama. Some of the communes nearer to Kigali could receive it; however, the local population shows only a remote interest in it.</p> <p>16. Although the problem has been alleviated with the hiring of two night guards, our local security situation is still disturbing, especially with the prospect of retaliation after the capture of 11 thieves.</p> <p>17. Kabgayi is still awaiting a decision about the requested retention of the 100 KW generator.</p>	
<p><b><u>ITEM 6. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 2A</u></b></p> <p>18. The sector remained calm since the last conference. The relationship with the local authorities, RPA, UN agencies and NGOs remained very cordial and the general security situation in the prefecture has tremendously improved.</p> <p>19. The major problem in the sector is that of loose explosive ordnance and unmarked mines in most of the communes. This problem compels MILOBS patrol teams to use specific routine roads.</p> <p>20. There are 1246 returnees who came to the sector since 20<sup>th</sup> Jul 95. All the returnees who have hitherto been received have been peacefully resettled and accepted by their fellow locals, albeit the availability of food is their main concern.</p> <p>21. There is a tremendous improvement on the general living conditions in most of the communes. Some NGOs are assisting</p>

<p>tithe developmental project such as rehabilitation of schools, commune offices, health centres and roads.</p> <p>22. There is only one central prison in Byumba, which as at 17 Oct 95 had a total of 368 inmates.</p> <p>23. The first tribunal has all the judges appointed, as well as the prosecutor. The prosecutor is already dealing with some cases. All the cases which cannot be handled at commune level are referred to Byumba Court.</p> <p>24. The reconciliation process is going along well. The Prefect is making every possible efforts to achieve this.</p> <p>25. There is a problem with communication, as the Sector Commander who is a francophone cannot communicate effectively due to a lack of interpreters who can speak French.</p>	
<p><b><u>ITEM 7. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 2B</u></b></p>	
<p>26. The general situation in the sector has been relatively calm and stable. Cases of cow stealing and odd cases of thefts by groups across the border continue.</p> <p>27. The situation in the refugee camps is reported to be volatile. The presence of politically active interest groups and intimidators has been confirmed. The presence of armed groups cannot be denied.</p> <p>28. The number of returnees that have come during the past three months is 17,428. The condition of the returnees has been fairly satisfactory.</p> <p>29. The general condition in the communes is satisfactory. However, as the number of returnees is increasing, the local administration has been under increased pressure to repair the basic infrastructure.</p> <p>30. There have been positive signs of re-conciliation between the various ethnic groups. Regular meetings are being held at commune and sector levels to bring about increased re-approachment.</p> <p>31. The total number of prisoners in the sector is 4,021. There is no judiciary system prevailing presently in the sector.</p> <p>32. The sector requests that a First Aid kit be available for each vehicle. Furthermore, training should be given on how to use this kit.</p>	
<p><b><u>ITEM 8. BRIEFING NOTES OF SECTOR COMD 3A</u></b></p>	
<p>33. The operational situation in the sector is calm. The RPA are conducting vigorous patrols in Muko and Musebeya communes, where there occurred incidents of ambush and mines.</p>

<p>34. Since the beginning of last month, there has been no returnees coming to the sector. The current number of returnees is 2,329 who are all Hutus from Zaire refugee camps.</p> <p>35. The communes are generally in satisfactory living conditions. Shortage of essential items like food, medical and agriculture implements is their prime concern.</p> <p>36. The current number of prisoners in the prefecture prisons is 1,138. The judicial system is in place; however, there is not enough trained personnel.</p> <p>37. The prefect is making every effort to get the people to live together. He has made several visits to communes accompanied by MILOBS to address people on reconciliation.</p> <p>38. The sector is short of seven MILOBS from an authorized strength of 31 personnel.</p>	
<p><b><u>ITEM 9. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 3B</u></b></p>	
<p>39. Since the last conference, the security condition of the sector has gradually improved, and is now stable and calm. The relationship with the prefecture authorities and the RPA local commanders has also improved considerably.</p> <p>40. Security in the communes is stable. The returnees are all settled down well in their respective areas, and no longer face the hostility that was experienced earlier. There is a noticeable increase in the agricultural activity in all the communes. The fisheries in Kigembe and Ngoma communes are being revitalized again.</p> <p>41. The flow of returnees into the sector has been slow and gradual. The present state of reconciliation process in the sector is hard to tell. Though on the surface it may appear to give false signals, the roots of hatred and distrust run very deep.</p> <p>42. The total number of prisoners in the sector is 8,729, in very overcrowded accommodations. They suffer the same problems as prisoners everywhere in Rwanda.</p> <p>43. The sector no longer has the security of formed armed troops in the area, making the MILOBS Sector HQ vulnerable.</p>	
<p><b><u>ITEM 10. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 4</u></b></p>	
<p>44. The general situation of the sector is relatively calm. However, a series of continuous banditry activities ranging from household robberies, stolen livestock and farm products to indiscriminate killings. Personalities in political authorities are being targeted for assassination.</p>	

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DISCUSSION	ACTION
<p>45. The redeployment of RPA during the period 2-4 Oct 95, to cover the main approaches from Ijwi Island and contain FRGF operations launched from the Nyungwe Forest, have stemmed from reported FRGF infiltrations. The RPA redeployment appears to have contained FRGF/Interahamwe, for the time being.</p> <p>46. The total number of returnees in the past four months to this sector is 10,633. Their condition is very poor.</p> <p>47. The prefecture remains a stronghold of FRG/Interahamwe political support, with many sympathizers among the population. The behavior and attitude of the Prefect and Bourgmestres now seems positive.</p> <p>48. There is a total of 3,400 prisoners in the prefecture prisons. The judicial system is still not functional. The local authorities are still working on the process of reconciliation; but, still not to a satisfactory level.</p> <p>49. The sector does not still have office accommodations hired by UNAMIR. Office accn needs to be hired.</p>	SLOG 0
<p><b><u>ITEM 11. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 5A</u></b></p> <p>50. The sector is relatively calm, except for some minor incidents. The RPA deployment along the Zairian border has intensified.</p> <p>51. Out of 16 communes in the sector, only two have Judges. They only deal with minor cases. Other communes have an Inspector Judiciary Police (IPJ) who presides over minor cases at commune level.</p> <p>52. The sector has one main prison in Ruhengeri. Its maximum capacity is 600, but as at 16 Oct 95, there were 1,495 inmates.</p> <p>53. A total number of 3,169 returnees were recorded in the sector as from Aug 95. They have the general problems of food, seeds, farming implements and building material.</p>	
<p><b><u>ITEM 12. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 5B</u></b></p> <p>54. The operational situation of the sector has been deteriorating over the past months. There has been a very definite increase in murder, thefts, and insurgency.</p> <p>55. At Gisenyi, on 10<sup>th</sup> Oct 95, the governments of Rwanda and Zaire, and the UNHCR conducted a tripartite meeting regarding the repatriation of those refugees still in Zaire.</p> <p>56. The total number of returnees in the past three months is 19,439 persons. The condition of the returnees is poor.</p>	

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DISCUSSION	ACTION
<p>57. The population at the Gisenyi Prison is a total of 1,414 inmates. There have been no significant changes in the judiciary system in the past few months. The process of reconciliation is most difficult in this sector.</p> <p>58. The Sector Comd points out that Hel request should not be turned down, due to the onset of the rainy season. All vehicles should be provided with the necessary tools for driver maintenance. An extra computer is also required.</p>	SLOG O
<p><b>ITEM 13. BRIEFING BY SECTOR COMD 5C</b></p> <p>59. The general situation of the sector is that of an uneasy calm. Rumours are in the increase within the sector, especially along the costal belt, that the FRGF will be launching attack by infiltration in near future.</p> <p>60. During the last three months, Kibuye prefecture received 2,900 returnees. They are generally fatigued from travelling and have very low morale. They often suffer from dehydration, malnutrition, malaria, dysentery, measles and constantly suffering from shortage of food, water, blankets, medical supplies and the day to day required items.</p> <p>61. The general condition of the commune is improving slowly. Normal life is slowly returning to its expectancy. The local population is going about their normal activities.</p> <p>62. The one prison here in Kibuye now houses 2,220 inmates. This facility was built for 250 people so acute space problems occur.</p> <p>63. The proper justice system is still not in place to begin the trials of prisoners accused of genocide. The reconciliation process has not changed. From our perception, it is not materializing, although the situation appears to be calm.</p> <p>64. The problems in the sector for the MILOBS are a lack of an adequate system of potable water supply, and the need for another computer.</p>	
<p><b>ITEM 14. BRIEFING BY HAC</b></p> <p>65. The representative stated how he appreciated the works accomplished by the humanitarian officers of the sectors. He covered the following points:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. No promises or commitments should be made by MILOBS, without confirming from HAC as UNAMIR has severe resource constraints.</li> <li>b. The request from Prefectures was being compiled to assess and determine the priority of works.</li> <li>c. All humanitarian assistance were provided as per</li> </ul>

<p>priority decided by UHAAG.</p> <p><b><u>ITEM 15. BRIEFING BY CIVPOL</u></b></p> <p>66. The representative reminded the attendees the UN Security Council resolution which states the mandate of CIVPOL and the analysis of its specific tasks.</p> <p><b><u>ITEM 16. CONCLUDING REMARKS OF THE SRSG</u></b></p> <p>67. The SRSG requested that all present encourage everyone to listen to Radio UNAMIR. He expressed his satisfaction with the HAC, and stated that with such meager resources available to them, they are doing sterling work. He asked for advise on means to improve prison facilities and provide for extension of their existing infrastructure.</p> <p>68. On the subject of returnees, he asked for advise on a workable plan to cope with a sudden and massive influx of returnees. He asked if the present structure of transit camps is sufficient to absorb the flow of refugees, and that at their arrival in their respective communes, if their is sufficient food and accommodations to support them.</p> <p>69. He thanked everyone for a most informative briefing.</p> <p><b><u>ITEM 17. BRIEFING BY SOO</u></b></p> <p>70. The SOO reminded each sector of the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a. The sector vehicles must be judiciously utilized.</li> <li>b. Usage of proper communicative and language skills on the radio, telephone and fax by the Duty officer.</li> <li>c. Sector Commanders to provide, as required, an assessment of the events covered in the daily SITREP.</li> </ul> <p><b><u>ITEM 18. BRIEFING BY SMPO</u></b></p> <p>71. The SMPO reported that the current MILOB strength is 286 against an authorized strength of 320, thus a shortfall of 34. With the normal attrition rate, the MILOB strength will be 233, which will certainly affect the operational efficiency of the group.</p> <p>72. He reminded all Sector Commanders and Branch Heads that confidential reports are supposed to be written on MILOBS before thy depart from the mission area. It should reach the HQ 7 days before the departure of the MILOB.</p> <p>73. On the subject of a MILOB being promoted during his tour, the SMPO reminded that the allocated rank structure to countries to comply with does not change. However, if for morale reason should an officer be promoted in the mission</p>

<p>and authorization by CMO before wearing the rank.</p> <p><b>ITEM 19. BRIEFING BY SLOGO</b></p> <p>74. The SLOGO stated that since the mission is about to finish, many projects are blocked due to financial constrains.</p> <p>75. He stated that the vehicle strength of sectors 3A, 4, and 5B will be increased.</p> <p>76. He stated that if a MILOB fails in his second attempt to acquire a UNAMIR driving permit, he will be repatriated.</p> <p>77. He reminded that accommodation returns for MILOBS should reach him by the 12th day of each month.</p> <p>78. Finally, he stated that at this time the vehicles of sectors 3A, 3B and 4 will be able to receive A and B level maintenance and small repair at the workshop in Butare. Sector 1B, if they so wish, can also use this service. However, sector 5C has to take their vehicles to the Kigali Main Workshop for servicing.</p>

He stated that there was a increase in sexually transmitted diseases, and this is no longer any personnel matter. All MILOBS should take great care in the security of their personal property.</p> <p>81. He thanked Sector Commander 5C for hosting this conference, and invited all to attend the next conference which will take place in Ruhengeri at a date to be later determined.</p>


